VOLUME 7 NUMBER 7 JAPAN VISIT MARCH 1993

Condensed from the Jan-Feb issue of the Iowa Hawkeye Newsletter contributed by The 1992 NHPA, World Champion, Kevin Cone. In October of 1992 Cone toured Japan as a guest of the Saskawa Sports Foundation SSF is an 80 million dollar corporation employing 20,000 people founded by 93 year old Ed Saskawa. The purpose of SSF is to promote and develop new sports and activities for the people of Japan.

October 25. I arose at 5:30 AM...16 hours since Iowa. Had breakfast at the beautiful Tachikawa Grand Hotel just outside Tokyo where all the participating World Champions stayed. That group included Robert Fullford, 23, 1990 and '92 World Croquet Champion from England; Tony Allcock, 37, 1992 Lawn Bowls Champion from England; Snapper Pierson, 42, World Flying Disc Champ from San Diego, California, and four 11 year-olds from Washington, DC who were the Double Dutch (rope-jumping) Champs along with their Coach and two chaperons.

Tachikawa Park is a beautiful 120 acre park, the largest in Japan. 45 to 50,000 people were on hand. Four sand horseshoe courts with sand approaches were laid out back to back. I would show groups of 4-8 people, of all ages, how to pitch. They would all get to pitch down and back, two shoes each. In the two hours before Noon we ran an estimated 1200 people through those four courts.

At Noon we had opening ceremonies on the main stage. Two stakes were pounded in the grass in front of the stage but only 4-5 inches high. The good Lord was definitely with me as I managed to hit 11 ringers out of 16 shoes and knocked the stakes down four times. The crowd of about 12.000 was very impressed but I think they would have been impressed had I only made one. After watching the other demonstrations, I walked back to the courts for more teaching. Only then did I realize I had left my camera and supplies out on the bench in the open. I had been gone an hour and nothing had been touched. There is virtually no crime in Japan. There are two reasons for this: One, severe punishment and shame are received for crimes, and two, the Japanese are very disciplined people with crime not in their thinking.

We spent another day and a half in Tokyo. Had a 12 course meal with raw squid etc. at a cost of 47,000 yen (appx. \$400) each... We took a bus tour in which we learned these interesting facts of Tokyo: 12 million people, 6 million cars, 2.2% unemployment, 10 universities, no tipping — included in price, 45,000 taxis ~start at 600 yen (118 Yen per Dollar). One of the most expensive areas in the world: 10% state tax, 10% city tax, 650 sq. ft. two bedroom

apt. - \$142,000/yr. rent, 320 sq.ft. one bedroom - \$14.000/yr. and up. Salaries: Doctor, \$250,000; Professor, \$50,000; Nurse, \$25,000. Gas is \$5/gal. Beef is \$21/lb, and a loaf of bread is \$3.50.

October 28. Took the bullet train to the beautiful old capitol of Japan, Kyoto. Next day we taxied to Japan's 2nd largest city and site of the Osaka Sport Fair.

October 31. We held clinic introducing our sport to to groups of educators and recreation officials.

November 1. Like the fair in Tokyo we had groups of six pitching down and back – about 1800 people. Demonstrations and teaching created a tremendous amount of interest in our great sport.

