

TEAM WORLD WILL BE IN WISCONSIN

THE TEAM-WORLD WILL GO AGAIN!

Early November, after some preliminary contacts, groundwork was laid to stage the TEAM-WORLD tournament one more time. Tom Roanhouse and committee had been active investigating possible sites for the TEAM-WORLD. It seemed to be dragging when Earl Paulson called and offered to negotiate with the City of Beloit for the Spring rental of a hockey arena called Telfer Park. Paulson enlisted the aid of the city's tourism director, Nancy Forbeck, in obtaining the weekend after Easter for the TEAM-WORLD tournament.

It's official, The Beloit Horseshoe Club, in concert with the Roanhouse committee, will host the sixth annual TEAM-WORLD tournament April 21st and 22nd at the Telfer Park expo building in Beloit, Wisconsin.

The 'Promoters', for the most part, are in uncharted waters. The loss of the Pitchin' Palace building for this tournament presents a major obstacle. The entire court layout has to be erected by the host club, most likely, with portable courts from Eau Claire. RealChenoa clay must be loaded and transported from the Pitchin' Palace. The clay will be 'on loan' and is still for sale. If the tournament is a smashing success, the promoters may choose to buy it. Many hands will be needed to move the clay. But the move will accomplish one thing - the clay will be out of the building and available for future use.

Part of the projected operating costs of the TEAM-WORLD, is the clay. Other costs will be NEWSLINE advertising, portable court rental, insurance, and the fee for the arena. Expenses peculiar to this location will increase team entry fees. Cash awards are expected to remain about the same. And will be generally be about \$100 times the number of team entries. Scorekeeping costs will be borne by the pitchers. The promoters are willing to work to perpetuate the TEAM-WORLD and do not see it as a profit making venture. In the same breath, they, who donate their time, do not wish to reach into their own pockets for expenses.

The City of Beloit has made it known they will promote the TEAM-WORLD as an area event through their tourism bureau and the promoters are proposing to the State of Wisconsin Tourism Department hoping they also will get involved.

Corporate sponsorship, at best, is a remote possibility but presentations will be made and it could happen. Beloit Horseshoe Club, although they just hosted the State Tournament, are considering to produce another tournament book.

Although they would rather remain in the background, the promoters need your input. Call or write: CEO., LEN MEISTAD, Tom Roanhouse, Susie Pritzlaff, or Jim Haupt in care of this Newsletter. Earl Paulson and Norb Beckius represent the Beloit Club.

TEAM-WORLD - A PITCHIN' PALACE CREATION

When the Pitchin' Palace closed it was generally accepted that the TEAM-WORLD tournament conceived and hosted by Tom Roanhouse would also be a dead issue. The event was too popular, too fine to be cast aside and forgotten. At least, one other state had visions of pirating the format and there may have been more who wished to continue the TEAM-WORLD.

Call it fine planning, astute foresight, or dumb luck the fact remains, Tom Roanhouse, of the Pitchin' Palace had one of the best horseshoe tournaments going when came up with the TEAM-WORLD.

It began, in 1985, as the CAN-AM, a friendship tournament-meeting of Canadian and State teams. Naturally it evolved with a much larger number of State teams, hence the name changed to TEAM-WORLD.

Last year three Canadian teams made their strongest bid competing against 15 other teams representing 8 states. This will be the sixth time that states enter hopefully their four top pitchers to vie for the title. The promoters are thinking of 20 teams this year. There will be more courts (16) but less time (2 days).

In a team round robin each team plays each other team one time with all four members and count one point for each game won within the team match. Twenty teams is an ambitious schedule even with a forty shoe limit. The number of entries will determine the final schedule but there will be constant pitching for two solid days ending with a ladder play-off of the top teams. The object will be to make the top five.

World champions and world-class pitchers will pitch for their state or province. They are expected to win but conversely it's more exciting to see an upset. This tournament should attract names like Phyllis Negaard, ladies reigning World champ from Minnesota, Dale Lipovsky, 3 times World champ also Minnesota, Sandy McLachlin, former W.C. from Ontario, Canada, Allen Francis, mens W.C. from Missouri Debby Bestul, 4 times a junior World Champ from Eau Claire, Wisconsin, Mark Siebold, twice W.C. from Indiana, Sid Anderson, 1987 Sr. W.C. from Janesville, Wisconsin, and we know our State Champ, Don Kangas wouldn't miss it. The top Wisconsin pitchers, Jane Smith, Mark Stevens, John Udelhofen and Kangas should team up for the TEAM-WORLD.

WHPA APPROVED

To lay all question aside, Dick Hansen, President, recently made this statement. "Those tournaments being held indoors this Winter, will count towards the State Average and the 'Player-of-the-Year' award; provided they follow the WHPA Guidelines for approved tournaments. 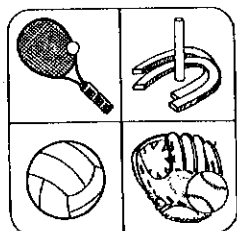

