EDITOR'S NOTE:

Elsewhere in this issue you will find "The Computer Story" by John Secord. John is the computer operator and the WHPA Secretary. It would be interesting to know how many or few other states have their pitchers on computer. In our humble estimation it is the single most important function of the WHPA to provide an accurate, readily accessible percentage on all horseshoe pitchers in the state. Repeat, - all, - not only WHPA members, but all tournament pitchers are on the computer.

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

It has come to my attention that many members really do not know how the WHPA works. In my conversations with different people I have found out that the majority of them actually think that the officers make up the rules for the WHPA that govern the State Tournament. THIS IS WRONG!!! YOU, THE MEMBERS ARE THE ONES THAT MAKE UP THE RULES. If someone has a question or does not understand one of the rules, then the officers will interpret the rules.

Rule changes are discussed at the WHPA meetings. There are two meetings a year, one in the Spring and one at the State Tournament. A notice that includes the State schedule and the date, time and place for the Spring meeting is sent out to all members each year.

I feel there is no good excuse not to attend these meetings if you are really concerned or interested in the WHPA. The people who complain about the rules are usually the ones who do not attend the meetings. All you have to do is attend the meetings and then you will have the chance to be heard.

There have been 2 rules that many have complained about this summer. The first one is the 2 tournament requirement to pitch in the State Tournament. To play in the 1986 State Tournament, you must have played in at least 2 tournaments during the period of August 1, 1985 - July 31, 1986. Also, these tournaments have to be on the State schedule. The World Tournament dates were put on the State schedule this year for informational purposes, so we will not be using World Tournament averages in this year's State Tournament because the World Tournament ended on August 2nd and the deadline is July 31st.

The second complaint was about not including averages from a tournament held in Beloit earlier this summer, for the State Tournament qualifying average. Since the tournament was not on the State schedule, it can not be used.

Many people have asked us to make exceptions to the rule. We will not do this. There have been several instances in previous years where people asked for exceptions to the rule and we had to refuse their request. This has been our practice. Some people may not like it but if we make one exception, it would be like "opening up a can of worms."

To get on the State schedule, all you have to do is inform John Secord as to when your tournament will be held. This needs to be done in January or February so John can get the State schedule out as early as possible.

Many people are against the 2 tournament rule but 3 advantages come to mind right now. 1. This will give a more accurate average for placement in the State Tournament. 2. This will help the entry in open tournaments as people will need to play in at least 2 tournaments. 3. We may also see more tournaments on our schedule which will give all members more opportunities to play in more tournaments. This rule can only help PROMOTE HORSESHOE PITCHING in our state.

Good luck to all at the State Tournament at the Pitchin' Palace this year. We have over 180 entries which I feel is just great. I am looking forward to seeing all of you.

THE COMPUTER STORY

Back in 1972, there was a motion past to use tournament averages for setting up the State Tournament. There was one slight problem, there were no averages kept by anyone to do this.

Again in 1975, it was suggested to use ringer percentage from three last tournaments for qualifying scores, but again no averages kept. For the 1976 State Tournament, ringer percentages were to be used but were not. Home court qualifying was used as in the past.

In 1977, I started to keep percentages on a card file from clay tournaments. At the 1978 Spring meeting in Berlin, I passed out average sheets compiled from the card file.

At the 1979 Spring meeting I was named to head a committee to study the tournament average program and give a report at the next meeting. My findings were that all clubs preferred the use of averages over the 100 shoe qualifying score.

At the 1981 State Tournament averages were used to set up classes for the first time. Sand courts were to be included in the averages from the WHPA schedule from now on.

The card file was no longer large enough to handle the averages so it went to an individual sheet for each pitcher. From one book it grew to two books and from two it grew to three and lining up pitchers by averages became a real task.

At the Fall meeting in 1982, Curt Bestul suggested that the State Association look into the possible purchase of a computer to help me continue compiling the averages. So after some suggestions on raising money and checking into the world of computers, our Apple II, monitor, two disc drives, printer and programs were purchased on December 5, 1983.

The averages are compiled on a Advanced Version VisiCalc program. From there they are transfered to a PFS:File program and printed out on a PFS:Report program. If there was a program to do all of this it would be great. With the use of the file programs, averages can be sorted from the highest to the lowest very easily. Pitchers can be alphabetized or sorted by zip code or any other way that I want. Membership is also kept on disc. Many different disc are used to store the information. I have assigned each pitcher a number and keep an index on all. This helps to find someone because of spelling errors. When searching, the computer has to have the exact spelling that was originally entered to find it.

