

## WORLD TOURNAMENT - GEORGIA

The Men's and Women's World Champs were determined in the last game between seed #1 and seed #2.

The Women's #1 seed was Tari Powell from Illinois with 82.5% and #2 seed was Diane Cantin from QU, Canada with 77.5%. They were both undefeated going into the last game. As the game moved along Cantin had the lead 24-12 after 54 shoes. Powell then took over scoring the next 27 points to lead 39-24 and go on to win, 42-27. In Powell's drive to overtake and win over Cantin she had 38 ringers out of the last 40 shoes of a 92 shoes game. Powell averaged 83.1% and Cantin, 81.4% for the 15 games.

In the Men's division #1 seed, Walter Ray Williams Jr. from California with 92.2% and #3 seed Jim Knisley of Ohio with 82.8%, Knisley was changed to #2 after the second round. Williams and Knisley each had one loss going into the last game. Knisley won 43-24 in the 76 shoes game. Walter Ray Williams Jr. averaged 85.8% for the 27 games and Knisley, 82.6%

In the Boy's Championship, Jim Walters went undefeated with 84.9%. Wisconsin's Mark Mauthe ended up 11th with 62.4%

In the Junior Girl's Championship there was some controversy as to only 6 girls in the championship group. After some complaints from the girls, as well as other people, the council decided to move up two girls. One of the move-ups was Renee Sternberg of Richfield, WI. Renee pitched her way to second place and a \$300 scholarship award with a sparkling 48.8%. This is her last year in Juniors. Renee also placed second in the championship class last year. Celeste Polak, Texas won the Championship with 66.4%.

### NHPA CONVENTION

Georgia's spokesperson came to the meeting with the announcement that they were short \$35,500 of their bid money of \$40,000. He went on to say that they had bad business relations with two promotional companies that had promised to secure the money. He also said that the NHPA must take some of the responsibility for the circumstances, because of a difference of opinion whether he could go to the manufacturers of horseshoes. NHPA President, Dave Loucks said that of this past January, he was told by Georgia that there were no problems. We had visited with Sandham and he said all commitments would be met, they (Georgia) dropped the ball.

The bottom line being there would be no prize money for the championship groups nor a scholarship fund for the Juniors.

After much discussion the delegates voted 225 to 91 for the NHPA to make up the difference of \$35,500.

To protect the NHPA in the future the 1992 bid contract will read that 75% of bid money shall be in the hands of the NHPA six months prior to the tournament. Payments every six months will be met over the interim period.

Columbus, Ohio was the only bid for the 1992 World Tournament. Their bid was \$46,000, \$4,000 for trophies. It will be held indoors July 13 - July 26, 1992.

Always a leading contributor to the Scholarship Fund, the pitchers of this tournament got behind an on site raffle to promote what they perceive as the future of the sport. Goldendale has a vested interest in Junior pitchers. Lorraine and Terry Sternberg donated a pair of 'Americana' dolls on a bench as the raffle prize. Jerry Nordlee added a shoe box to sweeten the pot as a second prize.

Don Kangas, former bridesmaid, won his first Goldendale tournament despite the efforts of Brian 'Steel-Eyes' Repinski. They were playing-off for the big \$250 award (from an anonymous donor) matching ringers most of the way. Steel-Eyes had 34: Kangaroo made 35.

Class "A" of the women's division at Goldendale is usually competitive: this year was no exception. They too were going for the \$250 first place money. In the last game of the final round, Gerri Meistad took out Joan Guetzke who had been hot on the trail of Lorraine Sternberg, the resulting winner. The waiting gals were struck with glee. There was kissing and hugging and tears of joy - all stuff only possible in a ladies only class.

Some of the "A" guys waiting to take the courts breathed a sigh of relief that it was not a mixed class. The gals are too good; they make it look too easy; and who of those macho' guys could take all those kisses?

May in Beloit is a gamble with the weather. This time they lost.

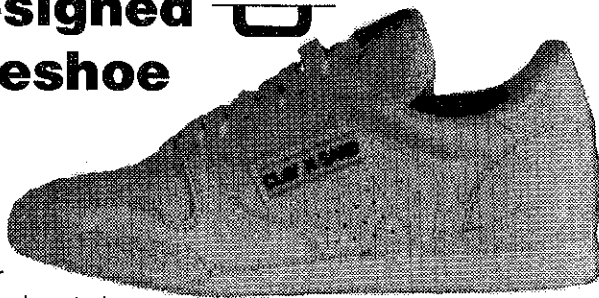

## Down And Back

We heard some rumblings in Janesville in connection with the construction of the new Moose clubhouse. The pitchers, being Moose members, are disenchanted with the plans to build with non-union contractors. Union is a way of life in Janesville and those pitchers are now wondering where they will be pitching next year.

