Red's Grand Opening

Pitchers are standing in line to enter the Beloit indoor tournaments. The long awaited sewer system and granting of occupancy permits have been accomplished. Indoor horseshoes is a-going.

The first event on Dec 7th and 8th filled to capacity, 72 pitchers. Somehow they have figured how to add a few more for the first event of the new year but spaces are filling fast and sure tom be another sellout.

Most of the space in the new building

is, of course the six court area. Viewing windows on the north end are as close as spectators can get. If you are not pitching, the unwritten rule is, stay out of the court area. Watch the games from the window area. Inside two classes are going on. For six-man classes Beloit has chosen to pitch 50 shoes. The area between the food counter and the office has a few tables that seemed forever occupied with pitchers coming or going, more than willing to talk it over a little more. In all respects Red's Pitching Palace is one nice clubhouse.

Uniform Scoring

Scoring a game of horseshoes varies by practice throughout the state.

Once upon a time scorekeepers with pencils and clipboards sitting mid-court were commonplace in the WHPA. We still see it at the State Tournament, TEAM-WORLD and some club tournaments on occasion. But, while providing scorekeepers still is an option for some clubs other tournament directors, many times operating as the sole authority, find providing scorekeepers next to impossible.

That is what led most in the WHPA to

adopt the popular self scoring devices adding a magnetic strip to the existing wheel devices.

It began at the Arena Sandbar after some events were scored as ringers only. The method was simple; use the wheels to score each ringer as one.

Other horseshoe minds were working on other concepts for self-scoring. Gus Schram built scoring devices that kept ringers and points. He explained the concept noting that we really don't cancel ringers, rather we add and carry ringer totals, that being the most important statistic of the game.

Schram's principle was recognized as right on. At the same time, his actual

The 2003 State Doubles Tournament will be "Regular Doubles" play. The 2003 State Doubles flyer is in this Newsletter issue, along with the 2002-year end Natstats averages. Remember there are only three requirements to pitch in the State Doubles, 1) must have a current 2003 NHPA membership card, 2) must have pitched in at least one tournament or sanction league in 2002 and that 3) only one, either you or your partner, can have an average 60 percent or better.

With the 2003 World tournament in Eau Claire this year, its going to be a very exciting year for horseshoe players that have never pitched in a Worlds Tournament. You should have at least 3 shirts with your name and state printed on the back, unless of course you don't mind doing laundry every day. Remember the requirements, for pitching in a World Tournament, are having 4 tournaments from May 16th 2002 to May 15th 2003, pitched in at your entering pitching distance.

KENOSHA HORSESHOE CLUB HOLDS THEIR ANNUAL BENEFIT

This year the Kenosha Horseshoe Club decided to hold their annual benefit tournament for the Kenosha Achievement Center indoors.

The Kenosha Achievement Center's

We held a 10 team round robin doubles tournament on our 5 indoor courts and divided our 20 pitchers, that signed up, into teams according to their ringer percentage. The 10 top pitchers drew their partners out of a hat that contained the names of the 10 lower average pitchers. The format used was 20 shoes, count-all.

We started at 10:00 o'clock by introducing Paula Williams, the Executive Director of the center. She explained how the Achievement Center was accomplishing their mission of helping people with special needs. Then we introduced all of the pitchers in the tournament and gave them each a special towel. Then it was on to horseshoes as Paula Williams pitched the first two shoes to start the tournament. After four games we broke for a dinner of hot beef and bar-B-Q prepared and served by Pat Nelson. Our statistician for the tournament was Vera Johnson.

On of our sponsors donated a \$5.00 prize for the high individual score of each round, but a pitcher could only win once so the money got spread around to nine different winners. Terry Atwater, another sponsor, donated a 20" Poulan chain saw to be raffled off and \$185 was raised for the achievement center.

The Kenosha Club is very happy again this year with the pitchers and workers that participated and made it possible to surpass last years benefit. We raised over \$3200 to help people with special needs. We had nine pitchers that raised \$5/99; Hi Chaffin, Dale Shamberg, Jim Uhlenhake, Wally Nelson, Jack Statema, Everett Stewart, Chris Humphrey, Mort Papenfuss, and William Hagen. Five pitchers raised \$100/299; Frank Craig, Loyd Skarda, Joe Zoromskis, Jerry Costello, and

(Continued from page 1) Uniform Scoring scoring devices were unique and required detailed mechanical setup.

Using the Schram principle, Jim Haupt outfitted the score devices at Arena with a metal strip to facilitate use of magnets for count of single points. It was a modification of the ringers-only procedure the arena pitchers had been using. Ringers were kept on the wheel, points under the magnets.

