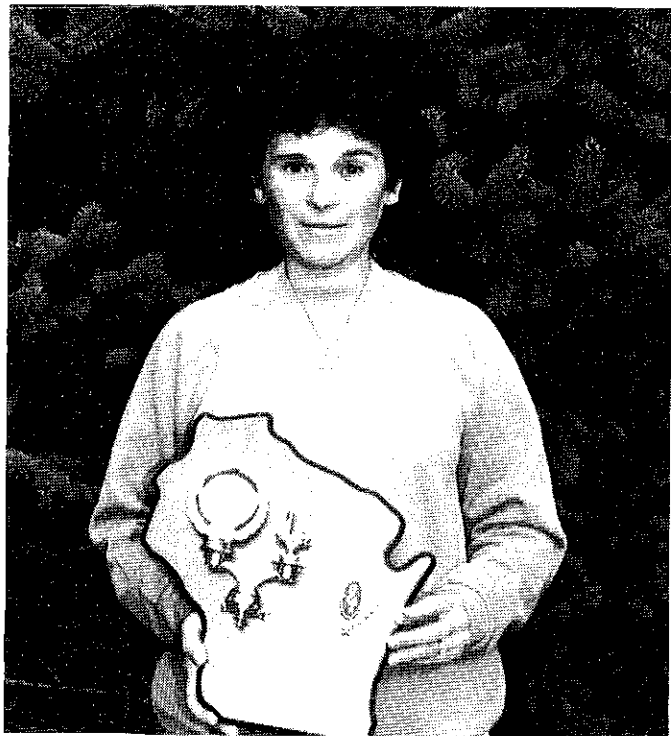

FROM THE PRESIDENT

I would like to congratulate the 1994 State Champions and the Eau Claire Club for hosting a fine tournament in spite of the rain and damp weather. A 90% game by Lorraine Sternberg and a 92.5% game pitched by Clayton Gage are outstanding under ideal conditions much less wet. But my biggest congratulations and thanks has to go to that group that sat out there in the middle of the courts, rain or not and kept score for each and every game. Only once did I see someone go to the spectators and ask for a volunteer to keep score. Without their dedication to the sport we could of been looking at a rain out. I thank them for doing a thankless job and doing it well.

At the State Meeting, October 22nd, I will propose a change in our State Bylaws. I do not have a final wording on it as of yet but it has to do with tournament rain outs. I have brought this up before in this newsletter so I won't go into details again. It will read some what as follows. "When a Sanctioned Tournament has to be cancelled due to weather or other uncontrollable events, the classes that are pitching at that time of the cancellation must have completed at least one half of their scheduled games in order for the WHPA to use it for your State average. All shoes over the minimum shall count to that average." I will have it written up for all to go over at the meeting.

Other items that will come up will be trust funds set up for Juniors that pitch in adult classes and win cash awards. We can also look for some discussion on putting money back into the SState Tournament. We will be electing two officers, 1st Vice President and Secretary/Treasurer .

I have a 6:00 P.M. appointment in Jackson, WI that same night so I promise not to be long winded. Hope to see you all there.

Randy Rein of Mosinee regained his third state title, in the mist, edging perennial rivals Don Kangas of Colgate and John Udelhofen, Barneveld.

Lorraine Sternberg, Richfield, (WI!), held on to her title but had to go to a play-off game with Debby Bestul on her home courts. The game was tight. We came close to crowning a new Champion until Sternberg eked out a one point win.

Penny Steinke of Waukesha, new State Girl's Champion, evened the score with the 1994 World Champion, Heidi Sternberg, Richfield, in a decisive play-off game.

Shannon Rein, Mosinee, son of the top gun, took advantage of a bad day for defending Champion, Jason Goldsmith, Janesville, and became the 1994 Jr Boy's State Champion with all wins.

Ralph Maylahn of Genesse Depot, defending Sr Champion and favored contender, was seriously challenged by Clayton Gage, Milltown. Maylahn continued his dominance of the Senior division earning his third consecutive Senior title.

B.A.D. Weather of Eau Claire, was the overall winner at the 1994 State Tournament. Rain delayed several classes while others chose to continue in varying degrees of the stuff. It was tough.

Upholding a new wrinkle this year, Class "A" winners moved up to the Championship classes. Thus it was with Roger Comero of Cochrane. In his second appearance, the Championship class, Comero won four of the nine games.

