THE PROPOSAL - PRO & CON - READERS RESPONSE

3. Require 3 NHPA tournaments for STATE T entry.

They have also been paying the State 50¢ per pitcher at each tournament for several years. This has probably amounted to a few thousand dollars for our computer. This proposal would be very unfair.

We have some members who vehemently opposed forced membership in Wisconsin much less National horseshoe associations - you certainly are aware of Carl Joppe's feelings. As for me, I have mixed feelings. I'm aware of the importance of a strong and united organization where each participant is a part and supports the sport; but I am also aware of the tenuous state of horseshoes in our area and feel placing too many conditions and requirements (money included) turns people off before they get into the sport. Even without the NHPA/WHPA sanctions, Green Bay organized horseshoe is in dire straits

I may be fence-straddling, but I like both the idea of sanctioned and open tournaments and further feel that the 50¢ fee for recording tournament averages with the state should include everyone who pays the fee regardless of the type of tournament. (Whew! All this for that?!) And, Everyone should pay the 50¢ fee so sandbagging and other confusions faced by tournament directors can be avoided. Those who plan to attend the World Tournament can be selective and enter sanctioned tournaments required by the NHPA.

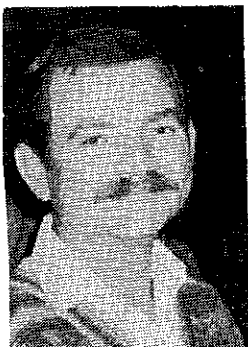

Spring meeting, March 20th 1993. Will you be there? Some important decisions on the direction the WHPA is going, will be made. The proposed changes to the WHPA Constitution will be voted on, at that time. Be you for, or against, the outcome will be the same for all. We will still be the WHPA after the meeting is over. My views on the proposed changes mean very little. You, as WHPA members must make this decision. To do this you MUST be at the Spring meeting. See you there.

I have at this time entered my name as a candidate for the office of 5th Vice President of the NHPA. I believe as WHPA members you should know that I do not intend to brake a promise I made to the WHPA membership. I said some time back that I would except the office as WHPA president for as long as I was wanted or that I could still help contribute to our growth. I still have unfinished business. As the office of your president is up for election this fall, I do plan on running for another 2 year term. If I should win the NHPA office I feel I can remain on as the WHPA president if the members so vote. I have but one goal and that is to promote the sport of horseshoe.

The subject of State Tournament trophies was in the last issue of the newaletter. Trophies are expensive dust collectors for some and prized by others. I will open it up for discussion at the Spring meeting. In an 8 man class, one first place trophy and cash for 1st, 2nd and 3rd sounds good to me. I feel this would make the State tournament trophy a more prized possession. We can bounce it around at the meeting and see what comes out.

My rule for the day. I have it asked every year and it happens more in sand than clay. You pitch your two best shoes of the tournament, last two shoes in a 50 shoe game that has you down by 4 points. Two ringers now lay around the stake as your opponent takes

aim. First shoe gone, nice open shoe but looks to be short. One more miss and you win. Now the last shoe is pitched, 4 feet short, out of the pit, foul shoe, you win. But wait, the shoe bounced to the stake and took off one of my ringers. His first shoe is now closer than my once was ringer. Who won the game? Do you know?

Rule 9 Foul shoes: Section d: When a foul shoe disrupts the position of a shoe in fair territory, the foul shoe is to be removed from the pitching area and all other shoes are to remain as they are.

With all shoes remaining as they are, I get one ringer, three points and lost the game by one point. It may not sound fair but that is the RULE. No shoe can ever be put back to its original position after being moved by a foul shoe.

MINNESOTA with more pitchers than any other northern state must have an indoor facility for their State Tournament. Because they start pitching Friday evening allows time for the State Meeting and a banquet Sunday evening. Their \$20 entry fee is designed to cover only necessary expenses as there offer 3 trophies but no cash awards. Championship classes pitch two days in the same qualifying format tried in Wisconsin for the past two years. Champions of the year are determined as result of the last shift - Monday Noon. Len Lipovsky, NHPA regional director of Minnesota corroborated this report and is one Minnesotan wishing there will be some cash award in Minnesota's future State Tournaments.

MICHIGAN has a State Tournament unto itself. Although membership is smaller, they enjoy a participation rate of fifty percent. One reason may be that each pitcher pays two dollars toward State Tournament entry at every regular tournament making the forty dollar entry at State easier. Preliminary expenses are met with two dollars of member's annual dues. \$7000 in prize money and trophies add up to one of the big money tournaments in the country. All class-champions earn \$150. 63% of entrants win cash. The big bonus is all classes pitch two days. Many pitchers enter more than one division; (ie. mens and intermediate). Fred Smith, WSHPA president, who provided this data, is tournament director and each board member is actively involved.