There are a-lot of things I learned on this trip of a lifetime. Here are some major points we should all think hard about if we are really interested in horseshoe becoming the major sport I think it has the potential to be. 1. The consensus by all other champions and participants is that horseshoe pitching is the hardest sport in the world to master. The rewards should be greater for the good ones. 2. Horseshoe pitchers are some of the most overall talented athletes in the world as far as stamina, mental toughness, timing and hand-eye coordination goes. We should all be proud to say - "We pitch horseshoes!" and 3. (The most important) Change for the circumstances! What do I mean? I believe we can get TV interested in our sport by shortening the game to 20-shoe count-all games. Don't get excited. This does not mean change the game for local, state, or world tournaments. Example: in talking to Tony Allcock, the World Lawn Bowl Champion. lawn bowls has become the number one sport in England. He said it did not become so until recently. The reason - TV. A regular game of lawn bowls consists of 25 points. It works kind-of on a cancellation scale like horseshoe. An average game will last 45 minutes to an hour and a half, similar to a 40 pt cancellation game of horseshoe But, for tournaments that are on TV, they have gone to the 20-shoe format and it has grown by leaps and bounds. They still have their regular tournaments. He can play in tournaments every week that have 1st place prize money of between \$1,200 and \$26,000. he got \$46,000 for winning the World title. A lawn bowls instructor by profession, he is quite famous and wealthy. He was recognized by European tourists three different times while I was with him in Japan. He said the only thing that has changed on the local levels is that the facilities have gotten bigger and better. We should keep this in our thoughts if we seriously want to see our sport grow or, the alternative, remain hidden and not get the respect it and we deserve.

Hurray, Hurray, its the first of May. Outdoor pitching starts today.

TEAM-WORLD actually starts the day before the first of May. And with the great hockey arena, Telfer Park such as it is - canvas sidewalls, the May date sounds warmer. Think Spring. Think warm. Think of a warm TEAM-WORLD.

Teams from the south have been the first to enter. Missouri has entered two teams as expected. Indiana is returning with the same personnel. That means two 1992 World Champions, Karl Van Sant (Senior men's), and Sue Snyder (Women's), will be here. Iowa is home of the men's 1992 World Champ, Kevin The Hawkeye's are always well represented We hope the #1 guy will come with at TEAM-WORLD. Iowa #1. Top Wisconsin pitcher, Ralph Maylahn, has a commitment from Rich Pichler, Don Kangas, and John Udelhofen to be the top team from this state. Rumor is Jane Smith is working on her team - probable members: Edi McKinney, Mark Stevens, and Randy Rein. Larry Barber, runner-up to the 1992 State Champ has already entered the Wisconsin #3 team. Pro-bowler and popular horseshoe pitcher everywhere, Walter Ray Williams, has indicated he will not be on the bowling tour May first. He wants to pitch TEAM-WORLD. Hopefully there are three other warm blooded and willing Californians

Other states and Canadian Provinces about to enter TEAM-WORLD are like new car models. We know of states that will enter. We expect to be seeing some new models. They simply have not come out yet.

One week before TEAM-WORLD, Telfer Park will host the Wisconsin Club-Team and the Beloit Encore Tournaments. Saturday, April 24th, the Club Team will feature four person teams sponsored by clubs and counties in a day long tournament. Platteville, the defending champions, is expected to show up with the traveling trophy. The competition is really open to all clubs with A and B divisions. Entry fee remains at \$80 per team. The Beloit Encore is happening Sunday, April 25th on the same courts as Saturday's Club-Team. The 'indoor' scene and many courts should ensure an opening for any and all pitchers. LAS VEGAS 1993 OPEN

They called it the 10th annual Las Vegas Open. Donnie Roberts said it was a record number at the Hacienda with nearly 400 entrants who gambled alternately with the stake or in the casino. Don Weaver, co-director, who claims to be a former classmate of Roberts, guesses about half of this year's entry were first time Vegas pitchers.

After sign-up, official indoctrination was offered at a complimentary cocktail and hors d'oeuvre party in the Matador Room - cocktails yes; but strike the hors d'oeuvres as insignificant. Roberts laid cut the Vegas rules'. Shoes off the rubber count. Scorekeeping to be \$1/player/game. Ties scored as ½ win/loss. Use a piece of sheet rock to color the stake - no paint please. Classes will be 24 divided in 2 sections. Six per class will advance to stepladder finals based on W/L record. Then the hammer - games will be limited to thirty (30) shoes. A sigh of resignation passed over the room like a little gray cloud.