For me Swen's Open in Green Bay was a washout. I had asked to pitch Sunday cuz of a wedding invitation Saturday afternoon. But the schedule said "Sat. 11:30 AM". The wedding invitation said "4:00 PM, Crivitz, Wis.". That's an hour's drive from the Green Bay courts. Always prone to playing things close to the belt, I opted to try it. The class changed to a nine-man but no problem - they changed my number from one to nine. My bye game will come in the last round. Ken Jaeger gave me the first game then the rains came and subsequently the whole class moved down to Combined Locks to finish it under Kamps roof. I could not go along cuz of the wedding. Gave my R.R card and my name tag stick to Jerry Gossens. He said he was pitching better in league and thought he could cut it "B" class. More power to him. I lit out for Crivitz.

First time I was ever an hour early for a wedding and naturally the ceremony was an hour late. While waiting around I took a little ride down the road and found a place in the woods where I could change my pants. In doing so I emptied my pockets onto the truck cap - cash, knife, everything. Half a mile later, turning off the blacktop, I heard two quarters and the knife hit the road. A small pile of loose bills remained. It had been larger - \$100 large. Back on the county trunk I picked up five or six bills. Only one was a ten. I was to find another ten in the grass after the ceremony.

I really think I recovered all or most of the cash but my little horseshoe pick-up hook was missing.

About a week later the results arrived. I felt like the man who wasn't there. It's one of the few result sheets I've seen without my name somewhere. It's worse than coming in eighth place.

There was a note from the director, Steve Wiegert, something about being jostled etc. and a check returning my entry fee, \$20. Things were looking up. Now I hope they can afford it. There's not much in surplus funds after a tourney.

In about the same mail there was a small package from Green Bay - my little horseshoe hook and a mate to it. Apparently I lost the hook at the courts and Frank Hanold found it. Returning it wasn't enough. He made another exact copy of it except the new one has my name cast into the handle. I guess he knows me - the loser. But how can you lose in Green Bay with those kind of guys?

I don't mean to say just because you pitch shoes you're a nice guy. But - I never met a pair of horseshoes I that I couldn't learn to like. And - if you've got a couple in your hand you've got a head start with me.

Rich Wisnewski of Arlington Heights, IL, was just a spectator at Edgerton's Tobacco Days. A heart attack of three months ago has kept him out of circulation. He keeps a summer place near Janesville and is often entered in those southern tournaments. Thirty pounds lighter and only forty-six years old - he ought to be good for lots more ringers.

Interested fans are a rarity at most Wis. tournaments. At Kamps the red and black result sheets on the big board constantly tell who's ahead. Get's the crowd into the game. Watching John Reitveld is a treat for anyone who has tried to do tourney stats and run the show.

Arch Johnson tried a comeback as a step-up pitcher. He and Skinny Olerman aren't bragging about their games but Ollerman has an acceptable excuse. How's a guy supposed to think about shoes on his fiftieth wedding anniversary? Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Ollerman were seen at the anniversary brunch dining on hamburgers and Pepsi-cola. Prosit!



Recipe for a Kewaskum tournament:

| 1 - Theisen    | (1 reserved)      |
| (herb variety) | 1158 cans of beer |

Other possible ingredients: any and all local types from Campbellsport, Kewaskum, West Bend, and environs.

Spread out the Bartleys on a large flat surface, preferably  $\frac{1}{4}$  acre, fenced. Use a Sabish to fill resulting spaces. Place Boegels (whole) here and there and sprinkle with remaining Struebings, save one. Put the Theisen with the Struebing (reserved) until well acquainted. Combine first group with catalysts Theisen and Struebing. Don't forget to introduce the beer.

Bake at 77° with some Sun; basting occasionally with a breeze. Sprinkle with dew drops until clouds appear in profusion. After two days when the Sun comes out again the whole thing should be done.

IMPORTANT - don't forget the beer.

Serves 101.

