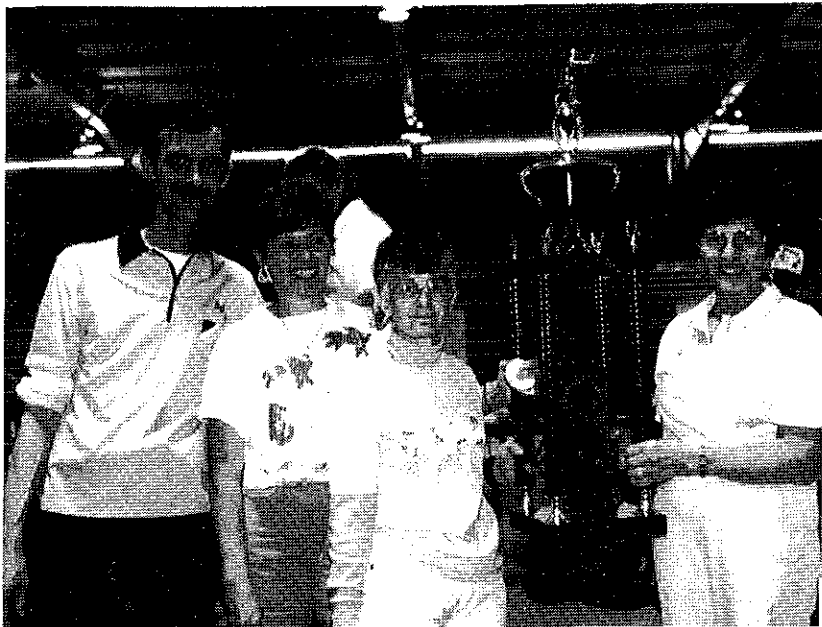

TEAM-WORLD BECOMES MINNESOTA BENEFIT

MINNESOTA   KENTUCKY   ILLINOIS   CALIFORNIA   INDIANA

Enjoyable and warm, May weather came to Beloit, Wisconsin along with the three day TEAM-WORLD. Sixteen picked teams played in familiar round robin pre-lims leading to a five team ladder play-off.

Minnesota once again demonstrated their depth of pitching power winning the 1993 TEAM-WORLD tournament - for the second consecutive year and the fourth TEAM-WORLD title in the past nine years.

Second place Kentucky, loaded with team talent and newly acquired resident pitcher, Don Titcomb, came within one game of the title. Some tournament followers acquainted with their indoor record thought this would be Kentucky's year. It started that way early Friday when they bumped Minnesota for 3 of 4 games.

Illinois entrusted the same four pitchers who claimed the 1988 title. They hit Indiana with authority in the first session and led the field for the day. Their eventual reward was; longest on the ladder (three games) and third place.

California let everyone know they were in the building when they surprised Kentucky for 3/4 wins in the very first match. Their lead man and top average producer of the tournament, Walter Ray Williams Jr., had one low game of 75%. Inspired, Northern California went on to fourth place.

Indiana made the final five but could not improve that position. The team of champions - two reigning and one former World Champion - Sue Snyder and Karl Van Sant, and Mark Seibold too, should have been

shown more respect but Team-World pitchers take great pride in measuring-up with the 'champs'. Of course the upsetters are not always successful. Snyder lost only one game.

For the record, two pitchers went the entire distance, 15 games, without losing - make that 16 games - Bev Nathe and Williams won each pre-lim game and also in the finals.

In spite of the first session letdown to Kentucky it became generally apparent Minnesota was going to the finals. In Beloit they are getting to know this team on a first name basis; Phyl, Bev, Lu, and Dale. Their role in winning this TEAM-WORLD title was predictable. There was more speculation over the fifth spot on the ladder than first.

The stats people figured a team percentage difference of less than one-half of one percent between the number one and two teams of the finals.

