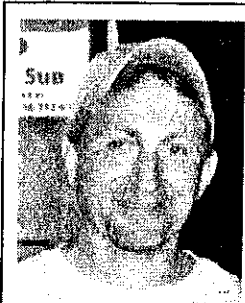

SPRING MEETING NOTES MAR 15, 2008

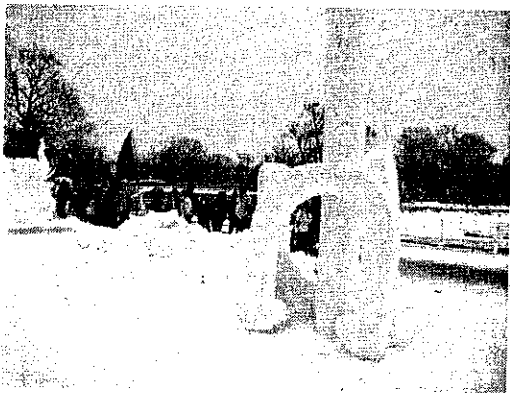

FROM THE PRESIDENT - by Tom Steinke



I was recently pitching a tournament in Deansville and I was listening to a conversation on the pit next to me. Just like they do on TV; I will change the names to protect the innocent.

The older man, who we will call "Jim," pitches at 40 feet but could pitch at 30 feet. The younger lady, who we'll call "Sue," was pitching at nearly 40 feet but could pitch at 30 feet. They were having a good game. About halfway through, Jim says to Sue, "You know, you would be a lot better pitcher if you moved up to 30 feet." Without hesitation, Sue looked at him and said, "So would you." Great comeback.

It got me thinking, should a person move up just because of age or gender? Maybe, if you think you could be the best in the State, or even in the World it might be worth it. Other than that, whatever distance you choose to pitch from and are having fun with... what difference does it make? In the lower and middle classes, you will meet a lot of new people, and the averages are a lot closer. In the upper classes, you see more ringers, higher scores, but a lot of the same people over and over again.

No matter what distance you choose, remember that it's only a game and a chance to visit with your friends, old and new. It is good exercise, and you should look forward to pitching. Of course, some tournaments are more fun than others, depending on how you are pitching.

There are still a few 40-footers who do not care to pitch against 30-footers. Just think about it a little. Maybe someday your health or age will influence your decision to move up. For now, remember you are playing an *average*, not a *distance*.

SPRING MEETING (CONTINUED)

State tournament director **Randy Rein** updated members on the progress of the 2008 State tournament in Mosinee. Plaques will be the award choice for the State. Motel reservations should be done early, due to an expected influx of Harley riders around the Labor Day weekend. Rein recommends the Super 8 in Mosinee and has a block of rooms on hold there and at the Comfort Inn (see p.14 for a list of accommodations). A moderate fee of \$20 gives clubs the opportunity to advertise in the traditional State book, which will be produced by the the Little Bull Falls HSC. The club will set up 18 indoor courts the week prior, and will not turn down any help, especially, it was noted, from strong men.



Book your rooms early for State!

The Harley-Davidson 105th Anniversary Celebration is the same weekend as the State Tournament in Mosinee.

Terry Sternberg, WHPA 2nd Vice President, restated that the 2009 State tournament will be hosted by the Platteville club. Further, he called for 2010 bids to be available for the Fall meeting. He mentioned that WHPA brochures are in stock and should be in the hands of every member to promote our sport among the uninitiated.

Sonia Cook, WHPA 3rd Vice President, on the scholarship fund, reported little change since last fall, citing an annual cost of \$900 to cover expected awards. Present liabilities are \$6,800, and the remaining balance is \$6,400. Her plea was to involve all clubs to donate prize for the annual raffle at State.

Lorraine Sternberg, NHPA 3rd Vice President, used this platform to make some of her national awards:

- The Close Doesn't Count Club received a plaque commemorating 20 years of association with the sanctioned club/league program.
- Goldendale, a charter member club, was cited for their 30 years of association with the program.
- It was also good to see that Wisconsin pitchers fig-

ured among the Top 10 awards. Names like **Aleena Cook, Kiri Cook, Mark Mauthe, Randy Rein, John Udelofen, Gert Wilcziek, Lorraine Sternberg, and Cola Hickethier** appear on page 30 of the latest issue of Newsline (see subscription details on p.16).

