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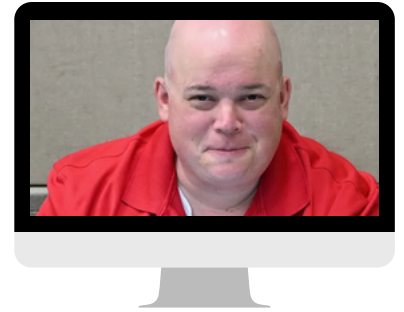

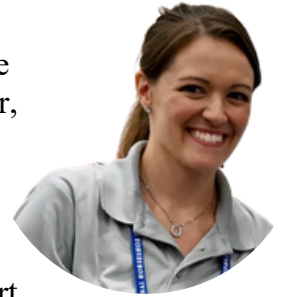
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Youth Activities in Wausau

Each month I would like to feature different tournaments, If you would like to have your tournaments featured in the monthly digest, please send me a brief email with the information about the tournament you would like to have featured.

This month I am featuring the Kansas Horseshoe Pitchers Association. This tournament was held in April. Congratulations to all of the winners. The tournament director Sue Campbell reported " We had beautiful weather for our tournament in Bonner Springs. We had 31 pitchers including 3 Juniors. We also had 3 new KHPA/NHPA members thanks to the recruiting efforts of Terry Johnston". Those 31 entries made this event the largest Kansas event to date this year. Fourteen of those entries pitched over average which is amazing. The highest over average was Michael Trinkle who claimed the Class E Class Champion patch after finishing the day with a 29% ringer average that was 15.43 percentage points over his entry average. Julie Bergkamp also had a block buster of a day claiming the Class Champion patch in class D with a 34.58% ringer average that was 13.31 percentage points over her entry average. Joseph Cisneros Claimed the tournament champion patch with tournament high ringer average of 66.23%.

Just to keep everyone informed of what is happening in and around the NHPA, I would to share some great news with you. We are currently working on an enhancement to HS Master that will allow the League Directors who use HS Master for your League Results to automatically upload the results directly to eshoe the same way as tournaments are sent currently, You will no longer have to send the results to me to manually enter them into eshoe, Your Charter RD will set up your League Event and send you the Event Sanction Number and Token Number, More details and training materials will be sent to the League Directors and Regional Directors before the enhancement is ready to be released, Just remember that when it is released, you will have to download the update for HS Master in order for you to utilize the new functionality.

2026 TEAM WORLD

The 40th Team World Tournament had a full complement of 24 four- or five-player teams entered from 9 different states (Missouri, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, California, Minnesota, Washington, Florida, Iowa) and Canada.

The full-entry-preliminary-round-robin started at 8am on Friday, May 15. That's right, all teams play all 3 days at Team World. The Badger Chordhawks, an all-male acapella choir that includes Team World Committee member, Kevin Brekke, sang the National Anthems for Canada and the U.S. to kick the tournament off.

Missouri's #1 was the odds-on favorite to win Team World this year as they had three pitchers on their four-player team that had an entry average of over 80%. The second game of the day included a match between MO #1 and Illinois #1. These two teams had the highest

entering team ringer percentages. Jenny Gegg pitched 34/40 (85%) and Lachelle Cook pitched 33/40 (82.5%) to defeat Kevin James and Austin Bailey. However, Steve Denault and Paul Littlefield defeated Virgle McCown and Michael Bowman to tie the round with 2 wins for each team.

Defending Champion, Wisconsin #1, played their first game against Michigan in the 7th round of the prelims. Penny Steinke pitched 32/40 (80%) and Cliff Shave pitched 31/40 (77.5%) to defeat Andrew Adams and Brandy Morehead as part of winning 3.5 games in the round to show that they were not ready to give up the Team World traveling trophy very easily. Rich Bonner had tied Helga Hewlett for a 1/2 of a win for each.

Canada faced California in the 12th round and included a game between Tom Moffat and Hastiin Begaye (current Elder Men's and Jr Boys' World Champions). These 2 teams finished 6th and 7th last year and both were eager to get back to the Finals Bracket this year. The two champions had an epic battle as each pitched 29/40 (72.5%) and ended the game tied with a 17-17 score. Dalton Rakestraw and Sandra Johnson defeated Mike Marshall and Tracy Snell but Tracy Rose beat Bobby Bartel. CAL won the round 2.5 games to 1.5 games.