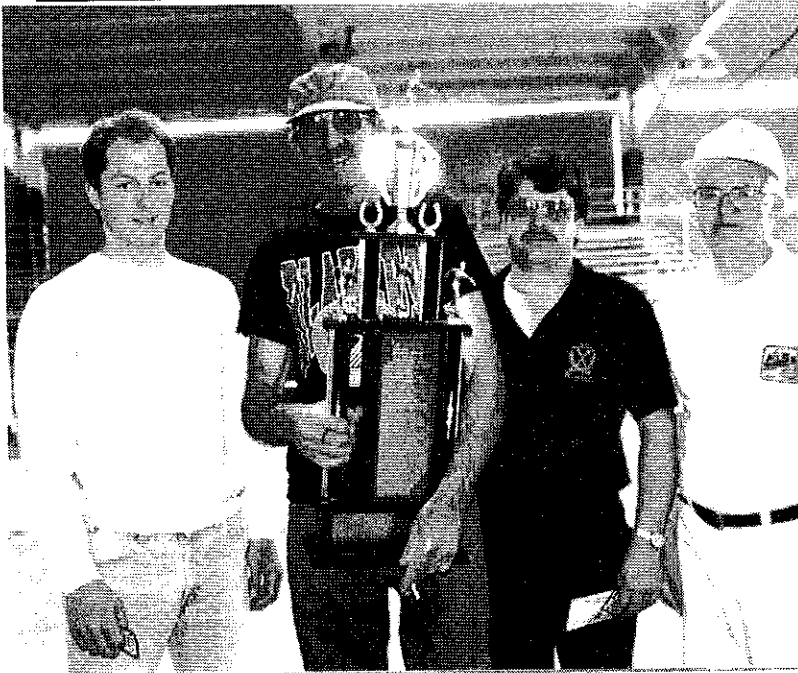
Besides the traveling trophy, Minnesota won \$1700. Kentucky's spot was worth \$900. Illinois cashed for \$650, California received \$450, and Indiana took \$300. In that final game, a pitcher pointed out, shoes were worth \$5 each.

Saturday night a few glasses were raised celebrating the engagement of Paige Pennington to Walter Ray Williams Jr. Not everybody was there to congratulate the couple and have a piece of cake but those baseball players didn't miss a trick.

A minor league farm club has lockers in the horseshoe building. Young infielder/outfielder types were passing through the party room coming home from a game. Some of the athletes found their way to the courts and were trying to pitch a few. The ringing of shoes off concrete became our first alarm. The baseball guy was trying a flip - not the worst - well, most of the time it was in the clay. Then he got a little gift most pitchers would kill for - personal instructions from WRW Jr on how to deliver a one-and-one-quarter. The young ballplayers reaction was typical. After a couple of trys he switched back to the flip!

On the way out the ball club took care of the cake. No problem; no leftovers.

Individual records, although important, are secondary to team production. Minnesota did not have the high average pitcher of either gender. They did not have the high team average. They simply won enough games to be first on the five team ladder play-off and they had the good luck to stay there. It does help to have the '87 Men's World Champ as the fourth seed on a four pitcher team.

Gus, what are you going to call this team you're entering?

Twenty days before the 'Club' tournament, the director asked that very question, laughed a little, and wrote, "Windy Hill".

Wonder if there's really a Windy Hill in or near Ringle, Wisconsin? Wonder if there's really a Ringle? Gus Schram, captain of the Hill people is hoping that winning Club Team traveling trophy will attract a couple more members. With six members, the club could come up with two scorekeepers.

Goldendale got beat by a half point - again. It happened last at the Watering Hole a few years past. There was one tie game in Goldendale's last match but back in the second round the 'Hill' did it to 'Dale' three out of four. It was the worst loss of the day for Goldendale. Madison also gave three to the guys from the Hill but.., the 'Mad Guys' effectively took Beloit out of it in the very first match by a three to one margin.

Incidentally - notice the Beloit team rosters contain some former Janesville aliens? That Beloit Club is making a big footprint these days - like the company farm.

G-2, the left -overs from Germantown, hit a steady pace taking three of four from each of their opponents in class "B". Their award was the same money as "A" but no trophy.

Team-of-the-Day award should go to Marshfield for their third place finish in "B" class despite being seeded dead last. Some players are still asking themselves, "Who was that Becky Bandt?"; although all three of Ron Zeppelin's teammates helped to hold up the team.