For scholarship awards, **Aleena Cook**, with her 4.0 GPA, received \$400. **Kiri Cook**, \$100. **Malachi David** was noted for Honorable Mention. **Julie Larson** is slated for \$175.

Dick Hansen, NHPA Secretary/Treasurer, commented that Wisconsin has 45 juniors on track.

The WT Director (Hansen) spoke highly of this year's event, scheduled for York, PA. Read the March/April of Newsline to appreciate the whole picture. New walking runners and new courts have the producers excited. Until June 1, sponsorship is available for the new courts. For \$500, the court will bear the sponsor's name, a bargain considering the tournament life of the world tournament platform courts. There are pictures of the new courts on the Newsline cover. This new court strongly resembles the Wisconsin Team World variety, notably the stake assembly.

Casey Sluys has announced that he will not run as 2nd NHPA Vice President. At this time, past the deadline, **Tina Hawkins** is the sole respondent for the position. We would have to guess

that it's a done deal. Presently, she is the President of the Oklahoma Horse-shoe Pitchers Association and author of Newsline's "Charter Chatter."

Hansen continued with the news of probable NHPA dues increase of \$5. It promises to be a hot topic at the convention this summer. He estimated a breakdown of the \$12 NHPA dues: \$3 for Championship Class prize money at the WT, \$3 for liability insurance during sanctioned events, \$1 NHPA travel expenses, \$1 to finance the sanctioned league program, \$1.50 to the NHPF, and the remaining \$1.50 for NHPA operating expenses.

Lastly, some WHPA pins are still available at \$2.00 each from **Paulette Hansen**.

Regional Director **Ken Jaeger** introduced **Paul Wiese** as a new tournament director and president of the Eau Claire club. He then reminded the group that clubs are limited to one club tournament per year, and finished by declaring this is his last go-around as NHPA Regional Director for Wisconsin.

It was at this point in the meeting when **Kevin Brekke** outlined his elaborate plans for scheduling scorekeepers for Team World and the State tournament. Suffice to say, he has it well-in-hand and can accommodate the desires of all willing score-scratchers. Just see Brekke.

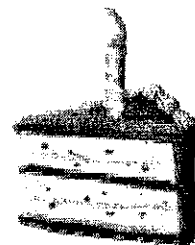

"FIVE DEAD" IN EAU CLAIRE, 1987

This is a tale about a long ago World Tournament that is still having an impact on my life.

I was privileged to participate in 15 WT's from 1986 through 2000. All of them were memorable, but the 1987 World in Eau Claire, WI will never be forgotten.

That particular year, the WT was played in twin ice arenas during the hottest summer Eau Claire had seen since 1947. It was so hot, and so uncomfortable, that huge fans were used to circulate air over the courts. The fans were placed midway between down and back.

As the first round of the Women's Championship classes were about to begin, the stands filled up with family members, pitchers, friends, and paying customers. I decided to watch from the floor level, standing next to the fan near Court 1.

The first pitch on Court 1 was a 3/4-turn shoe, right on target. On Court 2, the first two shoes were pitched in rapid succession, both flip shoes, both ringers.

Then things got crazy.

As the second shoe was pitched on Court 1, a sudden surge of fan speed occurred. Upon releasing the shoe, the left-handed pitcher turned around and hurried back to escape the cloud of clay dust stirred up by the strong wind. The resulting blast of air not only startled me and the pitchers, but surprised the 3/4 turn she had just sent flying through the air. Like a knuckleball, the shoe changed direction. I watched in amazement as the shoe landed as a ringer next door on Court 2, instead of Court 1. After the shoe landed, I realized that the other pitchers on Courts 1 and 2 had also turned their backs to shield themselves from the dust, and none of the four pitchers had seen the stray shoe's journey.

As the fan speed returned to normal, the clay dust settled. The second pitchers on both courts scored six packs to complete the inning.

Meanwhile, the spectators in the stands hadn't even

realized the competition had started, as they were too busy meetin' and greetin', huggin' and kissin', and chewin' the fat. The scorekeepers didn't see anything either, since they closed their eyes and covered their faces to escape the miniature dust storm.

Was I the *only witness* to this on-court drama and aberration?

When the Court 1 pitchers attempted to retrieve their expected four-dead, they were astonished to find only three shoes on the stake. Digging commenced, with no favorable results. Next door, however, the pitchers on Court 2 were shocked to discover five shoes on their stake. Thinking a practice shoe had been left behind, they signaled for a judge, who slowly made his way to their court. Impatience and mischief took over, and the ladies jointly announced to the crowd, "Five Dead!"

