Randy Rein, Mosinee, regained the State Title, his sixth, in straight wins. Although Steve Wiegert of Green Bay gave him a scare marking 39 of the 40 points needed for game, Rein managed to hang on to face the defending Champion, Don Kangas in the final match. Kangas led out to an early lead trying to force a play-off game and looked up to the task. Heading into that match, Kangas already had one loss but was leading in ringer percentage. Rein faltered in the close-out allowing Kangas a few catch-up ringers before taking final advantage.

Gert Wilcziek, Whitehall, is the NEW Ladies Champion. She had to stop, take a breath and remind herself where she was headed several times. Her win over Edi McKinney was a major milestone. Defending Champion, Lorraine Sternbeg already had one loss. Wilcziek had all W's and kept it that way head to head with Sternberg to complete her dream season with the State Title.

Barrent Dahl, Trempealeau, surprised his brother Dustin (or Pudge), the defending Champion, by winning the final game. Each had suffered a loss at the hands of a former champion, Wes Rein. The brothers finished the competition with essentially the same ringer percentage (68.7 & 68.5). It's a new day for the NEW champion.

Nichole Riehle, Auburndale, repeated as State Champion winning over both her opponents.

Clayton Gage, Milltown, went to a play-off game with his nemesis, Ralph Maylahn before earning the 1st place trophy this year, his fourth time running. Some said, it should have been the best 3 of 5 games for the two top elders in the State establishing a special championship class for two The way it was within the 4-man Elders double round robin, it became the best two of three with Maylahn winning their first meeting. Their combined competition produced the two highest ringer percentages in the '98 State – Maylahn 77+% and Gage 80+%

EVERYBODY WINS AT EAU CLAIRE

There were some anticipatory misgivings over the State Tournament schedule Start times (10:00 AM and 9:00 AM) were too late, some said. What's going to happen in case of a rain delay?

Well forget it. It did rain, but only a few drops. There was no delay. It did delay the start of following classes but everyone attuned to the workings of a State Tournament had allowed for it.

It took until almost Monday (11:30 PM Sunday) and contrary to popular belief, there were some fans still on hand to enjoy it when the Championship men's class finally ended with Randy Rein earning his sixth state title.

THE 1998 ARCH STOKES AWARD

The most prestigious annual NHPA award to the person making the greatest impact to the sport over the last few years was mistakenly accredited to the wrong recipient on these pages last month.

Bob Dunn, the National Promotion director from Minnesota, regular contributor to Newsline, author of an historical account of horseshoes in Minnesota, and avid collector of older shoes, received the Arch Stokes award at the NHPA banquet in Ainsworth, Nebraska. He included his family in his emotionally grateful words upon accepting the award.

Paul Stewart, the NHPA 5th VP and website organizer received the Presidential Award and was further recognized for his many shifts at the World Tournament as the "Officer of the Day."

WISCONSIN SENIOR GAMES

The Washington Park Horseshoe Club hosted the 1998 Senior Games on their courts the week following Labor Day. Handling the competition were club members, Tommy Bartlen, Al McGowan, Harry Hub (bronze) John Leskovar (gold) Joe Lipperer (bronze) and Jim Haupt.

Annual competitor, Sally Kubash (gold) just back from the Rosholt County Fair, did some stats in her best "school marm" penmanship and visiting conductor Ralph Maylahn also served as combination, instructor-judge-scorekeeper.

Classes are necessarily mixed because of the twenty separate divisions. Gold, silver and bronze medals are awarded to successful contestants over 50 yr. Women's division is another category.

Oldest entrant, Anita Treinen of Wauwautosa won her gold in the 85 to 89 yr. class, pitching from 20 feet. It's a special rule of the Senior Games that women over 75 yrs. may move up to the shorter distance.

Roy Shaffer of Waupaca should be on the WHPA tour – had one game of 85%!- 17 ringers in 20 shoes. He has an NHPA card, says he pitches mostly in Florida.

