STATE TOURNAMENT

The State Tournament is special. The Labor Day culmination of the horseshoe season is a lure for all bona fide tournament pitchers. It's a time when the class spread is tightest - the best competition of the year.

Any month of the season can produce a top of the line tournament with pitchers coming long distances to create loaded classes. Some tournaments are known for their attraction of top women; some for the men's top classes. Others are known to have extensive and competitive junior classes. A couple of tournaments in Wisconsin are remembered for the numbers of players entered in the middle classes. There is one tournament each year excelling in all categories. For short we often call it 'The State'.

The Wisconsin State Tournament usually plays Labor Day weekend to afford the use of three full days. The mid-state location, Fond du Lac, this year should make for a large entry. Large in this case means numbers over 220. Its anybody's guess but nice weather in July will go a long way in promoting entries for the State Tournament.

New championship format at Fond du Lac will have all classes limited to pitching one day. Most classes will be eight person as usual and the championship men's and women's classes have been trimmed from twenty-four and sixteen to ten each. All nine games by each of the championship classes will play the same day. Fond du Lac makes the schedule but traditionally Sunday after the Hall of Fame award is the time for the champions.

STATE TOURNAMENT

1. Entry deadline is July 31, 1993
2. Seed based on three highest tournaments 12 months prior to entry deadline, or last 10 events.
3. Two (2) State-scheduled tournaments required.
4. National Horseshoe Pitchers Association card req.
5. All pitchers will play all games on same day.
6. All players must have name on back of shirt
7. All normal fees are included in entry fee.
8. All championship class games are 40 points. (excludes Senior class)
9. Shoe limit games of other classes are set by the host club. (probably 50-shoes again)

Other championship classes like the Juniors, and Seniors are designated to be played at prime time but the day may vary from year to year.

Fond du Lac fairgrounds will again be shared with the car club people and the arrangement is still being discussed. Watch your tournament schedule for the late directions on parking.

CASH OR TROPHIES

The State entry form has become a ballot. The WHPA is going to tackle the often heard problem of 'money in the State'.

In a comparison of State tournaments presented earlier in this Newsletter, Wisconsin pitchers found that most other surrounding states have cash awards in their State tournaments. The only other state with no cash awards also has misgivings on trophies only. Iowa, a 'cash award' state, has a facility benefactor. Illinois receives bid money from the host club. The highest awards are self generated by the Wolverine pitchers of Michigan.

There is no free lunch. When last discussed at the State Meeting, John Secord pointed out, and it was not challenged, that cash awards would come from mainly increased entry fees.

The present fee is \$16 and purposely designed to just cover expenses. To put money in the tournament, an entry would be; minimum, \$25 - more like, \$40 - someday, \$50. (Some other tournament entry fees are already \$60.) Add to this extra expenses incurred when the State moves indoors - and it will. There is no free lunch.

No one is suddenly going to bankroll the State horseshoe pitchers. The prize will have to come from within. Vote for cash awards if you will but be prepared to pay, or, vote for trophies only.

A PROXY VOTE

This ballot business on the State entry form is thought to be an interesting new approach. Probably will have more WHPA members voting on this single issue than anything previously. In this case the question is directed at those who will be most affected. But to be completely fair the field of play should be open to all. Pitchers not entering the State Tournament this year are encouraged to voice their opinion through this Newsletter. This is one questionnaire that will get a 99 to 100 percent response. On those merits alone, look for increased use of this method on future State entry blanks.

DEADLINE: JULY 31

The entry form for the state tournament is on the inside back page of this newsletter. For those who are going, fill it out and send it in early. The motel list for Fond du Lac is on page 3. Make your reservations now because of other events going on there. The Super 8 has a block of rooms for you, more information inside.

NEWS BRIEFS

The WHPA Hall of Fame Committee has chosen their recipient for the 1993 Hall of Fame honor. He is Bob Phelan of Appleton. Bob held the office of Secretary/Treasurer for the WHPA from the time of its inception, 1967, until 1973. The induction will take place at the State Tournament on Labor Day weekend at Fond du Lac.

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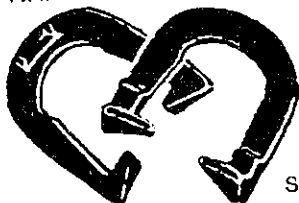

Schreiner's restaurant, intersection of Hwys. 41 & 23 is another great place, also close to Super 8.

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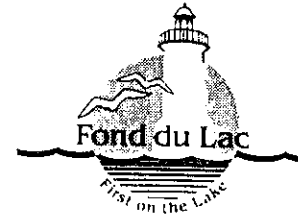

The west coast lumber shortage is apparently effecting Wisconsin's logging and pulp industry. The Wolf River, once a highway for saw logs, lends its name to a horseshoe club taken to marking score with, of all things, plastic clothes pins.

