December 27, 1929—March 11, 2021 The WHPA lost a very gracious and caring gentleman. To say he was the King of Horseshoes in WI is an understatement. His home away from home seemed to be the Beloit Horseshoe Club house for the past 30 years. Pitcher, tournament director, mentor... he did it all!!

A tribute to Earl from his granddaughter Julie

My grandpa was the purest man who ever lived. He touched so many people's lives with his kind and gentle spirit. He always knew how to make everyone feel good about themselves. He never said a bad word to anyone or about anyone and he always chose his words wisely. He had a lot of patience. He taught me how to play horseshoes and to keep striving to be better than I was the day before. I will probably never meet a man as patient and kind as grandpa.

A few words about Earl and Horseshoes Kevin Brekke

Twenty years ago in 2001, Earl was one of our state's Hall of Fame inductees. The Beloit club held the State tournament that year, the 4th time since 1989, their first. He won the state's President award, and the National Director award. But he was most proud of the Team World tournament, renting the Telfer Park hockey arena. The tournament continues to draw top pitchers from the United States, and at one time, Canada. Earl also has won many Wisconsin Moose Championships, notably in 1996 and 1997.

On a personal note, Earl was always looking for scorekeepers for tournaments and I was happy to keep score. As I joined to club in 2005, I learned from him and took over this responsibility. I watched him pitch, be behind the computer entering scores, and would talk to anyone and make them feel they were important and with a little practice, could be better. He was a fierce competitor, as many pitchers here would agree. Even when his legs were going out, he would still try and pitch from a shorter distance.

Earl had the respect of everyone he met and when you met Earl, you knew was one of our state's 2001 Hall of Fame Inductees. The Beloit club held the state tournament that year, the 4th time since 1989, you had a friend. I once asked a successful fisherman, what as their secret to success. They replied, time on the water. Well I think part of Earl's success was his time with horseshoes at the club, at a tournament, and with his horseshoe family. Thank you, Earl.

Losing long term club members over the last few years has taken a toll on my feeling of safety, but with the passing of those like Rudy Van Fleet, Don Ilgen, Allan Huizenga, and Billy Dahmen, I still have the security of John Meyer, Kerry Morris, Julio Tijerina and Gary Volz. But, the best part, is my new horseshoe family members who seem to have noticed that I now need them. People like Sandy Anderson, Gerald Harris, and Ed Pulsfus. All of whom have become much larger parts of my family then they may even know.

Now, I know that covers my local leagues, but sometimes my moods can make it terrifying for me to go to other tournaments. That is where the horseshoe family really kicks in. When I travel someplace and see faces that instantly calm me. When I am sitting in my car trying to decide if I can really do it today, and the right smile or wave hits and I know, beyond the shadow of a doubt, that I am safe and that I am cared for. I can only hope that someone out there feels that way when they see me approaching as well...and isn't that what family is all about really, surrounding yourself with people you love, who love you in return? Thank you all, from the bottom of my messed up heart, for being my family.

Pitcher of the Year Dave Volz

The Pitcher of the Year award is determined by the number of points accumulated in tournaments from August 1st through July 31st. There are 3 Divisions which are determined by pitcher averages as of August 1st 2020. Division A is 45% and over, Division B is 30% - 44.99% and Division C is below 30%. Pitchers receive 15 points for a 1st place finish, 10 points for a 2nd place finish and 5 points for a 3rd place finish in open WHPA sanctioned tournaments. Bonus points are awarded for attending the WHPA Spring and Fall meetings in the amount of 15 points each. The current leaders are Division A - John Meyer, Ray Groskinsky and Penny Steinke. Division B -Tom Steinke, Jill Peterson and Jeff Gustafson. Division C – Kevin Brekke, Rayna Bauer and Edwin Pulsfus. If you would like to see the current standings, go to the website at www.whpahorseshoes.com/awards The site is updated as the results come in from the tournament directors. This award is presented to the winners each year at the awards ceremony at the WHPA State Singles Tournament as well as most improved awards for one adult and one Cadet / Jr. pitcher which is determined by comparing averages each year on August 1st to the previous year.

Regional Directors Report

With all events scheduled to be held at Telfer Park in Beloit having to be canceled, here as an update on them. Team World and Club Team (Jim Haupt Memorial) will not be held again this year because of the number of courts required to effectively run these events. They will be scheduled again in 2022. The Beloit Encore singles tournament will be held as scheduled on May 8th but will be held at the Beloit Horseshoe Club instead. The WHPA State Walking Doubles will be held at the Beloit Horseshoe Club on May 22nd. Ken Heinritz canceled the Kewaskum Open and offered that date for this event. The deadline is May 10th, the entry form is in this issue as well as the WHPA website.