The scorekeeper on Court 2 was an elder of impeccable repute, although he had been known to sometimes record a score before the shoes were pitched. However, upon hearing the call "five dead," reared up in his chair and performed a *perfect* backward somersault. Landing on his feet, he fled the scene, stopping only for a beer and exclaiming, "I'll never come back to Colorado again," leaving the bartender in a state of confusion.

Judges that were elsewhere on the courts, now aroused and suspicious, hurried with the velocity of a 1-3/4 to Court 2. After much discussion, they concluded that because the second shoe on Court 1 was 3/4-turn shoe pitched by a lefty that it was, without a doubt, a wild pitch that became an errant shoe.

Excuse me? What about the fan surge? The accelerated wind? The airborne clay dust? Never mentioned by judges, pitchers, scorekeepers or spectators.

You probably wonder why I, apparently the only witness to this astonishing event, didn't speak up—ever. How could I? I did not feel qualified then. At that

time, I wasn't much more than a rookie, at only my second WT. The pitchers were the Championship Women, the Cream of the Crop. I was a low-class man, already 62 years old. They would have thought I was delusional!

Moreover, I'm a left-hander, and nobody believes a lefty. People consider southpaws to have three stages in life: eccentric, zany, and bizarre, not necessarily in that order. Nobody believes a southpaw. How about Joan of Arc, a lefty who was burned at the stake!

Worse than burning, I could have been banned by the NHPA, and I could not handle either fate.

So why tell my story now? Did that really happen just as I saw it? Or did I just imagine the whole thing? Would you believe such a story, then or now?

Over the years, all 20 of them, the memory slowly faded. As I entered my 80's in 2005, I thought I was home-free. But in 2007, the 20th Anniversary of the 1987 World Tournament in Eau Claire, it all surfaced again in a very disturbing and devilish way, and at a dreadful hour.

Beginning on a memorial date, July 4th, 2007, I have been awakened at 2:00am each night to see a very old Elder sitting in what appears to be a judge's chair, at the foot of my bed. He's wearing a name-shirt, backwards. It reads: Sum. R. Sault. "Who are you?" I ask. He replies, "Say my name, fast!" Is it a real name, or a taunt? Suddenly, he's holding a beer can and yelling over and over, "Five Dead! Five Dead! Five Dead! Oh, Claire!" ☹

Ed Quigley of New Jersey is know as an emcee who addresses many groups. He was **Bob Champion's** partner working on the daily newspaper at the World Tournament. Unfortunately, the NHPA no longer sponsors his stay at the WT. We miss his presence, as well as his humor.

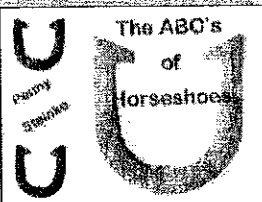

First off, I would like to thank all 16 pitchers that showed up to the event.

In class A, **Rich Peterson** took control from the start and cruised to first place with a 6-1 record. **John Garvan** was close behind with a 5-2 record for second place, and **Ken Frame** came in third at 3-4.

PITCHING DELIVERY TIP

- from Jim Haupt




Some horseshoe pitchers, while concentrating on the stake, mistakenly pitch at the stake instead of lofting the shoe.

Comparing the delivery to the study of ballistics, we know that the projectile from a gun or a bow will travel further if the barrel or arrow is elevated. So too with our projectile, the horseshoe.

We see too many pitchers, especially short distance pitchers, with a low shoe going more or less directly at the stake. Those are sometimes called "grass-cutters."

An improvement would be to imagine the stake is surrounded in a bucket. Watch a champion pitcher. Many will lift the shoe high enough to land in the bucket.

Put your shoe in the bucket and you will score more points. Some shoes will actually hit the stake. Now develop the turn or flip to hit the stake with the inside of the shoe. We call that a ringer!

I believe a person can improve if he really wants to, but he must be willing to take the painstaking road of hard knocks first. You can do it! Imagine 10% points higher on your average. Go for it. You are the only one holding yourself back. What do you say?

Changes will come your way whether you want them to or not. But other changes take place because you have taken a proactive stand to make it to happen. How much do you want it?

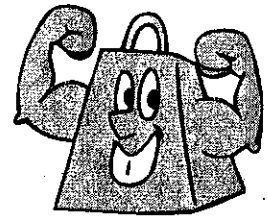