In 1984, the Pitchin' Palace tournament averages were added and to date there are 1175 men, 302 ladies, and 105 juniors with ringers in the computer.

WISCONSIN WINS AWARD

At the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association Award ceremony in Ainsworth, Nebraska, Wisconsin won the award for overall increase in members (182) in 1985. The plaque was accepted by Curt Bestul, Eau Claire. It will be on display at the Pitchin' Palace in Sturtevant.

NHPA CONVENTION

"California here we come" was sung by western delegates leaving the 6 hour meeting. The bids for the 1988 World Tournament were: Huntsville, Ala., \$30,000, 3 votes, Akron, Oh. area, \$75,000, 87 votes, Pleasanton, Ca., \$40,000, 118 votes. The huge bid from Ohio and a promised facility was not persuasive enough for the delegates.

Wisconsin had 9 delegates this year due to our increase in National members. Delegates were: John Secord, spokesperson, Fond du Lac, Al Lonning, Curt and Beaty Bestul, Eau Claire, Randy Rein, Mosinee, Susie Pritzlaff, Germantown, Jane Smith, Balsam Lake, Jeff Secord, Fond du Lac, and Roger Poutanen, Schofield.

Changes or additions in the NHPA constitution and by-laws are: spokesperson from each state charter must be a NHPA News Digest subscriber. Each charter will have proxy vote for delegates not present at the convention, controlled or voiced by the spokesperson. World Tournament bids must be received by the National Secretary by April 15th of the calendar year, they will be published in the May NHPA Digest. Facilities are to be stated, at least \$36,000 for cash prizes, \$4,000 for trophies and miscellaneous, advantages also stated. The National President was granted travel expense to the World Tournament, plus a monthly allowance of \$100. Secy/Treas was also granted transportation cost to the World Tournament and Vice Presidents \$400 travel expense. Director of Regional Directors and Publicity Director, annual allowance of \$400.

As of January, 1987, the NHPA News Digest subscription rate for 1 year will increase to \$12.00. For every adult NHPA member in your household, you may deduct \$1.00 from subscription rate. You must subscribe for the Digest through the National Secy/Treas effective January, 1987 also. Secy/Treas, Donnie Roberts, Box 278, Munroe Falls, Oh 44262.

A stern warning was issued by Dave Loucks, NHPA President, to all state charters that to hold an unsanctioned State Tournament Championship, you will run the risk of having your Charter revoked. He announced that a special World Tournament Digest issue will be sent to subscribers soon.

The meeting was televised on the local cable network. Glen Portt, former National President made a resolution that the council should plan and report in 1987 on moneys to be spent for a National Hall of Fame.

- 1) The top 24 ringer percentage players entering tournament will be seeded into 4 - 6 - man Round Robins to begin qualifying for Class A and B classes.

Seeding: 1 5 9 13 17 21
2 6 10 14 18 22
3 7 11 15 19 23
4 8 12 16 20 24

- 2) A - First round of qualifying will be played 11 am Saturday, Sept. 13, 1986.

B - Second round of qualifying will be played 4 pm Saturday, Sept. 13, 1986.

C - Method of scoring:

A 50 shoe Count all will be used.

A breakpoint of 100 points will be used throughout first round of qualifying.

Any player scoring over breakpoint receives plus points; any player under receives minus points.

Points will be added throughout qualifying round.

Top 3 scorers in class will advance to next round of play until final 6.

3 lower scorers will be placed in Round Robins qualifying for Class B final 6. The breakpoint in Class B will be 80 points.

Points in this Class will be added to points scored in first round.

NOTE: It is possible for you to qualify for final 6 with minus points.

5 Bonus points awarded when you score over breakpoint and defeat your opponent.

- 3) If ties exist in total points when final 6 is determined:

A - Your Ringer percent will be 1st tie breaker.

B - If tie still exists a 30 shoe - Count All, sudden death match will be played to determine winner.

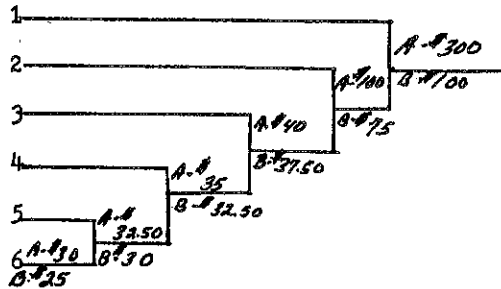