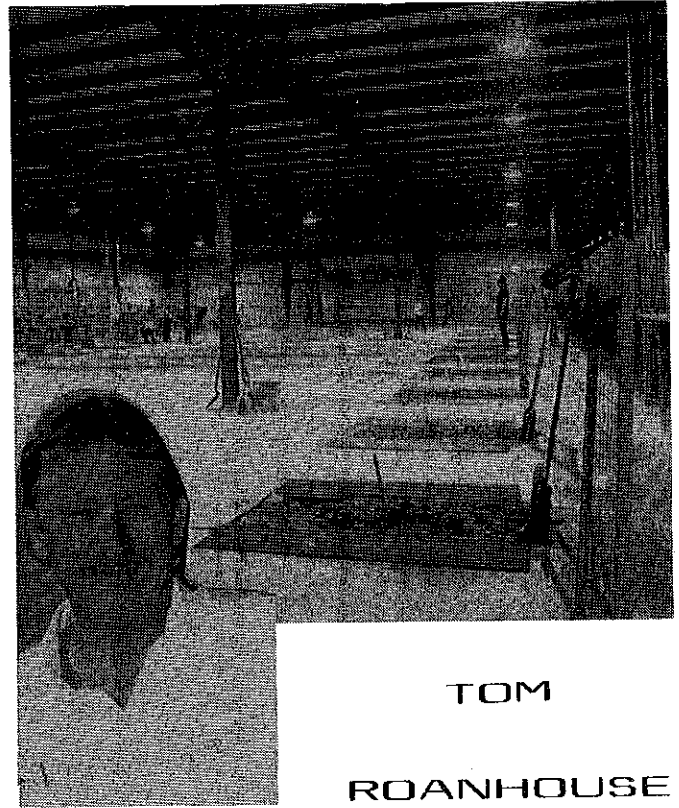
Now that Winter's here, we can't drive


Our club president, Bob Bennett, finished the league with a 59% ringer average this year. He doesn't compete on Sundays due to religious faith.

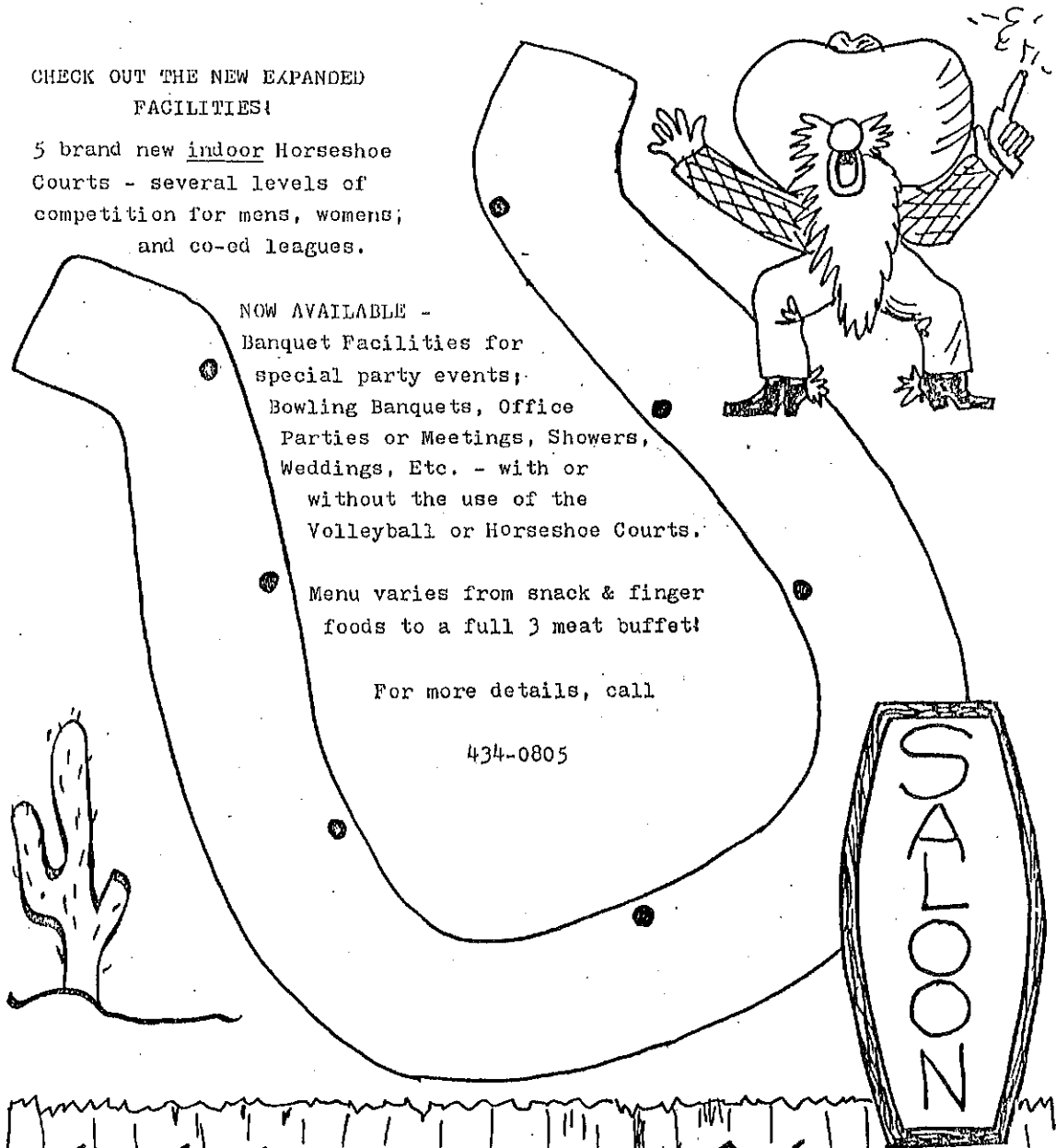