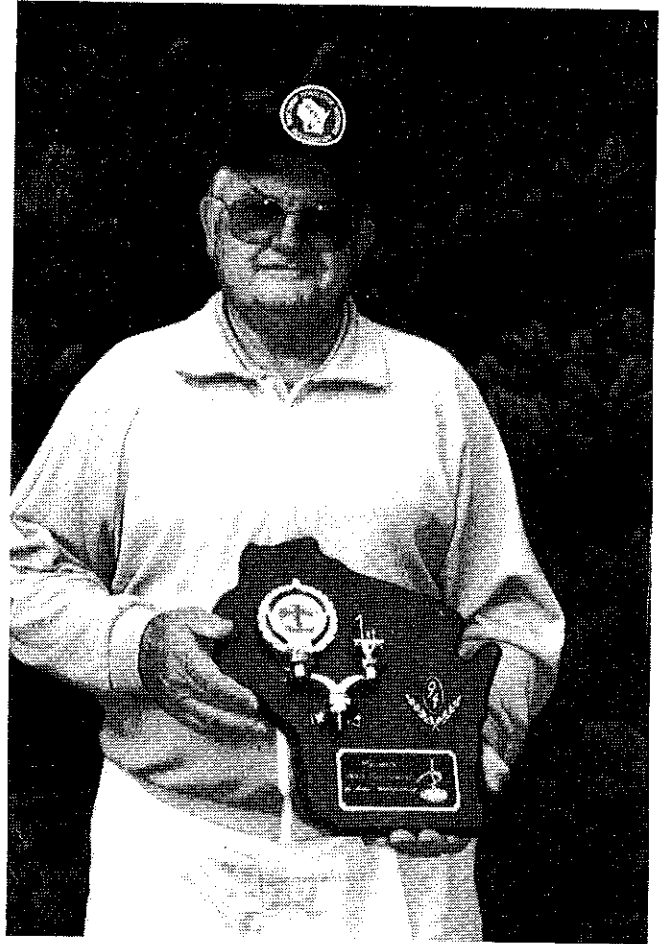
"A" ladies winner, Sue Helene of Webster had to win a four-way play-off for her chance at the top class. Helene used the opportunity to advantage and now ranks fifth in the State.

Lee McFarlane of Wind Lake won only two of the Jr Boy's Championship games yet brought home high average.

We have recorded the winner's names here and they will be forever honored as long as champions' lists are published.

However, as we publish champions' names, so we should publish the names of places. After the 1994 listing of The Eau Claire Club would follow the name, **Dennis Kieser, Menomonie, Tournament Director**. This was numero uno for Kieser who was perfectly cast for the job - a mild mannered man with the ability to maintain order under nasty conditions. 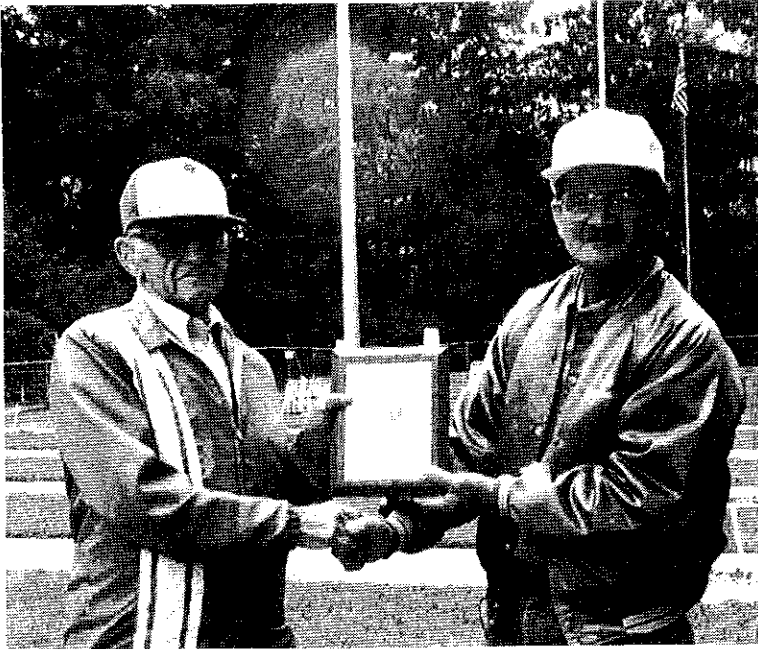
Presently there is no other listing for balance of 94.

**1994 WHPA Hall of Fame Inductee
FELIX KUBLY**

"Horseshoe Pitching is a Game of Friendship."

Felix Kubly was born August 2, 1914 on a farm a few miles north of Rice Lake in Wisconsin. In March of 1922 his parents moved to a farm south of Watertown. He had five brothers and three sisters. He helped on the farm and belonged to the 185th Cavalry for three years. On October 22, 1938 Felix and Doris were married. They have three sons, one daughter, nine grandchildren and three great grandsons. Kubly has been retired for 22 years from Motor Transport working there as a semi truck driver for 30 years.