Several years ago we heard the guys at Loyal, Wisconsin, Vince Jakel, and Bob Gregorich developed the self-service score device with a tally board at each end. Clothes pins are used to mark points, ringers, and shoes. These are the type boards we used at the New London tournament.

Its a Yea! - Boo! deal.

Yea! its about time pitchers started keeping their own score. Yea! for the guy with the courage to do it in a tournament situation.

Boo! for the clothes pins. It makes a guy feel like he's a one man band - hard to get used to - rather use a clipboard. Its faster and permanent.

With numbers at both ends, it is most often a fruitless, disconcerting chore to determine the running score. Although colorful, those plastic clothes pins leave no lasting ringer trail. Probable cause for lower class delays at New London were those darn plastic clothes pins.

"A" class finally got going about an hour late but at least there was time to find some score sheets and markers. Hurray for the score sheets but why did the "A" classes pitch 50 shoes?

Small consolation; both "A" classes had ties, the men's was a three-way.

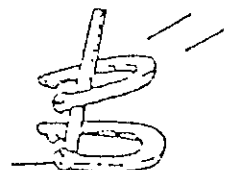

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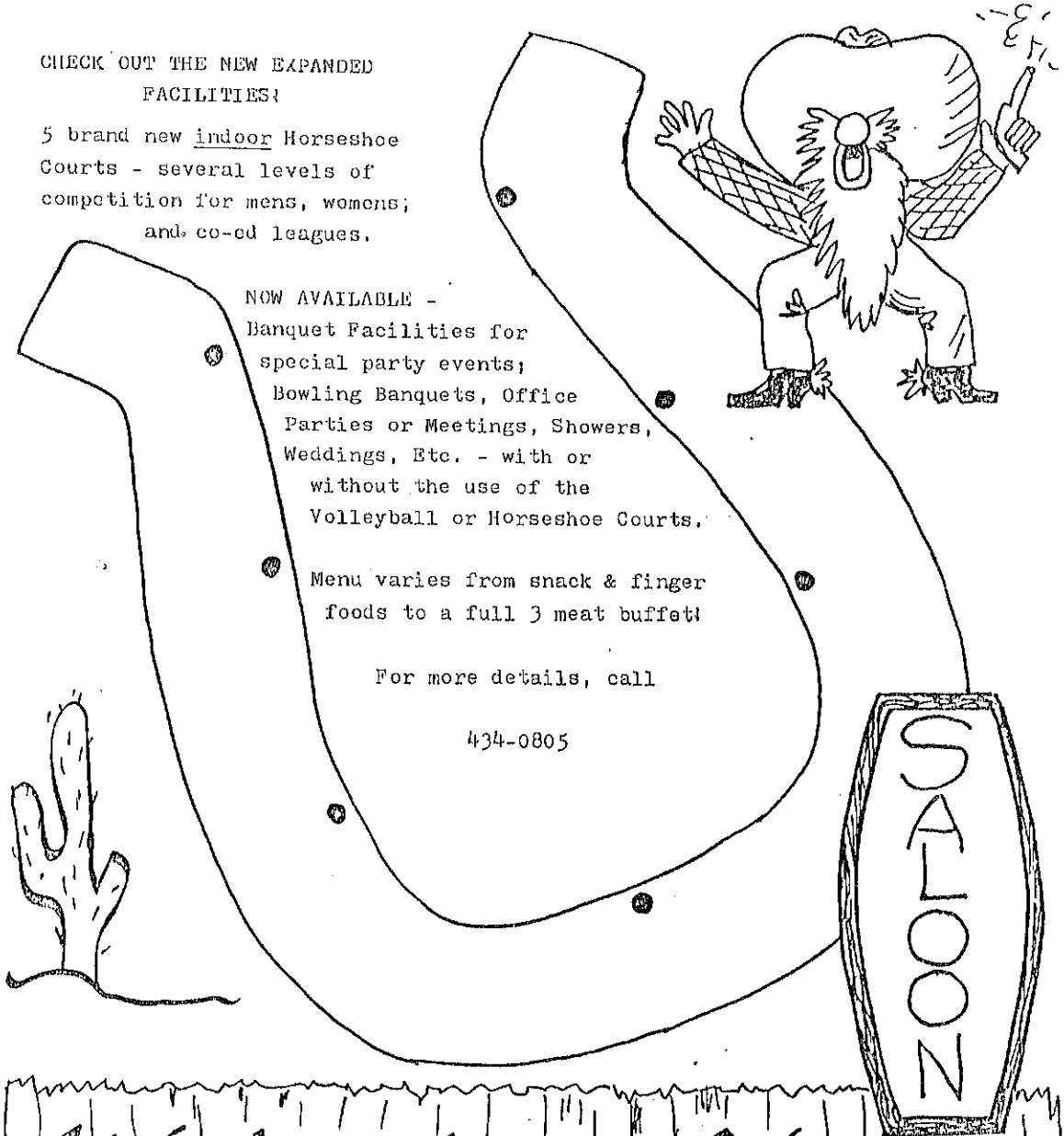
