State Meeting

Wautoma, is centrally located, home of Hall of Famer, Henry Bartel, also the Union Bank. That combination was just right for the 36 people who attended the WHPA Spring Meeting.

John read the previous meeting minutes and told us we are going into this season with \$760.00 in the bank.

Old Business: Scholarship Fund Coordinator, Howie Voiles, reported \$2400.00 as a grand total of the two inaugural years of donations. In the same breath he told us he was carrying a cashier's check in that amount as he had closed out the account and was retiring as coordinator. After we learned Glenn Bogen-schneider would be appointed new fund coordinator, Howie received his two year payoff.

Applause, Applause. We also found in our hearts to applaud Glenn for his willing acceptance of the new position.

The membership entrusted Glenn and his present committee to increase the scholarship awards in both dollars and places awarded. It will require approval by the Board but is expected to be ready for this year's State Tournament.

New Business: Question; How do you feel about men over 70 years pitching from 30 feet in ordinary open tournaments? Comments and discussion centered on the various ways it could be handled in Open Tournaments. Bob Wilke would resume pitching again. Royce Wrucke is all ready a step-up pitcher. Bob said yes, he would play if mixed into the 30 ft. womens class. But it was the general opinion that if women can play in a mixed class then let us simply allow men over 70 years to pitch in their respective classes at the distance they chose.

The discussion was to determine the best approach for Open Tournaments. This body has no control over Open Tournaments, only suggestion. The suggestion to all Tournament Directors is this: Let's make room in our Open Tournaments for Senior Pitchers.

On that lead, a motion to offer a Senior (over 70 years) class in the State Tournament; passing unanimously, 26-0.

Senior men are encouraged to enter tournaments with a "30 ft." average. If need be, qualify yourself with a 100 shoe score. They also passed a rule that the Senior Class, 30 to 40 ft., are exempt from the two tournament requirement rule for the State Tournament as the Juniors are.

Tournament Director, Dick Hansen, offered this insight to the 1987 State Tournament

STATE MEETING (CONT'D)

"Entry fee will be the same, \$13.00; I expect to send out a tentative schedule of all classes prior to registration with Class A Men pitching in a windup time about noon on Monday."

Sometimes a pitcher will "fill in" and pitch two classes in the same tournament. The resulting question is; would that fulfil the 2 tournament requirement for State? John Secord explained that in the past he averaged the two percentages and entered it as one tournament. A motion to that effect passed with a few dissenters claiming it was unnecessary. Pacers averages are not entered.

John Secord has been providing averages based on two time periods, the calendar year and the horseshoe year. To simplify things the published state average will hereafter be a product of only the horseshoe year: Begins August 1, ends July 31.

World Report: Curt Bestul began by answering questions on the following subjects;

Scorekeeping: There will be a daily sign-up sheet where you can reserve for the next days scorekeeping. Pitchers will be given first choice.

Practice: Because of limited set-up time and resulting clean-up, practice will be limited to Carson Park rather than the Hobbs Arena.

Dress Code: Wear shoes and sleeves; don't wear short-shorts or cut-offs. The byword is dress neatly. Your name and state must be printed on the back of your shirt.

Club Team Tournament

Green Bay did it! They are the new Club Team Champs. The four won 24 of their 32 games on their way to the title.

Joppe had a good day, 64.5%; Wiegert was excellent, 61.8%; Cy won her share at 44.3% and Wally, winding a new 1½ turn, hung in there with 45.3%. He was their only winner in the last match against the Pitchin' Palace. It was all they needed as they nosed out Marshfield by one game. Earlier the Velp Avenue crew put a good one together in their match against Eagle. Their high team average for that one match was 66.5%. Overall average, 54.0%.

Marshfield, formerly Wausau, was a new team entry this year. A well balanced team with 23 wins and second place. Their high team average was 54.1%.

Goldendale, 20 wins, averaged 48.9% for 3rd place, got lucky, won the flip and had choice of pairs six out of eight times.

Pitchin' Palace, facing Green Bay in the last match, won three of the four games; nearly causing a tie. Their 19 wins, a team average, 49.3% put them in fourth position.

Platteville showed signs of greatness but not enough of it. Had 14 wins and averaged 43.2%. A new entry in this event; we know they will be on the hunt next time around.