In September, 1949, Felix took his family to visit his wife's parents in Fort Atkinson. A celebration was going on at Jones Park where Felix seen horseshoe pitching for the first time. He really got the bug to learn what it was all about. Some of the pitchers he talked to that day were Carl Pfeffer of Milwaukee and Joe Maddon of Waukesha. Joe inspired him and even came to his home in Watertown to teach him. By 1951 he bought two pairs of horseshoes and two stakes.

There were three courts at Riverside Park in Watertown where he got together with some fellows to pitch on Monday nights. It was not organized. Then in 1956, he and a friend went to the Wisconsin State Fair Horseshoe Tournament, but, they didn't do so good. In those days everyone had to qualify by pitching 100 shoes. Going back each year, Felix won his first trophy in 1958 in Class C. He was in Classes C, B and A at the State Fair through 1971, the last year a horseshoe tournament was held at the Fair.

In 1968, Kubly was asked by the City Park and Recreation Department to organize horseshoes for the Watertown City League. He and others built six courts at the park with clay and lights. The league is in existence today in 1994. Felix also played in the Tri-County Horseshoe League from 1959 through 1986. Over the years he purchased 131 pairs of Ohio O's for himself and other pitchers.

In 1974 while talking to horseshoe players about the need of a site for the State Championship for 1975, Kubly told them he would run the State Tournament at Watertown. Ralph Maylahn helped him in setting up the tournament for 104 players that year.

Felix's other interests include bowling, dart baseball and he recently started to play his accordion again.

The Wisconsin Horseshoe Pitchers Association is pleased to present this 1994 Hall of Fame Award to one who has shown so many others the pleasure of this sport.

WINDY HILL

Windy Hill, the Shangri-la of the WHPA, really exists. Its a hill and windy to boot.

The Windy Hill tavern caters to sports, volley-ballers, archers, and horseshoers. Gus Schram, noted local, acted as tour guide for interested visitors. He showed the indoor archery lanes which were set up full-swing and the two-court horseshoe location. The ceiling had been raised over the court section and was set apart from the archery shooting area. Conceivably they could operate concurrently. All this was housed in a separate building last used as a dance hall.

Meanwhile the horseshoe tournament was clinking on the eight brand-new courts. Looks like they carted in tons of crushed granite to create a flat spot on the hill. Within the fence, stakes are perfectly aligned and joined with concrete strip walkways. Players climb four or five steps to the stoned court area. Water, drainage or rain, will never be a problem. All construction facets of the installation have the stamp of professionalism. Located alongside the County trunk, these lighted courts are sure to attract attention.

Ken Kosky, the driving force here, had high class help. State Champ, Randy Rein acted as announcer until it was his turn to pitch. Then Steve Stevens, guest impressario, introduced the "A-40" class. It was evident the "impressario" had prior experience. And Marge, friend of Rein, had the everlasting stats job.

Five-hundred dollars of extraordinary prize money was pumped into the top classes making Windy Hill the richest, most rewarding tournament of the year. Both, the A-40' and A-30' winners were awarded \$250 each. That custom may have been for this inaugural year only but its for sure the tournament itself will be back and looking for an exclusive date on the 1995 Schedule.

Thanks to the Eau Claire Horseshoe Club for an excellent job of running the tournament inspite of the rainy weather.

