STATE TOURNAMENT REPORT - by Bun & Shirley Carley



Gert Wilcziek set a record by pitching a 100% game. And just to show how close the percentages in each class were, we had 10 playoffs for first place.


Pam Aiken received the President's Award and the Ken Kosky Award, which were both greatly deserved. She has done a great job with the Newsletter.

John improved his pitching average 14.49 percentage points from August 2006 to August 2007. He pitched 29.48% in four tournaments in 2006. He pitched in nine tournaments, averaging 43.97% in 2007.



You missed out if you were not at the World Tournament, held this year in Ardmore, Oklahoma. Yes, of course, for the 13th time the Men's title has gone to the "king of the hill" Alan Francis, as he went undefeated in the Championship round. He went head-to-head against 19 contenders and swiftly turned each one away. Stan Griggs of MO was the only one scoring over 20 points on him. Francis, however, was not as invincible as we all have become accustomed to. Ever since the 2004 World Tournament when former Canadian National Champion Andre Leclerc took him by surprise, Alan has not registered a loss. Well move over Andre, because on Wednesday August 1st, our very own Mark Mauthe rose to the occasion overtaking the champ before a goodsized crowd during the preliminary action of the A-1 Class. The news of Mark's victory spread like wildfire as it reached me while in the middle of a match. Hats off to Mauthe as he accomplished something very few people have done over the past 15 years. Mark's fine play earned him 2nd place overall, not bad to be runner-up to the World Champion, His previous best was a 4th place finish only a year ago.

Another great story occurred in the championship class was the play of Harry Mariano, a Navajo Indian from NM. Harry barely made the cut by finishing 7th place in the A-2 class. Working with a new slate and pitching against the big dogs, he stepped up his game and quickly dismantled Walter Ray Williams Jr. in the 1st game. Harry, displaying a long ponytail, finished the tournament taking a surprising 5th place.

Seventy-seven year old Paul Quam's dream came true when pitched well enough to make the top class. All broken up over the thought of accomplishing such a feat, he went on to take 11th place overall. Though amazing as that was, what is more amazing is the fact that he first picked up a horseshoe five years ago, looking for something to do when his wife passed away. His story lends hope to many.

Two-Time Junior Boys World Champion, Drew Becker of Ontario Canada, decided to forego his last year of eligibility in the Junior Class to play big-time in the Men's Division. Losing his first five games in the A-2 Class and eight out of his first ten, he admitted that he had a case of the 'rookie jitters.' But Day Three, he came out hot as a pistol, smoking his five opponents while pitching a very satisfying day's average of 63%, finishing up in 9th place. In one particular game, he needed a double on his last throw and he got it. I remember that one well because I was on the losing end. Look for this young man's name to be in the Men's Championship Class in years to come. The switch from 30 feet to 40 feet bode well for Drew.

Just imagine with me for a moment. You are warming up in your back yard just one week before the World Tournament and you don't feel comfortable with your motion. It has happened to all of us, right? Would you ever in your wildest dreams consider pitching with the other hand? You'd have to be nuts, wouldn't you? Maybe for all but one person, Walter Ray Williams Jr. Yes it's true. One week before, yes, the World Tournament, he switched over to pitching right-handed. And

he ended up tying for first in the prelims with Francis, thanks to Mauthe's victory over Alan. And if that doesn't beat all, Mr. Williams not satisfied with a 2nd place finish, switched back to pitching lefthanded for the championship round. Does this make him a switchpitcher? Though nearly everyone roots for his opponents to win, you must appreciate the kind of talent he has. Oh, and of course not to mention that he's also the all time top money earner in the Professional Bowlers Association with over 3.7 million dollars to his credit. Walter Ray finished fourth in the Championship final.

As great as each of these stories are, there's one highlight for me I'll always remember. If you guessed winning the Men's A-2 Class or making it to the Men's Championship, you guessed wrong. Rather, it was a pick-up doubles game in which Mark Mauthe and I took on World Champ Alan Francis and his wife Amy. We played in a sand court next to the parsonage at Pastor Jerry Holt's church after a time of worshipping the Lord together.

Time spent together praising the 'Lord of all' is always a blessing not to be taken lightly. Apparently I am not the only horseshoe pitcher who feels this way. One week earlier at the Chapel Service in Ardmore, 144 individuals chose to make Him the top priority as the meeting place was jammed. Make plans to attend a Chapel Service at the next State Doubles, Singles, Team World or even at York, PA where the 2008 World Tournament will be held.