MO #1 took on WI #1 in the 12th round as well. Gegg pitched another 34/40 (85%) game and Cook were able to defeat Shave and Bonner. However, Steinke pitched

33/40 (82.5%) to defeat Bowman. Zak Schwartz and McCown played to a tie to give MO #1 a match win of 2.5 wins to 1.5 losses. Every team played 9 games on Friday. IL #1 finished the day on top of the leader board with 30.5 wins. MO #1 was just one win behind at 29.5 wins, and WI #1 had 29 wins. MI (25.5), MO #2 (25), MN #1 (24.5), and CAN (24) held the rest of the top seven spots on the leader board. CAL was #8 with 22.5 wins.

Prelim rounds resumed at 7:30am on Saturday as all teams were scheduled to pitch 10 games. WI #1 met IL #1 in the 33rd round. Both teams were trying to keep within range of MO #1 for the top spot in the prelims. Steinke and Bonner defeated Littlefield and James while Bailey and Denault defeated Schwartz and Shave to tie the match with 2 wins for each team.

MN #1 won 28 of their 40 games on Saturday with Harvey Burkman and Gary Boots both winning 9 of their 10 games. Burkman lost to McCown in the first game of the day and then won the final 9 while Boots only lost to Tom Moffat in his 7th game of the day. MO #1 made it to the top of the prelim standings at the end of Saturday with 67.5 wins as they won 38 of the 40 games they played.

Michael Bowman lost his first game to Gary Boots 25-24. He then lost his next game to Tracy Rose before winning the rest of his games on Saturday. Gegg kept on rolling. She pitched against Cindy Clausen (current Senior Women's World Champion) from Washington in round 34 Saturday night. Gegg started the game with 2 ringers in the first 4 shoes and then finished the game with 36 ringers in a row for 38/40 (95%). IL #1 dropped to second in the standings with 62 wins. WI #1 was 3rd with 59.5 wins. MN #1 was in 4th place (52.5) as they leapfrogged MI (51.5), who was tied with Canada (51.5) for 5th place. MO #2 (49) fell to 7th and MN #2 (48) jumped past CAL (42.5) for the #8 spot.

Play started at 8am on Sunday with all teams having just 4 more games to play in the prelim round robin. MI faced IL #1 in game 45, the second last game of prelims. MI was able to win 3 of 4 against IL #1 as Greg Burke lost to Bailey while Andrew Adams, Brandy Morehead, and Hewlett won their games against Kevin James, Paul Littlefield, and Steve Denault. This game may have been

a preview of an upcoming finals match as both teams had enough wins to get there. Jenny Gegg pitched her second 38/40 (95%) game in the last game of prelims. MO #1 won 15 of their 16 games to lock in the top spot of the finals and earn a first-round bye and 82.5 wins. IL #1 (75), WI #1 (72.5), MI (66), MN #1 (63), MO #2 (62), and Canada (61.5) completed the 7-team field for the finals. Minnesota #2 (58) and CAL (53.5) finished 8th and 9th.