ILLINOIS starts its State Tournament with Friday evening doubles - has a separate entry fee and serves as a warm-up for the championship class which goes on to pitch three more days. The Association asks for a bid of \$500 to \$1000 for added prize money in the championship class. Last year the men's and women's State champs each received \$200. \$100 went to the 70+ Champion. In other classes five dollars of the \$25 entry covers trophies, the remainder goes into the prize fund and remains in class. Bob Switzer, Sec-Trea. ILSHPA further described in his account that the 3rd V-P is automatically State Tournament director and works in conjunction with

the Sec-Trea. in setting up the seed, schedule, cards, and charts. Looking to the future, the 18-man class size may be trimmed and the doubles match may be switched to a different weekend.

IOWA has the State Tournament during the State Fair lasting 10 days near the end of August. IHHPA Sec-treasurer, Cliff Kenny, who provided this information, receives all entry fees and turns them over to the Iowa State Fair and they take it from there. The Women's, Junior's, and lower Men's class-championships are separate and precede the Men's Championship finals by one week. Every day of the State Fair they conduct tournaments geared to all competition levels. Entry fees are modest: Awards generous. Last place equals the entry fee. Men's State champ receives a plaque plus \$110. This year they tried 6-man classes because the 20 courts are set in heat gathering asphalt. Kenny thinks they run a pretty good tourney but is concerned that only a third of the members enter.

INDIANA has an indoor facility near Indianapolis of 18 courts. It is the traditional site for the State tournament. The combination of \$15 entry fee and cash awards is speculated to be a direct result of the availability of that indoor site. All quantities shown above are hopefully self explanatory and obtained through the courtesy of Jim Shilling, NHPA Regional Director. The Association runs the show.

WISCONSIN attracts 43% of its membership to the State Tournament - more than some; less than others. This six state average is 37%. No court minimum exists but a facility of less than 13 lighted courts would be refused. Minnesota is the only other state awarding three trophies and only trophies. Cash awards require increased entry fees and or a benefactor. Wisconsin has found it necessary to offer tribute, \$3/entry, to attract a host club. Hands-on administration falls to the host; not to the WHPA executive board. Five of these State Tournaments occur Labor Day weekend. Only two are regularly indoor.

Volley-ball continues to be the main thrust at the Watering Hole but horseshoe pitchers continue leagues two nights of the winter weeks on the upper indoor courts.

Steve Wiegert, ace Watering Hole pitcher doesn't write often. Sometimes it helps to twist his arm a little. When he finally gets his pen going its hard to quit and well worth it. He says it like it 'were'.

"Jim, I promised you a wrap-up of our '92 Summer league if only because of the amazing performance(s) of Hall-of-Famer, Carl Joppe. As you can guess, Carl and team of Ken Koehn, Dick Baeten, and Jack Brooks took first. The reason I say "amazing" is because Carl won 75% of his games in a handicapped league and averaged 61.9% - in mostly less than desirable conditions. He was hobbled by a bad knee number one; but as you well know, the pitching conditions this past summer were horrible - cold, damp, windy weather just about every Thursday evening - and under difficult lighting once darkness set in. Despite all this, Carl pitched three games of 80% and twice that number in the 70% range. He had the highest scratch league average of 106 (50-shoe count-all) including a single game of 130 points, meaning he scored on all 50 shoes - 40 ringers and 10 single points. When you see these terriffic stats, and then see that its Carl Joppe, there is a tendency to say that is to be expected of him - not this time - for anybody under those conditions and his knee, and remember, even though he's a kid at heart - he's no kid! Amazing!

Did you know that 50 percent of all horseshoe pitchers average less than 31 percent? - Or that over 51 percent average will put you in the top ten percent in the World?

These tournaments are the same as last year; 21 point doubles, 16 teams. Its a full house. There's just one shift as a round robin with lunch break takes about 4½ hours. Cash awards go to half the field. The entry fee, raised this year, is \$15 per team.

Wins determine placement. Points earned are recorded and break ties although only 21 points are credited per win. When in Rome etc., etc.