Another talent hardly seen, Snow Jacobson of East Troy, averaged 37.2 points in the 20 shoe count-all games. Amplify it to 50 shoes - a 92 average! He: "Get into tournaments." She: "I pitch Eagle?" He: "I repeat, get into tournaments!"



YO! HANSEN, YOU 'DA MAN!

Dick Hansen became the forty-third inductee to the WHPA Hall of Fame since its beginning in 1976 with Casey Jones and Harvey Elmerson.

His accomplishments are well known to many present day pitchers due to his nine years as President of the WHPA He has gone on to serve as an executive board member of the NHPA first as the 5th Vice President and presently as NHPA Secretary-treasurer.

WHPA President, Ken Jaeger created a time for WHPA awards mid-day Sunday at the Eau Claire courts. There was little to report on Hansen that wasn't already written in the State Tournament program book. It is a nice write-up.

Jaeger used the book to make the award. He found some sentences were especially appealing so he read them twice apparently as an affectionate gesture to the man who last held the presidency.

Upon receiving the HOF award Hansen called his family to center court to share the moment and will go on record as having more relatives in attendance at the Eau Claire tournament than pitchers in all the championship classes.

Hansen attributed much of his success to his strong family association indicated by the throng actually standing behind him. He also claimed strong ties to his other family, the many fine people he has met through his association with the sport of horseshoes.

Even though the tournament only had 39 pitchers entered, small for a Wisconsin tournament, I think it was a successful event for two reasons.

The number one reason would be that there are now at least 39 NHPA members that know what the NHPF stands for. And secondly we did manage to raise \$250 for the NHPF. Thanks mostly to an anonymous donation of \$150.00 made to the tournament to help offset cost, add to the prize money or just donate to the NHPF.

The tournament was co-sponsored by The Fieldhouse and Firstar Bank. The Fieldhouse gave a reduced price on the menu and beer to all horseshoe pitchers for the weekend. And of course the horseshoe courts at no cost. Firstar bank donated the trophies and 25 door prizes that were given out 3 or four to a class by drawing.

Bob Distad was pitching in his first NHPA sanctioned tournament and won Class E with a 6&0 record and averaged 29% one point under what he entered at. He will be back for more.

Look for next years tournament to be bigger and better. If one tournament with only 39 pitchers can raise \$250, just think what we could do if every Charter did the same! The key word is benefit. The bank was not even interested until they were told it was a benefit tournament. Try it, it works.

FIELDHOUSE NHPF BENEFIT

Let's get it straight. The Fieldhouse is not an indoor arena. It's more like a sports bar with outside facilities for horseshoes and volleyball – inside facilities are for eating and drink – Pub and Eatery, as they call it It's the place in Caledonia where the WHPA Christmas party is usually hosted.

Mer Sorensen, pitching 60+%, had the unenviable position of last man in an inter-divisional duel of four pitchers bound for the State Tournament. They represented the top of the open men's division, women's and over 70 yr men. Each had two chances with the others playing a 4-person double round robin. Just a couple of ringers decided the match as Maylahn could not cover final double ringers by both Sternberg and Kangas.

The following outstanding pitchers in other classes included: John Koepp; winning all games. Chuck Hansen; although pitching in the Racine County League, spends most summer weekends coaching a girl's baseball team making only a cameo appearance in an occasional shoe tournament. Area pitcher, Bob Distad; won pitching in his first ever sanctioned tournament. Beloit's Ken Lovaas; looked very comfortable pitching his reverse turn from thirty feet.

. Is there a preferred or correct way to pitch a horseshoe? At the Caledonia, Fieldhouse tournament we saw a 3/4 reverse, a 1 & /34 reverse, a full turn reverse; flips of all description, low on line and hard, high, as in "hope it's open," and the all the usual turns. They all worked sometimes. A stranger to the game would have been hard pressed to learn how to toss a shoe the preferred or correct way by watching these flingers.

Ceil Trossen gets our vote as one of the most well traveled pitchers of the year. She keeps popping in from Suring like it's a breeze.

SUSIE PRITZLAFF SIGNS OFF AS EDITOR/PUBLISHER

Susie Pritzlaff was the instigator and has been the key administrator of this Newsletter for more than twelve years.