The feeling seemed; what must be, must be. Large entries on limited courts demand tight restrictions. Morning warm-ups began at 6:00 AM. Seven, two hour sessions per day had pitchers on the court until 1:30 AM. On hands committee control gave each new class about an hour to prepare. Some say the delays of the Columbus World influenced the wide open Vegas schedule. Scheduled start times prevailed. But, any more than one more class entering at the Hacienda would cause Directors Roberts and Weaver to come up with a batch of 30 hour days.

Sunday night, after all 18 courts were available, practice pitchers took to them in earnest, two to four per court. While waiting for a slot, this player renewed a few acquaintances. Saw Ken Pogue, Missouri pitcher of some renown. Pogue said his shoes were still a little off the mark — "How are you doin'?" In consolation Pogue remarked that horseshoes aren't everything, a guy should be thankful for just good health. Fifteen minutes later Pogue was stretched out off the court but down on the carpet awaiting emergency medical treatment. All pitching in the room stopped.

Early next morning we heard Pogue had a triple by-pass operation. And later it was announced that Ken Pogue was in stable condition and expected to return home in two weeks. Weaver passed on Pogue's home address; RR 3 Bx 134-C, Ellington, MO 63638.

Thursday morning the tournament was over for most. Six winning pitchers from each of the 16 classes warmed-up for the step ladder finals. Handicaps in the middle classes were slight - a point

or two. In the high and low classes handicaps came onto play.

Class A top qualifier winning 8½ of 11 games was Dave Loucks. He had to wait it out for while the other ladder games to be played off. Myrna Kissick of Alberta, Canada, a top seed recently playing in Arizona, qualified fifth but dropped the first "A" match to Edi Holland of Minnesota. Holland then lost to another thirty foot pitcher, Larry Riley of Colorado. Riley won again sending Marv Ellison back to Saskatchewan. Ralph Guffey of New Castle, Indiana stopped Riley and went on to meet the waiting Loucks. The two are similar pitchers — a nice high controlled one—and—a-quarter.

Guffey started by watching doubles. Loucks seemed to have the game in hand. A few bouncing shoes later and Guffey took the lead away and kept it. Guffey later remarked, We both had a good warm-up. The shoe felt good. But I got off to a poor start and then it became a matter of getting the clay. (Resilient synthetic does not forgive like natural clay.) Dave started losing a few but did get the clay back again. It was mostly a matter of who could keep the clay.

Finals over, volunteers began the tear down to return the pitching place into the banquet room. That evening most of the players sat down to dinner and enjoyed committee-man, Charley Johnson, do his humorous lead-off routine. Roberts paid homage to co-director Weaver with a marathon list of tournaments he has directed and continues to direct other than the Vegas offering.

Honored guests in no particular order were recognized. We had two 1992 World Champions; Karl Van Sant, Indiana, the Senior Champion and Art Sperber of Washington, Intermediate Champion. The Yukon Territories were applauded for sending four pitchers. The 15 committee people had another picture taken. Sharon Ellison of Saskatchewan was introduced as the CEO of Horseshoe-Canada. Four of the NHPA executive officers were present and worked the event.

Awards of \$50 went to those finishing in the top half of the class but not in the finals. All class winners received \$300. Second to sixth place awards ranged from \$150 to \$100 - And then, another round of winners pictures. Roberts declared the Vegas tournament to be the second largest prize money tournament going.

Somehow, it really was amazing, Directors, Weaver and Roberts, came up with copies of complete results! Following the banquet they passed them out at the door like a couple of Preachers biding the flock farewell

Weaver and Roberts have said yes. Plan for the next Hacienda, Las Vegas Open - January 9, 1994.

High individual game in Class D was 55% by Duane Woodard of Beloit. Terry Lokken, Beloit, had two games of 67% in "C". One of the 'Hansen Boys", Tom was best in "B" with a 70%. Jerry Weikert had a game 80% for the top spot. Winners, Arnie Walton and John Barden had high team game of 68.3%

Some of the guys, and one gal, pitched up to their entering percentages. Others blamed it on waiting for their turn. Suddenly all the non-pitchers felt they had a built-in meter - pitch two and walk. Since when do have to have a mind to play this game?