Only three players were fortunate or good enough to win all their games; Ralph Maylahn, Bill Schaaf,

and Emmett Whiting.

Complete results are not published as a free tournament service. About 23% of the entry covered that cost. [What an amusing switch it would be to accept a fee (like a small bribe) to eliminate some names from the results. More lucrative, I'll bet.] The weekend of the Club and Encore has become the testing period for the Team-World. This time an epoxy coating was applied to a few pitching platforms for the Encore, found to work well and was later used extensively for the Team-World courts the following weekend.

The Wisconsin Club Team tournament was just the lead-off for a popular weekend at Telfer park. The following day the Beloit Club hosted the 'Encore' on the same 24 courts. Near 200 pitchers made this Spring opener one of the largest horseshoe gatherings of any season.



\* \* \* \* \*

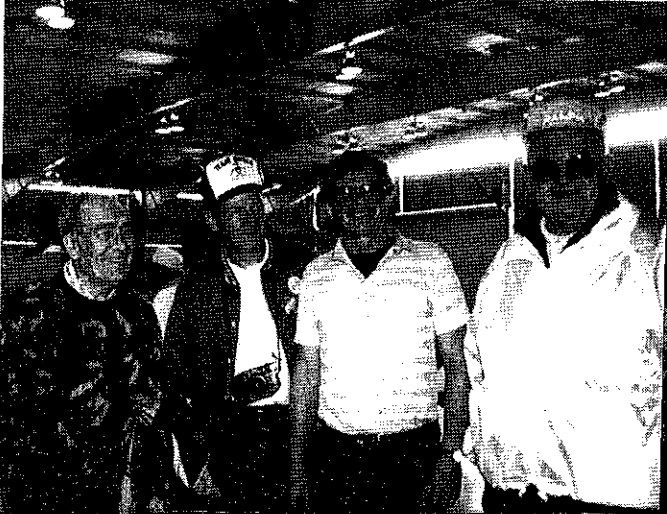

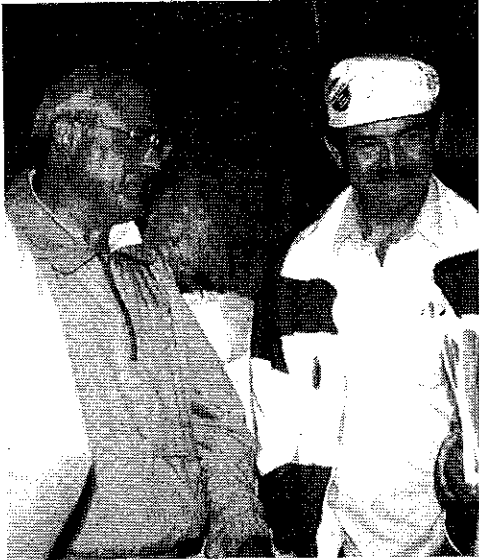

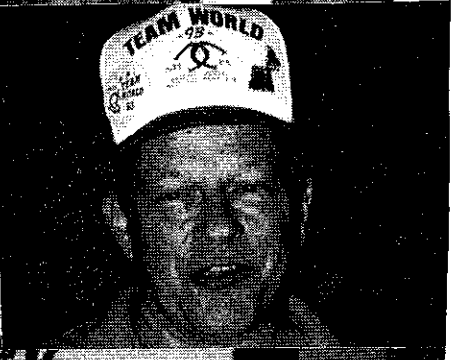

**DOWN AND BACK**  
WITH JIM HAUPT

Don Titcomb pitched TEAM-WORLD as a representative of Kentucky. Last year his card said Florida and before that it was California. He is well known wherever he goes as a World Champion of 1960 and still pitching today at championship class level.

At the TEAM-WORLD tournament he had this suggestion; "Somebody should invite Casey Jones to make a guest appearance here Sunday".

Earlier Titcomb was telling about the time he had just won a long 120 shoe game during a World Tournament many years ago and a guy came up and asked if Titcomb was all through with that pair of shoes.

Titcomb said he was and the guy said, "Good, cuz they're mine. Did you know you used the wrong shoes for the last game?"

