

## State Tournament

Carson Park in Eau Claire is probably the best big horseshoe set-up in this state. This pitcher has seen none better including all states. And it is big, eighteen courts all in a row set in a pine woods surrounded by the usual chain link fence. Were the trees cut out to form an area for the courts or have the courts been there longer than those tall pines? Whatever, they were made for each other.

The Eau Claire club and the city or Park commission must serve one another well. The grounds resemble a horseshoe country club. The club building as we saw it at the last Eau Claire State Tournament in 1983 is small but adequate with individual rest rooms.

1983 - only six other State tournaments ago, but it seems longer. Looking at the schedule from that year we wonder if Brian Repinski in class F at 38.8% and Randy Rein in class L at 31.0% had even the slightest bit of an idea that next time back in Eau Claire they would be in the Championship Class.

Consider the number of pitchers Rein and Repinski had to beat to advance to the top class - about half the WHPA.

John Udelhofen was the Defending Champ and it was a close, four way, finish with the 'old man' on top, Harold Bestul. He was 67 then while the rest of "A" averaged in their twenties. Hey, that's better than Nolan Ryan. Bestul, rebuilding his strength, is back to pitching in the mid-fifty percent bracket.

When Bestul was about twenty and working on a farm in southern Wisconsin he could pitch the shoes well enough to beat anyone around. So his boss, the farmer, took him to the State Fair in Milwaukee to pitch with the 'big' guys. The man to beat in those days was Harvey Elmeron followed by Harold Sheets and finally Casey Jones. "Your going to get beat" the boss promised, "but we've got some of the best in the world here at the Fair and I want you to see them pitch."

But Sunday should be Harold Bestul Day. Tip your hat to the man with the 'Wig Wam' cap. They don't make 'em much better.



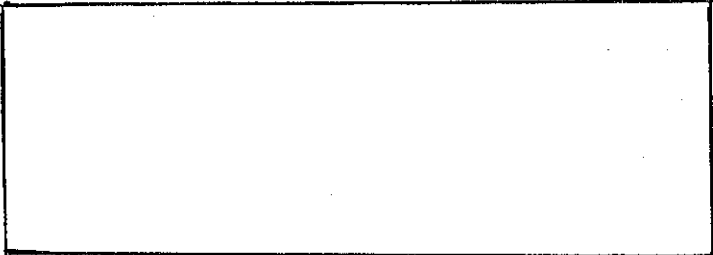

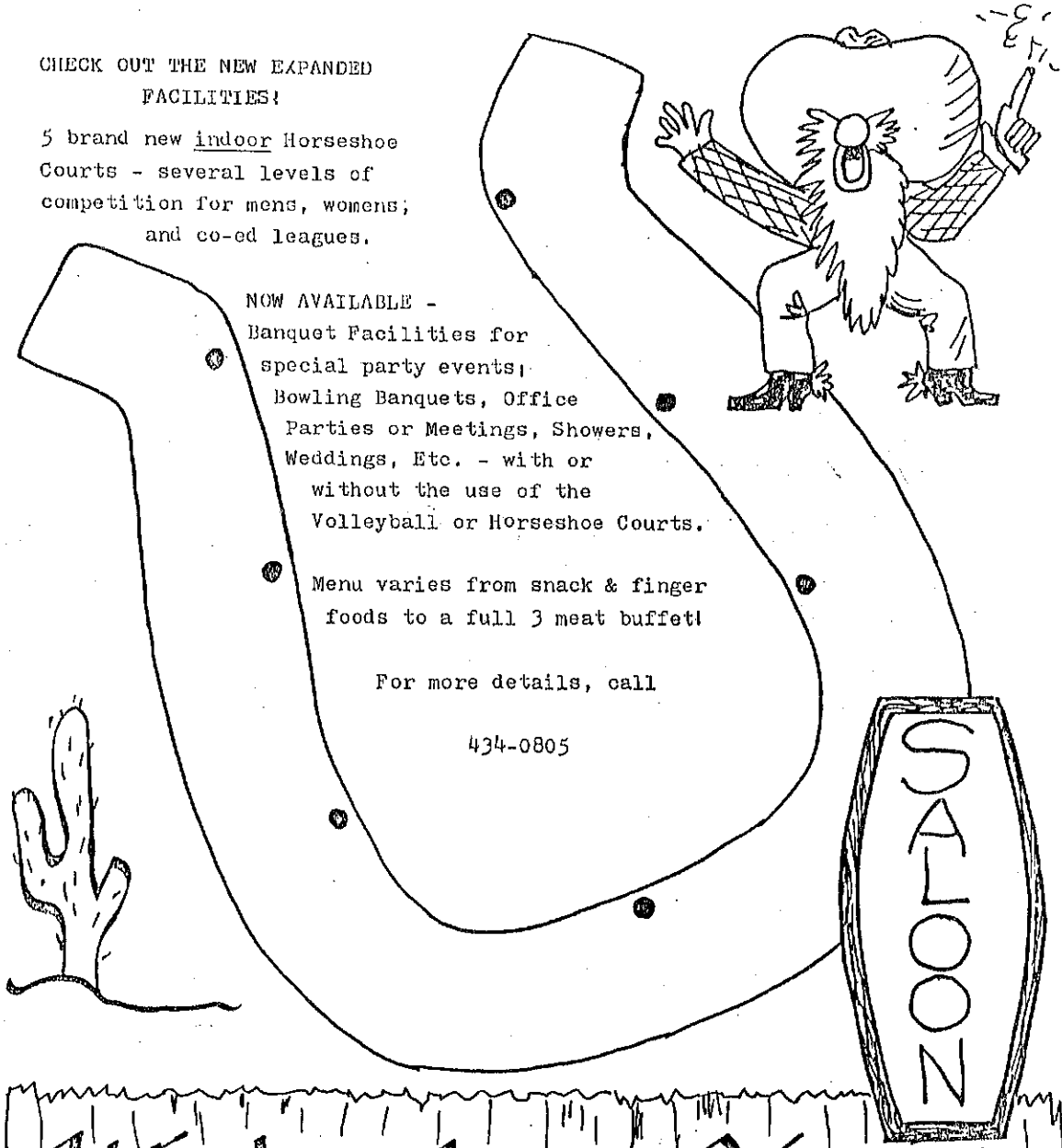