It became an overnight solution to the lack of score keepers. The magnet method spread to other tournaments on the summer schedule. It is now unusual to find a court layout in this state without the magnetic strip. While this change came into we thought we were moving ahead with the ringer-point method. Spectators appreciated the bold figures of ringers on the wheel. Mistakes were few.

In effect ringers were kept on the wheel and points under the magnets. The concept became a ringer-point game rather than the older method of total score with a ringer total on the side.

A small group of pitchers from one club, Platteville, decided to switch the method. Their method was to use the wheels for total points and the magnets for the ringer count. It was accepted by visiting pitchers as

the law of the land but otherwise not the method of their choice.

Lo and behold, the Fall tournaments at Arena chose to use the Platteville method. Like it or not that's the way it was. And some did not like it.

The major objection is, the two new methods to self score. We got used to the ringer-point method. It was adopted by many other clubs. Now we are being forced to use another method, total points. A few pitchers refused.

Now, going back to total points is a new method, to be learned and not as well accepted. That may be merely because it is new and unfamiliar. It also may be because we knew and liked the former ringer-point method.

We anticipate the subject of uniform score to come up at the next state meeting and some kind of straw vote may be taken to choose one or the other. While is unlikely that the WHPA will rule for or against any form of self scoring the choice for uniform scoring can be strongly advised depending on the tournament pitcher's choices.

Let's get back to the concept that the ringer total is the most important statistic of the game.

Fond du Lac Club Announces Team Tournament for 2003

The Fond du Lac Horseshoe Club has decided to get back on the outdoor tournament schedule for 2003, but this time their event will be a played with a most unique format. On Father's Day weekend, June 14 and 15, Jeff Secord will be hosting the first annual Winnebagoland Team Tournament.

This will be a 3-on-3 NHPA sanctioned team event that is modeled like Team World but has some minor alterations. Any combination of adults from any division may be part of a 3-person team but no team will be allowed to enter if their combined 3-person average exceeds 151% ringers. All entering teams will be competing at one level of competition just as Team World is structured. There will be no separate classes and all teams must enter below the 151% cap. All teams

are intended to play on both days but the number of actual entries may force a change to this original intention. Since the teams in this event are not representing a state or a club, as is the case in Team World and Club Team, each team will need to figure out a way to identify themselves and send their team name in with the \$51 entry fee. Just about anything goes here. The last name of the team captain will be used for this purpose if no team name accompanies the entry. Tournament director, Jeff Secord, has stated that team names that exceed the 14 characters that exist in Bogenschneider will be abbreviated, as space is limited for team names. The preliminary rounds will start on Saturday and will be a round robin format similar to the Team World prelims but every team may not be in the same round robin in order to complete the event in two days. The famous Team World and Club Team coin toss for pairings will be used during these preliminary rounds. The finals will be a separate single elimination tourna-

ment played on Sunday with qualification and position into the brackets, as well as individual pairings, decided by the results of the preliminary rounds. The last team standing after the elimination rounds will be crowned the Champion of the event. This first ever Winnebagoland Team Tournament will be limited to a maximum of 20 teams in order to fit it into a twoday event on the 16 clay courts located at the Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds. Entries with the lowest combined team averages at the time of the entry deadline, May 21, 2003 may be declined in order to establish an even number of teams or if the number of entries exceeds the 20-team limit. Everyone is invited to browse the NATSTATS averages, find two partners that will keep the team below the 151% entry limit, and enter the first annual Winnebagoland Team Tournament on Father's Day weekend 2003. 

Almost everyone knows their current pitching average either from their own research into the Natstats files or from their ranking in their last tournament. There was a day when averages were not shown on the pitching schedule so that the director then had greater latitude creating classes.

Now that you know your percentage, you ought to know how it is figured. The last ten tournament averages you have pitched or all of the tournaments in the last twelve months if you don't have ten events is considered the base. From there the three highest percentages are averaged to determine your NHPA pitching average. If you are on the 10 event base, it means that each new event reported is a new set of ten. It may mean an average change. If your base is the last twelve months, each passing month you will drop off one of your base months. Again your average may change monthly. Remember it is determined on your high three.

Every Wednesday averages are updated on the NHPA website. Of special interest should be the

"events reported" menu. It will tell you if the results from your last tournament have been reported.

If you ever question your average, simply send a request to Glenn Jamieson, "NATSTATGUY@aol.com for a print out and see for yourself how your individual tournaments have been reported.