Janesville will live to pitch again, averaged 43.1% with 14 wins. Started out strong but faded in the reach.

Fond du Lac, another new entry, did not live up to their potential, averaged 39.9% with 12 wins. Maybe next year...hope so.

Eagle, all wearing red shirts, wound up with too many red letters. Team average, 36.8% with 12 wins. Steve Koehn's 74% game was just another red mark.

Rosholt, starring Harold Bestul, had fun, got 6 wins, averaged 37.4%. It was just not enough firepower.

Some high individual games: Joppe, 78%; Norm Mauthe, 72%, 74% and high average, 65.5%; Wiegert, 74%, 76%, 78%; Hank Schwartz, 72%; Koehn, 74% and lost! Only two pitchers, Wally Srenaski and Norm Mauthe, were W-7 and L-1.

Nine teams played from 10:00 AM until 6:00 PM pitching 6,696 ringers in this count all, ringers only, contest. Players added \$144.00 to their prize money by keeping their own score. It was easy; just count ringers.

Green Bay won \$120.00, this years custody of the traveling trophy and \$48.00 for winning 24 games. All teams were paid \$2.00 per win. Marshfield won \$60.00 and \$46.00 for games won.

We are already working on a ten team one day schedule for next year; tentatively split in A and B groups. Hopefully Susie Pritzlaff, Margo Schwartz, Sandy Secord and Len Meistad will again do the numbers.

Big News From Edgerton

Participants in this years Tobacco Days Tournament at Edgerton should be impressed when they get there. Several years of dreaming, hinting and friendly persuading have finally been rewarded. Work will begin as soon as the weather breaks on, #1 installation of new lights, donated by the City Park Board #2 a retaining wall, to be built into the south bank, to level off and extend the area behind the pits; railroad ties for this project courtesy of Bun Carley, whose playing ability is exceeded only by his kindness #3 space provided for a 9th court, in order to have one for playoffs at all times (I hope Bun will have a lot to do with this too) #4 a new chain link fence surrounding the entire complex, with one double and two single gates; the funds for this were graciously donated by the Tobacco Days Committee.

It was for this reason that we felt we should make a "go for broke", all out effort to get the project going, so as to have an attractive place to offer all the new faces, as well as all our old "faithful" entrants. The new lights will also allow us to schedule classes later in the day, to accomodate more players.

We're excited; we thank all who need be, again, especially the Tobacco Days Committee, for what is going to be done for us. But also to you, the people who enter our tournaments, for it is your support and participation that has shown the committee and the city, that our sport matters to them, that we

are worth investing in. We'll do our best to not disapoint anyone. We can't wait to see you all again in July.

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Junior League

Three years ago the WHPA conceived and introduced the Junior Scholarship Fund to finance a yearly award to the junior champion boy and girl. In doing so, it was mentioned that the future popularity of the sport of horseshoes depends on the young peoples acceptance of the game.

Don't be fooled into complacency. The junior scholarship award of \$200, in itself, certainly will not attract young people to our game. In fact, probably no amount of "school" money will provide incentive to pursue the sport.

The real way to get young people into horseshoes is with a junior league program.

A club can sponsor a junior league program, they can administrate it and make room on their courts for it, but it takes parents to make it go. First (last and always), kids need a ride to the courts. As long as you are going for a drive, how about running the new junior league? Grandpas, you are welcome to help too. Pretty soon you'll be having more fun than the kids.

The little red book put out by the NHPA for sanction club/league program, devotes a short section to junior leagues. Make the rules and the pitching distances fit the ages of the young people involved; it says. Also, if there are enough pitchers, the team concept with jerseys will make a hit with the kids.

Write for your little red book to: NHPA Sanction Club/League National Director, Terrance Dougherty, 9 Schiavone Drive, Ambler, PA 19002. Another thing to ask for is the little yellow, "Junior Scholarship Pitcher Award Program." It describes requirements to be met to earn the yearly title of "NHPA Scholarship Pitcher of the Year." Perhaps your club officers already have these publications.

Normal kids need a little push to get started and a lot of support throughout the season. So let us do it and from the leagues will come better junior tournament players and eventually a new pair of state champs.