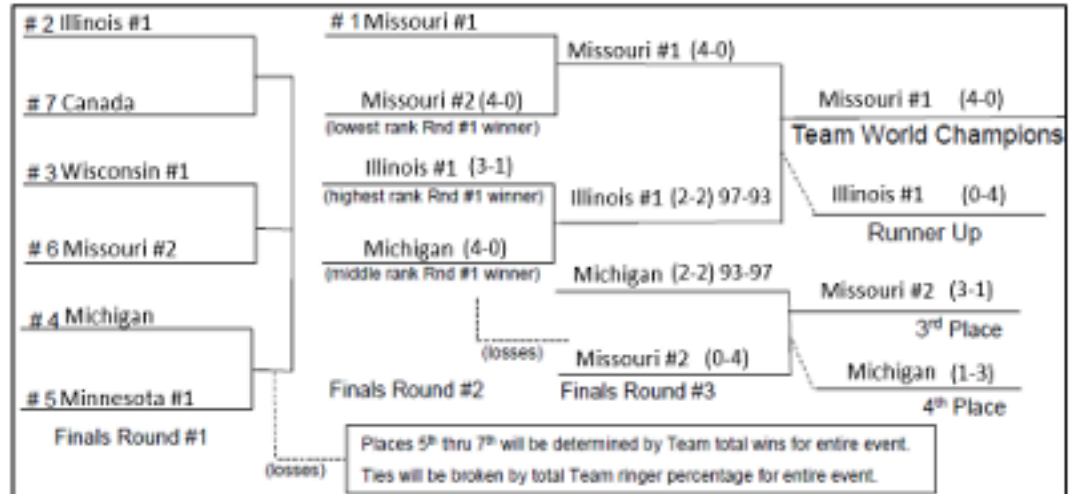
Finals Bracket Play Begins

Courts 1-4 had the MI vs MN #1 match. Andrew Adams had a tight game against Harvey Burkman but held Burkman off by winning 21-18 and pitching 27/40 (67.5%) against Burkman's 26/40 (65%). The rest of the games had larger point spreads, all in Michigan's favor to give them a 4-0 victory. Courts 5-8 had the WI #1 vs MO #2 match. Pam and Emma Meyer each had great games 32/40 (80%) and 28/40 (70%) to defeat Penny Steinke and Cliff Shave. Don Gillette and James Driver defeated Rich Bonner and Zak Schwartz for a surprising 4-0 sweep over the defending champions. Courts 11-14 featured IL # vs CAN. Tom Moffat won a close match against Austin Bailey, 25-21 as he pitched 29/40 (72.5%) to Bailey's 27/40 (67.5%). IL #1 won the other 3 games as Steve Denault, Kevin James, and Paul Littlefield each defeated Tracy Rose, Tracy Snell, and Mike Marshall.

The semi-final games matched up MO #1 vs MO #2 and IL #1 vs MI. The battle of Missouri included a Gegg vs Pam Meyer game that was one for the ages. Jenny started the game with 12 doubles but Pam answered with (7) 4-deads in that span and they had 13 for the game. The final score was 16-4 in favor of Gegg as she pitched 37/40 (92.5%). Meyer pitched 33/40 (82.5%). MO #1 swept the match as McCown, Cook, and Bowman defeated Emma Meyer, Gillette, and Driver. The other semi-final was the rematch of IL #1 and MI that was played earlier in the day. Morehead pitched 30/40 (75%) to defeat Denault 29-13, for a 16-point advantage in the match. James defeated Hewlett 34-20 to take 14 points away from that 16-point advantage. Bailey pitched 31/40 (77.5%) to defeat Adams 27-20. Adams pitched 28/40 (70%) to keep the game close but IL #1 now had a 5-point advantage. Burke squeezed out a victory over Littlefield as he won on the last shoes of sudden death, 24-23, and push the match into a 2-games-each tie. Tie matches in the Finals are decided by total points scored

for each team. Total points gave IL #1 the win over MI with a 4-point margin of 97-93.

The Finale matched up the two teams that were #1 and #2 over the entire weekend, MO #1 vs IL #1. The first to complete their game was Gegg and Bailey. This game was another nail-biter as Bailey and Gegg started cold but had 6 4-deads in a row before Gegg was able to win the game, 17-14, pitching 31/40 (77.5%) vs Bailey's 30/40 (75%). Cook defeated James 27-13 while pitching 29/40 (72.5%). Bowman didn't have a great game, 21/40 (52.5%) but held off Littlefield to tally MO #1's 3rd win of the match. McCown came from behind to seal the sweep



by defeating Denault 30-20 by pitching 29/40 (72.5%) in his comeback.



Missouri #1 won the 2026 Team World Title going 8-0 in the Finals and winning 90.5 of the 100 games that the team played. MO #1's total team ringer percentage was 71.63%. This is the 9th highest team ringer percentage pitched in a Team World. Jenny Gegg's performance was also one for the record books. Jenny won all 25 of her games and averaged 84.30%. She is the 10th person to average 80%+ in a single Team World and her average is the 5th-highest ever pitched. Alan Francis and Sue

Snyder are the only people that have pitched a higher ringer percentage than Jenny did this year.

Team World is Fierce and Fun

There is a lot more to Team World than the competition among the top teams that enter the tournament. All teams in the tournament are in the same class and play in the same round-robin. This also means that there are plenty of "average Joe's" that get an opportunity to pitch games against pitchers that they would never face in a regular tournament. We had several individuals that were not on teams that were pushing to make the finals but had interesting individuals. There are 3 that come to mind at Team World this year. Jeremiah DeMello, of Washington, (current Cadet Boys' World Champion) age 12, moved into the Jr Boys division this year and moved back to 30-feet and became the youngest player to play in a Team World. Jeremiah faced Johnny Wilhelmsen of Florida, age 88, for the final game on Friday night. Jeremiah pitched



20/40 ringers for his first 50% game of the tournament and beat Johnny 34-22. Jeremiah then faced Ken Schaver, of IL #2, age 88, for game #35 on

Saturday night. Ken beat Jeremiah 32-10, pitching 24/40 (60%) to Jeremiah's 17/40

(42.5%). Ken thought Jeremiah was going to become a good horseshoe pitcher and advised the boy to just slow down a bit after the game. Ken and Johnny found out that they both pitched against a person that was 76 years younger than them. The next question to answer was, which one was older. Johnny was born April 19, 1938. Ken was born April 18, 1938. These two faced off for a head-to-head battle in game 45 on Sunday, the second to last game of the prelims. They must have felt that they were playing for pride as both pitched a good game. Ken won 30-15. Johnny pitched 22/40 (55%) for his 2nd best game of the tournament. Ken pitched 27/40 (67.5%),

which tied his best game to that point. Ken still had enough in the tank to pitch 29/40 (72.5%) the next game, which was his 23rd game of the weekend. None of these three gentlemen said that there were too many games to play in Team World.

