TEAM-WORLD

There'll be, a bash in Boulder, maybe dancing in Denver. The guys from Colorado did it again.



Colorado interrupts the Minnesota stranglehold on the Team-World title with a three to one victory over Ohio. Paul Lacrosse eliminates the threat of Alan Francis who dominated the event previously winning all games including a perfect 40 ringer game. Amy Francis is only Ohio finals winner. Rich Pintor, Colorado, continues streak of never losing a Team-World playoff game.

Minnesota has to settle for third over fourth place Wisconsin.

Every team plays every other team on the 24 team schedule, 23 games not including the finals for a player doing full duty. Dee Powell, a short distance pitcher from Colorado ran the gamut showing just one tie game. Alan Francis was the only pitcher to go unscathed in the prelims. Amy Francis won 23 of her 24 games. Paul LaCrosse dropped only two games in total. Judy Curtiss, Michigan lost once the first day and only once more in the finals.

Teams put their wins together trying to appear in the stepladder finals. Three top teams go on the ladder, Colorado, Ohio, and Minnesota this time. Four more teams pitch-off for the fourth spot- Michigan, Wisconsin, Missouri, and Ontario. Wisconsin took the honors

but lost their fist ladder game to arch rival Minnesota.

As an added feature the published results this year show, in addition to individual percentages and team percentages, high games by individuals and the number of games exceeding 80%. Charlie Kilgore shows two eighty percent games. May be an indication why Missouri–2 jumped out to an early lead.

Perfect games at Team-World are rare. Cathy, Carter, of Iowa was the first when she was still active a few years ago. Alan Francis had been knocking on the door in this year's

87 yr of pitching

Horseshoe pitching was my father's favorite pastime so that's how I got started playing the game way back in 1914 when I was just a five year old kid. Yes I still have those little pony shoes, as well as all the other kinds of regulation shoes that I have thrown during the years that I have been playing this game. I also have many fond memories of pitching not only with the poorest, but also some of the World's best.

It is now three years ago, at the age of ninety, that I competed in the state tournament play for my last game and I can say that I didn't wind up in the cellar, although I was dangerously close.

Today-Oh! I still can get around and without any kind of aid, but no more horseshoe pitching for me. But I still like to talk about it. For instance, it was the month of February, 1974 that the then World's Horseshoe Pitching Champ was touring the country, pitching exhibition games with whoever might challenge him. When he was at Park Plaza, Oskosh, I challenged him and won. We pitched twenty shoe games. He missed three times, I missed twice. Lady luck was on my side, no question.

Back in the year 1932 I pitched in my first State Tournament, fifty point ringer cancellation games. As I recall it took about eight hours. To me, at that time, I thought it was more like an endurance contest, rather than a game of skill. Yup those were the good old days. Its been just great to have been a Horseshoe Pitcher.

Today I believe, that I am not only the state but the world's oldest living active horseshoe pitcher.

This year the State Horseshoe Pitching tournament will be held in Arena, Wisconsin and will be played on 24 outdoor and indoor courts. The World tournament last year was held in Red Deer , Alberta, Canada. This year the 2003 World Tournament will be coming back to Wisconsin.

Eau Claire will again be the host city—the same as it was back in the year 1987, when over 1600 horseshoe pitchers from forty-five different states and Canada and Honduras competed in respective classes. These were held on thirty-two indoor courts over a period of eleven days. I was one of those 1600 wonderful memories.