Some of those 21 point games get tough. Bun Carley and Ron Yttri pitching a combined average of 55% managed only 1 point against an otherwise

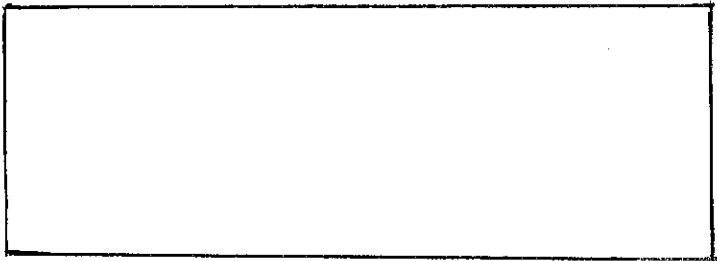

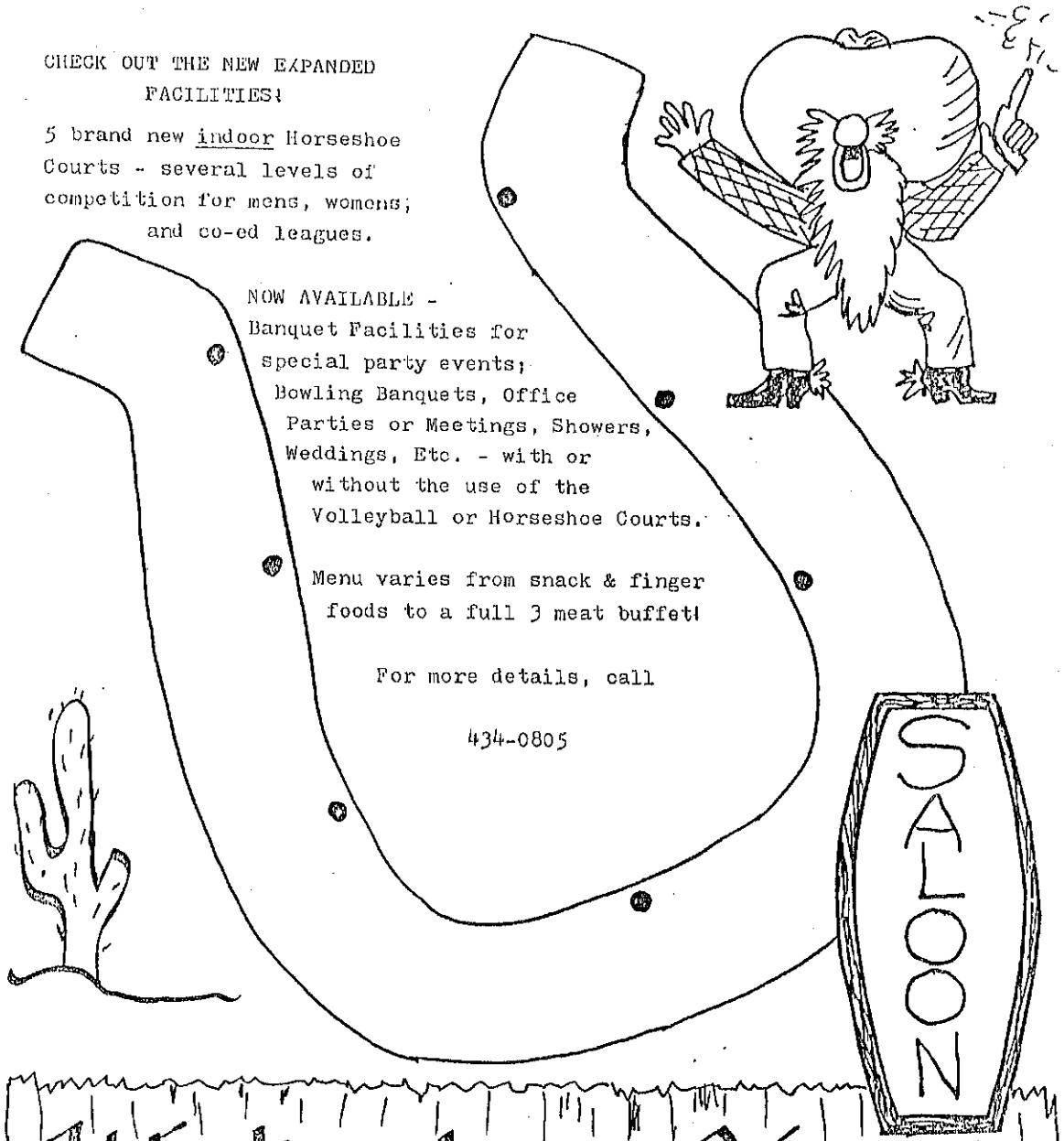