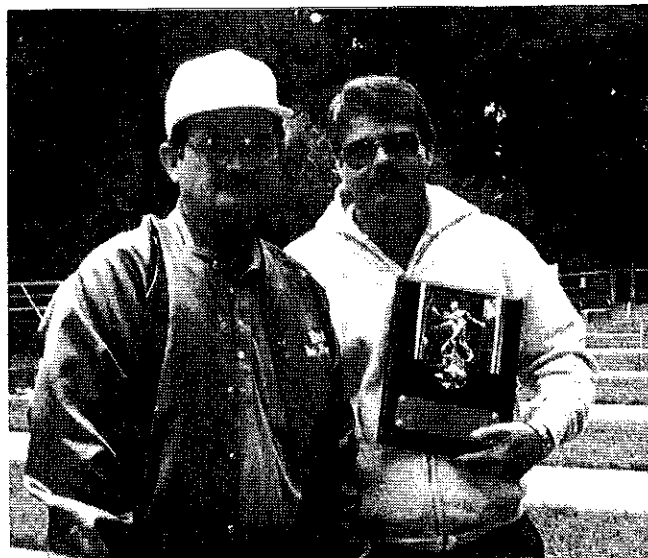

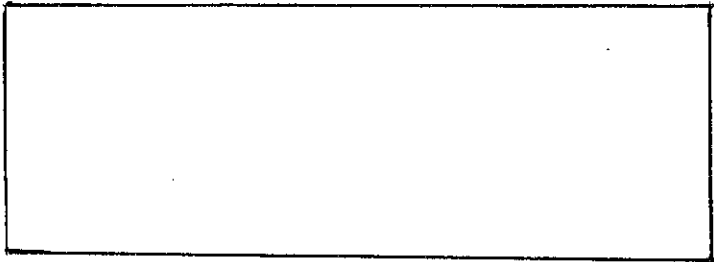

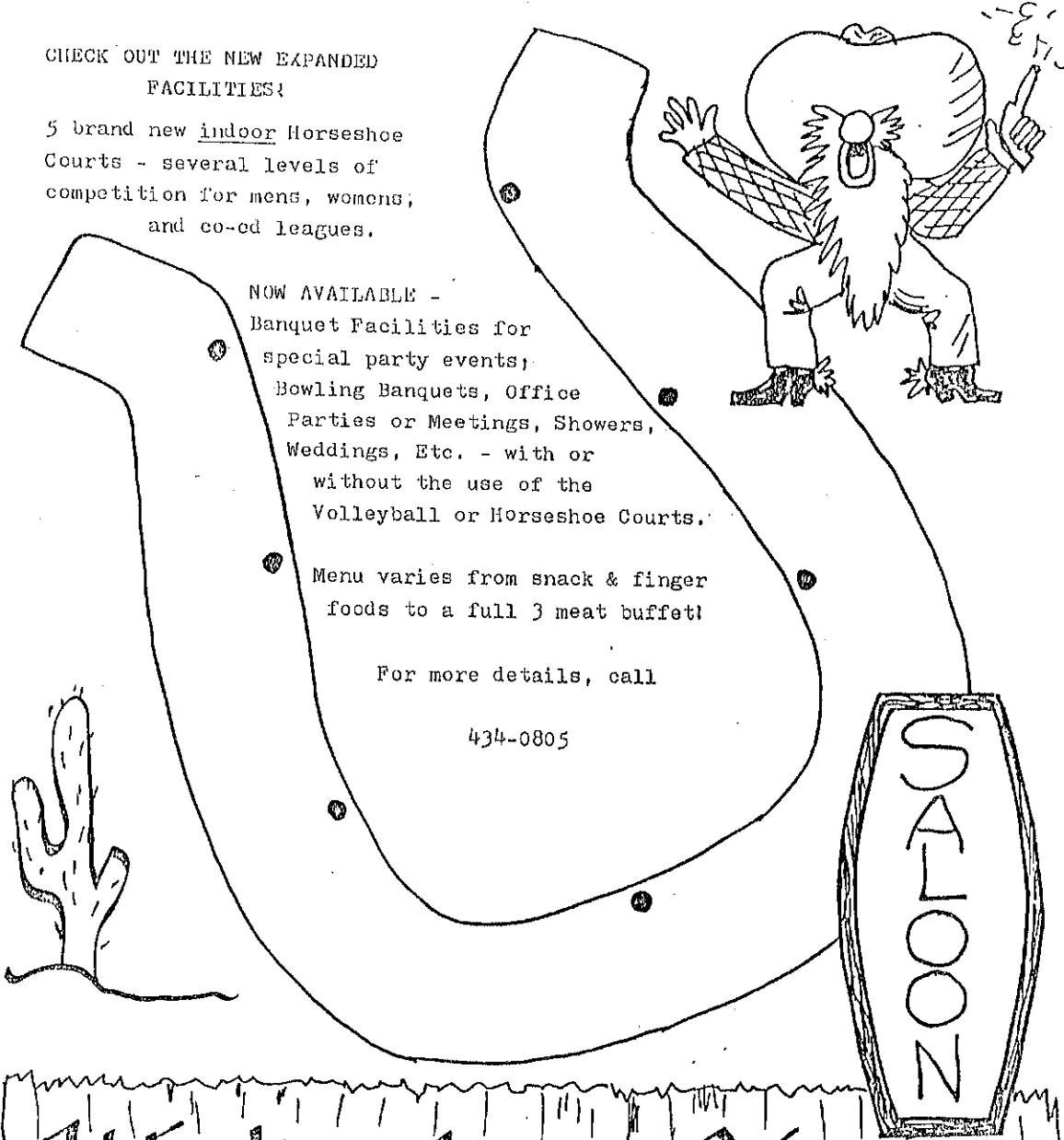
