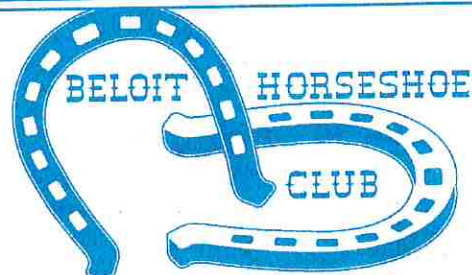

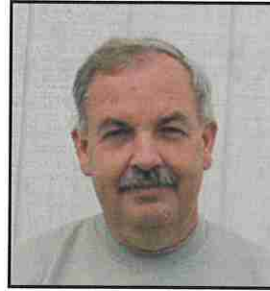

And The President Says

Happy New Year to everyone. I hope you got everything you wanted for Christmas. I hope you got horseshoes and that you have the urge to try them right away. In that case, Arena, Deansville, and Beloit can help you out with indoor pitching. Call early because there are limited entries for the tournaments.

Check this issue for your year-end average for 2005, and pick a partner for the State Doubles tournament. Your entry has to be in soon.

This year is by-law change year. I realize not everybody can be at the spring meeting on March 18th. If these are topics that are important to you, try and be there:

We will be discussing State tournament issues. One topic is the entry requirement of three tournaments for elder pitchers, the same as all other adult pitchers. Also, the two-year trial of 40-shoe classes is up, and we want to talk about how everyone liked or disliked it now that we've had a chance to try it out. There is also a proposal to eliminate scorekeepers at the State tournament, to save money for the host club.

There is also a proposal to add a year's newspaper subscription to the cost of membership, meaning when you renew your membership you also renew your newsletter subscription at the same time: \$17 for the membership plus \$8 for the newsletter. There will only be one newsletter per household, so if you are the only WHPA member in your house, your cost is \$25, the same as it is now. If there is more than one, only one member will be charged the \$8 for the subscription. This change will be a lot of work for the publishers, but they are willing to do it to get circulation numbers up. In my opinion, \$25 is a bargain price for a quality newsletter and a membership. What other organizations are cheaper?

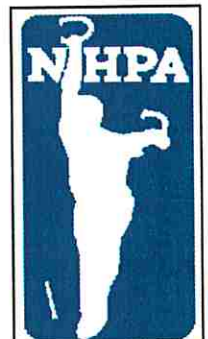

Some years ago, perhaps 20, we entertained the largest number of participants in the State tournament at Marshfield. So many that it was tough to manage and during the evening convention meeting at that event, the members voted to require NHPA membership for all future State tournament participants. The free ride for woodwork pitchers would no longer exist.

Within a few more years we adopted an entry requirement of two, now three, sanctioned tournament experiences to enter the State. The purpose stated was to promote participation in sanctioned tournaments throughout the state. Except that there were few sanctioned tournaments at that time.

It was done to limit the State Tournament. There is no argument that the entry requirement eventually increased normal sanctioned tournament participation but at the same time the minimum entry requirement does limit entry in the State tournament.

It may be to our benefit to relax the State entry participation requirement for a few years and survey the results. Observe the number of all tournament entries and the difference, if any, in State Tournament entries.

It has been mentioned that the practice of no playoff and winner by ringer percentage is unfair to the lower seeded pitcher yet I, for one, still subscribe to no playoff format. We all accept the fact

that the number one seed plays his way through the round robin by playing the last seed first, the easiest game or warm-up, and so on. We also accept the fact that the first pitch goes to the last score. Its not losers pitch first. The top dog gets his respect and if you are lucky enough to beat him on the way up make sure you also equal or beat his ringer percentage too if you want the tournament champion patch.

The sign-up sheet for the 001 tournament was out. Jeff Gustafson signed up and was about to pay when his girlfriend looked flustered and started saying but, but, but... A few minutes later she explained privately that she had a surprise party planned for Jeff's fiftieth birthday same day as the tournament. We agreed to tell him it was all filled up. SURPRISE!

Pete Kumlien, the WHPA contribution to the Birkebiner showed pictures of an Australian ski trip he made in August and when approached to play a January horseshoe tournament, said no thanks, I'll be in Pravda.

The Mouse, Norm Beckius, wants to make a rule change in the foul shoe category.

If an errant shoe would first hit the wood perimeter of the pit and then strike a close shoe causing it to then become a ringer, the mouse wants to pull both the ringer and the foul shoe declaring that the shoe was foul when it struck the wood and should be out of play from that point on.

The way the rule stands now the ringer would be valid and count towards the score.

He may have more rule changes in mind as he is lobbying to become a delegate at the Gillette convention.