Discount Tourney

The inexpensive Discount Tournaments featured at the Pitchin' Palace this season hardly got off the ground. Were they too cheap? (only \$5.00) What A deal!

Winner's return; 55% of the entry fees was far greater than ordinary. Yet the lack of participation forced cancellation of several tournaments. Those tournaments that did fly were low draw events.

It's still a question why lots of pitchers did not pick up on it. Could be we have seen the last of this inovative way to pitch a tournament.

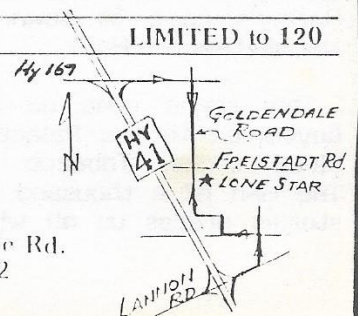

The maroon pickup, scampen aboard eases into town an hour or two ahead of schedule. The air is chilly and inside, the driver, Napa cap pulled low over his eyes, John Deere jacket sealed shut save the top and bottom snaps, ponders his mission. Feet, both attached to long, spry legs each perform their duties - one to control the freight, the other tapping to the beat of the country music station. Silver hair glisening in the sun, his large weathered hands guide the craft into the day's field of competition, the purpose of his mission, the second love of his life, the courts. Our gladiator eases out of the seat and to the back door for his weapons. Tools in hand he heads toward the field of battle, about to begin another competition, another quest for gold, another horseshoe tournament. The battlefield is silent except for the clanging of shoes against stake and chanting of the scores. Suddenly, someone looks up, spots his approach, and the word is out. The rest of the day just won't be the same. Harley's come to town. - Harley Wickingson, the Whitewater Hawk.

This scene goes on all season long, from Boyceville to the Palace, Germantown to Combined Locks, Tobacco Days to the Moose. The man of a thousand talents and even more stories graces us all with his wit, charm and

harmonica tunes. Now entering his 82nd year, "the Hawk" just seems to keep on getting tougher, stronger, and more fun to be around. And those of us lucky enough to have been around him over the years are much the better for it.

Always willing to show a snapshot of the "nicest lady in the world", (his wife of 51 years) Harley has known nothing but hard work, keen competition, and good sportsmanship his whole life. A top notch ball player and bowler in his first childhood, I think he resorted to horseshoes only as something else he could whip folks at, after scattering victims along the way in everything else he'd played. A farmer who likes to get his eight hours a night (though I often wondered of what), when prodded enough he'll pull out his trusty mouth organ and break into a self accompaniment of "Highways are Happy Ways" - Happy they must be. Or he'll play a complete tune for the girls, as they sing or he might dance a jig on the courtyard. He says he was Class "A" before there was a Class A and I for one believe it.

Stories, can he tell stories! A few favorites... "Once had a practice court out behind the barn, lighted on only one end." When his little grand daughter asked how he could make ringers on the dark end he said "I know right where it is, exactly 40 feet away. Besides, it's more fun that way."

I once asked him if there was anything he couldn't do. He looked at me, got that glimmer in his eye and said, "Only one thing." My response "I know better."

Another time, after whipping me quite handily in a tournament, I jokingly said, "Why don't you pick on someone your own age?" His simple, serious faced reply, "Ain't none."

He gets along fabulously with tournament directors, especially those who don't schedule him during the heat of the day and provide him with a quart of his favorite liquid refreshment, milk.

Yes the day is never quite the same once he arrives. And I for one am glad to have gotten to know him, for he truly is an inspiration.

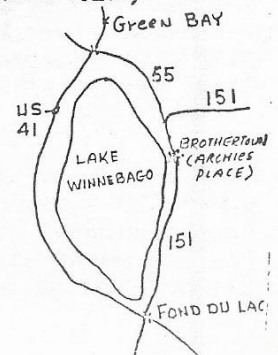

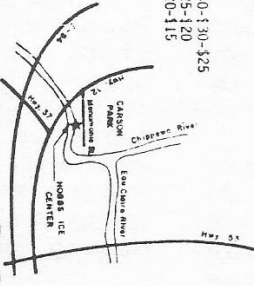
