A LETTER TO THE EDITOR

“TOKEN”

Token (adj): insignificantly small; a matter of form only; perfunctory; minimal; merely symbolic.

Right now, there is no incentive for a woman to pitch from 40 feet in sanctioned tournaments other than to ease her conscience. And pitching from the shorter distance helps some older men continue to enjoy the game, rather than give it up entirely.

Normally, I can just shrug it off, but I think this will be my time to speak. Lorraine and I, the “token” women's team, won the State Doubles tournament. We are both very proud of this accomplishment. Our combined ringer percentage in our playoff game was 81.66% - that's 83.3% for Lorraine and 80% for me. I am just as proud of this tournament win as I would be had I won the singles title.

Imagine my reaction when I open my newsletter to see that the “token” women's team won the title. And after reading the rest of this article, and then comparing it to the June 1999 article covering the tournament, it seems like you do not care for the format or the tournament. Perhaps if you cannot see past your dislike for the event, you should ask somebody else to write the piece for the newsletter, as this IS an important event for many pitchers in this state.

“If it was a party, where was the music?” I could hear the music, until I read my June 2000 newsletter.



I am writing this letter in response to the “WHPA Walking Doubles” article published in the June 2000 Newsletter.

Whether it is paranoia or mere perceptiveness, 30 foot pitchers are acutely aware that not everyone believes horseshoes is a fair game with opponents pitching from shorter distances. As a 30 foot pitcher, it is something that enters my mind every time I play the game. It is a touchy enough situation without the negative reinforcements printed in this Newsletter. Some are subtle - “token women,” and some are not so subtle - “real women pitch from 40 feet.”

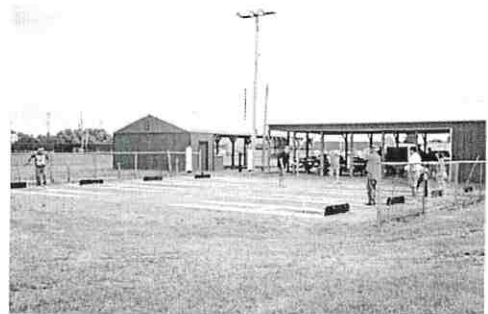

EAU CLAIRE OPEN

Yes, Dennis Kieser does have a connection with the Man Upstairs. As tournament director he tried to go it on his own for the Earlybird Tournament with the result that the weather was VERY cold and windy.

Recently he has been observed kneeling in prayer between throws during league play. His prayers were answered for the open Tournament with what most would describe as a perfect day: sunny, light breeze, and temperature in the high 70's.

Sixty pitchers from around Wisconsin & Minnesota along with Terry Koivisto from Canada competed in 10 classes. Perfect {5-0} performances were turned in by Clayton Gage in Class A, Al Johnson in Class E, Tom Dudenhoefer in Class I and Stan Fredrickson in Class J. Clayton was Class A & tournament champ with a average, including an 88 % game.

Despite a class high 64% average, Wayne Totten of Cambridge, MN placed 3rd in Class B which was won by Suzanne Helene recorded a 78% game. Judi Hayden rebounded from a 32-24 deficit with six shoes remaining to record a 37-32 victory to place 3rd in Class D behind 1st place winner Ev Goshaw, another Eau Claire club member. Al Johnson of Eau Claire easily won all five games enroute to a 42.8% average and 1st place finish in Class E.

Class F provided the closest contest with four pitchers compiling 3-2 records. Ron Wilcziek of Whitehall

with a 39.2 average edged out Paul Wilson of Janesville (38.4%), Ida Hostrup of Frederic (33.6%) and Doug Maier of Park Falls (33.2%). Another contest decided by averages was Class G where Delbert Karsjens of Clarks Grove, MN 36.8% won over Cathy Coyle of Chippewa Falls 35.6%. Both had 4-1 records.

Robin Mahn of Park Falls took 1st place in Class H at 4-1 with Jim Heim of Hohman placing 2nd. Tom Dudenhoefer of Oxford overcame a 3 point deficit with two shoes remaining by throwing a double to preserve his 5-0 record and walk away with 1st place in Class I. Stan Fredrickson of Eau Claire threw Class J high 22.4% in posting his 5-0 record.

First and second place finishers were given a choice of a trophy or cash, \$25 for first & \$15 for second place and a subscription to the Wisconsin Newsletter. In addition the following awards were presented:

- Men's 40 ft champ Kent Anderson, Menomonie 61.6%
- Ladies champion Gert Wilcziek, Whitehall 58.8%
- Junior champion Dustin Dahl, Trempealeau 65.6%
- Junior participant Ryan Anderson, Menomonie.

All participants appreciated the efforts of Tournament Director Dennis Kieser and his Heavenly Friend and those who kept scores, posted scores and worked the refreshment stand throughout the day and who helped make the tournament a success.

Weather Hype Upsetting

The unusual wet Wisconsin springtime has upset the plans of some horseshoe pitchers. When sending the check for the entry fee pleasant thoughts of faraway fair and sunny flit through the mind. We may take the weather as it comes but hope springs eternal for nice days.

The outlook for Memorial Day weekend was dismal. Weather maps were showing rain throughout the state. Expected tourists were being prepared with hourly radio reports. We were over quota for the wet stuff for the month and knew just what to expect. Saturday morning it was raining pretty good in southeastern Wisconsin, looked like an all day affair. Problem was the Platteville tournament was 160 miles to the west, to go or not to go.

Rich Conrad, Waukesha, says his father could predict the weather by observing the cows. If the herd was up on four legs, fair weather was in the offing but if most of the animals were resting on the ground it meant they, in their inherent wisdom, knew rain was approaching and wanted to keep their spot in the pasture dry to weather out the storm.