The 2021 World Tournament is still scheduled to take place in Winnemucca, Nevada on July 19-31. The deadline is June 8th and the entry form and online entry is available on the WHPA website. There is also information available about motels and area attractions. If you are making plans for future World Tournaments, the 2022 and 2023 World tournaments have switched years, 2022 will now be held in Monroe, Louisiana and 2023 will be held in Landsing, Michigan.

The new eShoe program is in full swing and seems to be running quite smoothly. The HSMaster program for running tournaments has been upgraded with eShoe and it is a great improvement. When tournament directors send tournament information, player stats and averages are updated immediately. One important thing for pitchers entering a tournament is to make sure your membership dues are up to date. This can easily be done through eShoe or by mail with the form on the website. If a pitcher's membership isn't up to date their tournament information will not update until it is. Tournament Directors easily can and should check an entrant's membership status on the HSMaster program or through eShoe. The latest HSMaster can be downloaded from the Whpa website, there are also videos as well as an HSMaster step by step instructional guide on how to run your tournament. I will have patches and tournament certificates for Tournament Directors at the WHPA spring meeting on April 17th at the Delton Sportsmen's Club. See you there!

"The Cruel Shoes"

Long drives and throwing shoes are both ideal activities for contemplating big thoughts, those ideas that wander inaudibly and piece

together the whole world. Until the shoe clangs off the stake, or the country road is split from you by a train passing through. With the right setting – peace, time, etcetera – you can return to wandering strands of the world, large and small, even as you're focused on the task at hand, whether it's the open road or the horseshoe pits.

The last few months of the past year have been short on long drives and nearly any horseshoes, for me. That is typical of winter where we live; my entirely amateur existence in pitching shoes has been in the sand, which, outside of the year-end folly from last issue's column, necessitates warmer months.

The possibility of pitching shoes for the first time in clay came at a perfect time for me, after COVID vaccination shots and just before the Deansville Horseshoes Club pulled together their winter season-ending tournament. At the suggestion of our colleague Dobie, I drove an hour and change from my house, going westward, passed idling deer in early active farms and a couple times over the serpentine Maunesha River, to the Deansville. "Isn't it technically in Marshall?," the GPS appears to ask with incrimination when I dial up directions. When you're alone in the car on a trip, you can answer aloud those questions in your head. "Who's keeping score, Google Maps?" Off the Interstate and through Ixonia, soon after stopped by a mile-long train. Ixonia ... so this is where those "state banks" all come from, huh? All around, spring got closer the closer you looked, if you looked past the melting snow.

Through a surprise cluster of worn residential homes, then over more tracks to the big, welcoming lot at The Barrel Inn, the landing strip next to our horseshoes club du jour. Switch from that freeform thought on the world around me, to one more inward, reflective. Until ...

I had thought maybe I would throw shoes by my-

self, a typical occurrence that I typically relish. Let the brain wander on the back end while I try to knock off the rust against that spike (and sometimes the backboard) in these Club confines. Amid separation from the pandemic, far fewer social situations, I had forgot the search for peace and humanity sometimes, you know, involves other people.

Gerald met me at bar to kindly grab the key for the club next door. After feeling out for comfort levels and making each other laugh once or twice about the state of the world, he offered to keep me company at the club, a quite nice shed with a bar, historical pictures and member folk art, to go along with a music stage and beer signs. In this social atmosphere, it was natural and comforting to have my precious little thoughts joined in parallel by Gerald, pitching and pontificating.

He talked the lingo picked up from about four years of intense playing. Shared advice on why my toss kept coming up short. Explained how to turn over the clay and the ways the old wooden score counters were used. Interspliced, we shared family stories, work histories, thoughts on natural disasters. For innings, sometimes quiet between the *clangs* and *schlocks* of shoes hitting the stake or sucked straight into that cool, absorptive clay. In whole, Gerald offered: "Horseshoe people, that's who they are," and then proceeded to share the openness of people he's come across across Wisconsin, at tournaments across the country.

That wandering flow of dialogue, this time not stowed inside, and a reminder of the conversational freedom in this sport. I'd imagine it's much more of a pain to touch on your grand theories of the everyday as well as your favorite shaggy dog stories when, say, skating 20 m.p.h. into another player during 30-second shifts on a hockey rink. In horseshoes, you can mull your Zen and speak it, too. Philosophy closer to what you'd find in the barroom, though no less valuable.

Which, after 200-or-so tosses, is where we ended up. In the bar less for drinks and more for the fish fry and, at Gerald's insistence, the clam chowder. There were still the masks and the distance that have marked and marred this past pandemic year, but it was inching closer to a normal Friday night out. Tasty meals, then some thank yous and goodbyes, before we were both, separately, out the door, into the inky outside at an old train depot converted into a restaurant. Haul home. I took the straighter route back to Milwaukee, through different and fewer farm fields and bucolic yards. Night stepped in as company with a soundtrack of an old ska CD on my car stereo onto the Interstate for a pleasantly thoughtless trip back.