Team World is also the only tournament that the schedule does not tell any pitcher who they will pitch against in the tournament. That is because the matchups are decided right before each game starts by the teams. The schedule shows which teams play against each other and when that game is. Team captains need to report to the coin toss mat to choose between heads and tails to determine which team gets to choose matchups. Captains need to



show up early as the choice of heads or tails is given to the first captain of that match that shows up to the coin toss mat. The second captain gets what is left. The court groups are identified by color, so the opposing captains face each other on their designated color of the courts for the match and face each other as they await the coin toss. The team that loses the coin toss gets to choose their court. The captain of the team that won the toss gets to pair up the opponents for that match. It is at this point that we know who is playing whom for that game. Scorekeepers need advanced training to create the games in H.S. Master. Court assignments, player names, and team numbers are all important to create each game.

The players from the team that lost the coin toss gets to start the game. At this point the games seem like normal singles play but many are watching scores of other courts to see how their teammates are doing. Captains head back to the coin toss mat after their game and the process starts over for the next game. There are typically noisier reactions of cheering and high-fives on the outcome of the coin toss than there is at the end of a game. Having a good strategy for pairing opponents and getting the chance to use it is serious and fun!

Earl Paulson Team World Award

Earl Paulson was the driving force to host the Team World tournament in Beloit, WI, with the entire Beloit Horseshoe Club. Team World was getting kicked out of its original home, the Pitchin' Palace, after the 1989 tournament, and needed a new home. Earl spearheaded the move and was the tournament director for the next 29 years. Earl passed away in 2021 at the age of 91. The Team World Committee decided to present an award to people that have achieved success at, or made significant contributions to, Team World in Earl's memory. The Earl Paulson Team World Award was first presented to Dale Lipovsky of Minnesota, in 2022. Dale was an easy choice as his teams have won the most titles and he had pitched in the most Team World tournaments than anyone else. Other Team World recipients are: Charlie Webb (IL), Alan Francis MO-OH), Sue Snyder (IN-KY), Paul LaCrosse (CO), Penny Steinke (WI), Bev Nathe (MN), and J.D. Drake (MI). The Team World award was



presented to Sandy McLachlin-Hohl (ON) and John Secord (TW Committee) this year. The award presentation was held at the midpoint of the prelims on Saturday. Sandy was not present to receive the award, but the Canada Team accepted the award on her behalf. John was in attendance. After all, he has worked at all 40 Team World tournaments and has been a Team World Committee member since 1990.

Don't Forget the Cheese

Every team gets an opportunity to win a 1-lb block of cheese for each player. Players just need to pitch a 70% game or better to have their name entered in the drawing.

The whole team wins cheese when a player's name is drawn. There are enough drawings to give cheese to half of the teams that play in Team World. We can tell this is popular by the reaction that occurs when a winner is announced after a cheese drawing.

Team World is an experience like no other in horseshoe pitching. We encourage anyone to take the lead to form a team and enter Team World. It is truly a great experience.

250th Anniversary Edition – Part V



It is now time for Part V of our 250th Anniversary Edition which we are highlighting the 1976 World Tournament which was played in Levittown, Pennsylvania.

We must go back in time to explain the now discontinued *Intermediate Men's Division*. It was originally established for men aged 60 to 64 to bridge the gap between the Open Men's division and the Senior Men's division (which was historically reserved for ages 65 and older). After twenty-six years it was discontinued after the 1992 World Tournament as the Senior Men's age was lowered to 60 years old.

Paul Focht from Dayton, Ohio won a three-way playoff over Andy Paglarini and Harvey Kohlenberger to capture the 1976 Intermediate Championship. Paglarini moved into the championship game with a 80.2% game over Kohlenberger, only to be defeated by Focht.

In the title match Focht defeated Paglarini 52-38 in 90 shoes. Paglarini a 4-Time Minnesota State Champion, did start out by grabbing a 3-0 lead, but Focht took the lead after six shoes and just stayed ahead the whole way. Focht pitched a 75.6% game against Paglarini's 72.2% game.

It is interesting to note that just fourteen years earlier, Paul Focht won the Men's World Title in 1962 with a record of 32-3 and averaged 81.86% in Greenville, Ohio.