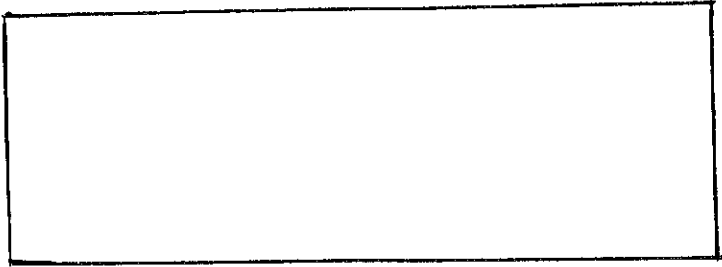

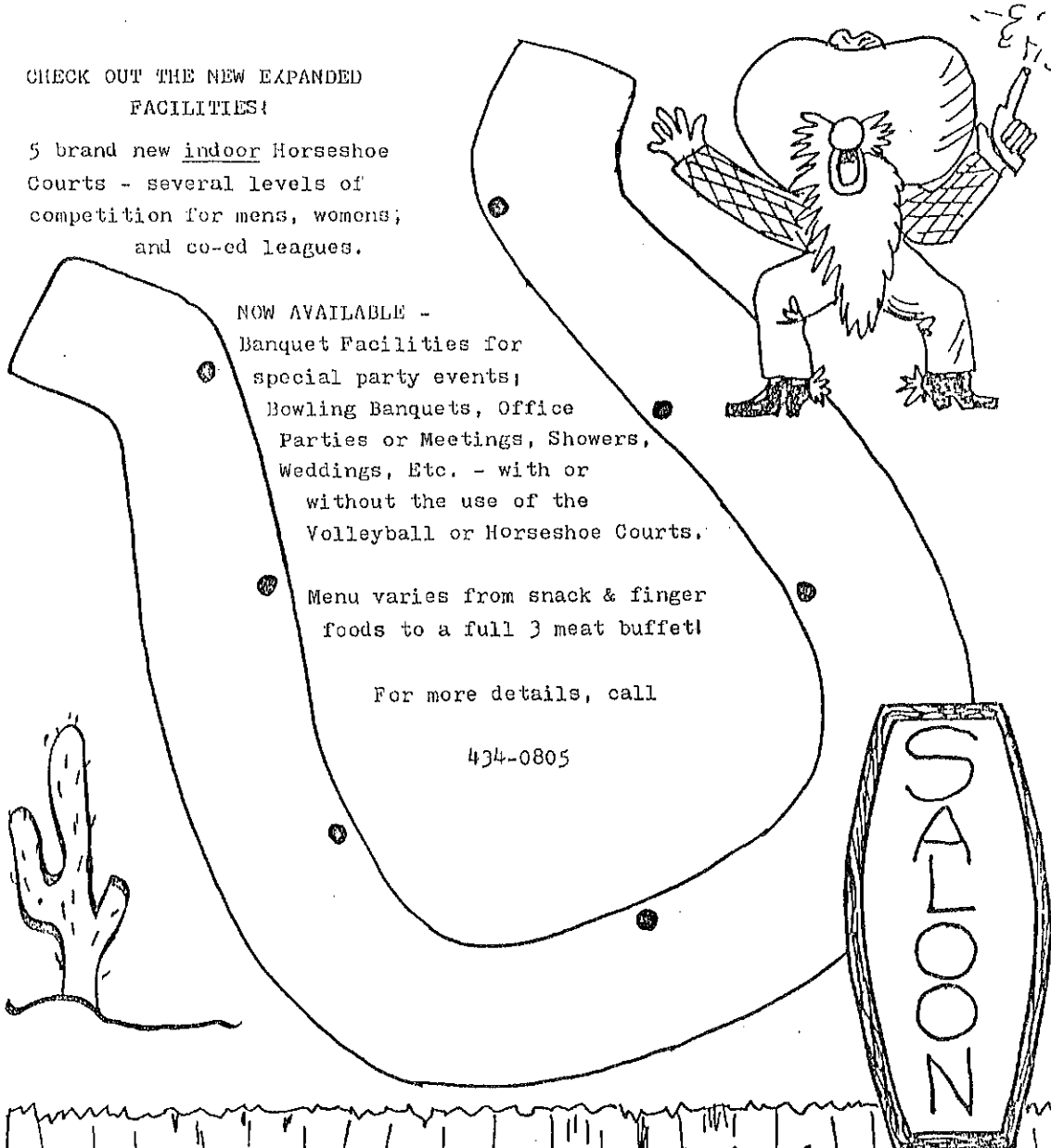