In the spring of 1986, Susie said, "Let's sit down, I have something important to ask. What do you think about beginning a Newsletter?" was her opening remark.

In prior months, Al Lonning of Eau Claire had distributed a statewide questionnaire devoted to the possibility of a newsletter' to serve the WHPA. One of the questions asked if we should join with the then current Minnesota publication and serve the U.P. as well. Very few WHPA people were even slightly interested – 58 by actual count.

In that little across the table meeting at the Lone Star Tavern, Susie found a willing ear. Her ideas were expanded. Start with the 58 in favor and a few more. She went to press with her typewriter and copy machine with a June 1986 issue—"available eight times a year for only \$4."

A month later, another issue, she bought her writer a book, "How to Write Effectively." She obtained a membership list from John Secord and selected those we thought may be receptive. Susie bought a new typewriter and speculated, sending out 180 issues. Some subscribers were approached in person. Subscriptions came in slow but sure.

Before the first year was over Susie began including her pictures and introduced the double page folded left on quality paper making a very presentable publication. Subscriptions increased to over 200. Bulk mail became available and, Tom Roanhouse advertised the Pitchin' Palace on the back page.

[Now the computer generated Newsletter mails 400 issues, 67 out of state. We estimate we reach 360 of the over 500 WHPA members. It continues to present that challenge.]

About ten years ago at a state meeting she and her writer received a standing ovation for successfully creating the publication and just a few years back there was the presidential award for the Newsletter by Dick Hansen. Predominately, those formal occasions and the satisfaction of the accomplishment were Susie's reason and reward for her dedication.

Susie was inducted into the WHPA Hall of Fame in 1987 on what she had accomplished before the first edition of this Newsletter. Since its inception she has been the one and only Editor/Publisher of the Wisconsin Horseshoe Newsletter.

From those of us still with the Newsletter we can only honor her request of a lifetime subscription and offer our gratitude for her direction in showing us the way.

Thanks Susie, it was an association of a lifetime, and a hell of a buggy ride.







Clayton Gage, the top short distance pitcher in Wisconsin acquired enough wins this year to earn the 1998 POY award. He keeps entering those tournaments because he wants to enjoy it while he can. He's got this premonition that he's getting too old. Heck, he's only 75 and going strong, number two in the World T, number one in the State T.

V.F.W. DOUBLES

The entire committee of; Robert Maas, Don Navarrete, Leroy Meyer, Ken Wood, John Reitveld, and Cyril Mader was listed on the results sheet thanking all 45 teams for entering the V.F.W. doubles tournament. The VFW has been doing this thing for 15 years now but can't get together with the Green Bay Packers on conflicting game days. To alleviate maters a Friday evening class was scheduled.

A 110% limit rule was in effect for entering teams. It seems to accomplish its purpose, making for fair competition. Could it also be the reason the very top pitchers no longer are seen here? Are they afraid to pitch with someone with a complimentary average? The challenge is there.

Years past the VFW doubles teams pitched 50 shoes, now they pitch 40 – each player pitches 40 shoes. It makes for a long game. Actual playing time is 45 minutes per game. An 8-team class consumes five and one quarter hours – longer than a Packer game. It becomes a marathon. Hope there is no playoff game.

The standard doubles score-sheet, adapted from the Beloit Club model, is used at the WHPA State Doubles and throughout the state. It ends at thirty shoes (and has place for developed score). The State Doubles has gone to six team classes in an effort to limit overall playing time. VFW teams could pitch quality games with fewer shoes. Alas, old, old traditions are hard to break. It's the way they play leagues on Kamps Kourts. A class: Elaine & Cliff Troullier 50.8 won in a play-off with Ann Opsteen & Cy Srenaski at 45.6. Ralph Maylahn & Jeff Secord followed with 49.7%.

B class: Fred Nummi & Red Eckardt won all games with 37.20%. Steve Troullier & Norb Strzyzewski lost only one at 31.4%. Team three was Myron Daily & Joe Groeschi at 36.4. 