Never did find out whose shoes were used but the game that caused the trance-like concentration was against Casey Jones. Titcomb said Fernando Isais had warned Casey shaking his shoulders saying repeatedly, "Watch out for the kid." and afterwards, "I told you, Watch out for the kid".

One look at "the kid's" (Titcomb's) white hair tells this incident was pre-1960.

It would be great to say we called Casey Jones in Random Lake and put he and Titcomb on the line but twice we got no answer.

Bartlen, past WHPA CHAMPION and present WHPA Hall of Fame'r is still president of the Washington Park Club. He says its easy when you have a good secretary like Al McGowan to do all the work. The pair have been directing their club for over twenty years.

Presently Bartlen is negotiating relocating the courts to an area adjacent to the Senior Center building.

Big court layouts can and do create scorekeeping problems. Players attending both the CLUB and ENCORE tournaments seemed to be aware that scorekeeping is a debt incurred and did take their turns with the pencils. Its a good way to start the season. Score more than half the games you pitch and you'll be the tournament director's friend for life.



## NEW WORLD TOURNAMENT RECORDS

There were several records broken at the 1992 World Tournament in Columbus, Ohio. This is a brief account of those records. [Editor's Note: here are two accounts of Wisconsin players, complete report in May/June Newslite.]

In the eighth game [Junior Girls division] of the championships, Annie Cote and Heidi Sternberg of Wisconsin connected for a combined ringer percentage of 74.11 when Annie pitched 46 ringers in 56 shoes for 82.14 percent against Heidi's 37 ringers and 66.07 percent.

The next records set [Elder Men's 30 foot division] occurred in the second round of the final night when Henry Hostetler and Ralph Maylahn of Wisconsin played. They had a marathon match which went 90 shoes to set the length record. They also managed 104 cancelled ringers to tie the record set earlier. Ralph Maylahn had 64 ringers to equal the previous records for ringers for a loser. It was interesting to note that Ralph had two more ringers than Henry, but still lost the game. It was in the last round of scheduled competition that the last of the single game records was broken. Ralph Maylahn pitched 35 ringers out of 40 shoes for an 87.5 ringer percentage which set a new mark for a winning percentage.

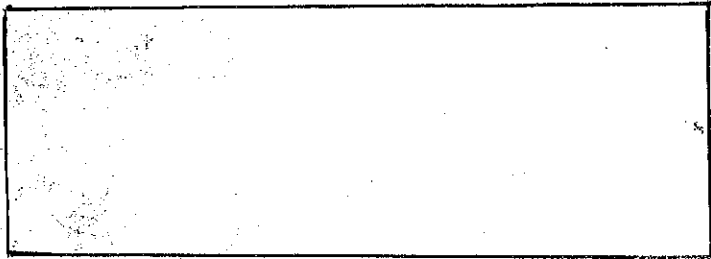

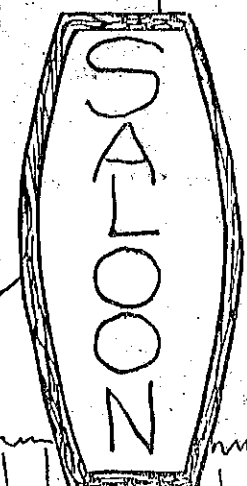
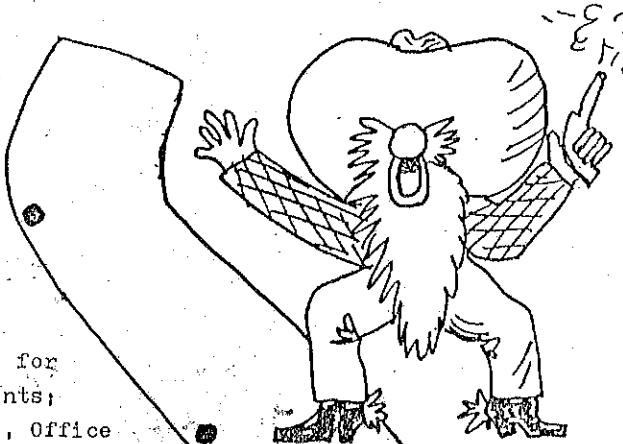
