DISNEYLAND?

WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO DO NOW, HEIDI?

Wisconsin has a new World Champion! Heidi Sternberg of Richfield did it in a play-off game against defending champion, Crystal Curtis of Canada.

With her Wisconsin audience on edge, Sternberg earned her way to the extra game with a one point victory over Curtis. She went on to prove it was no fluke pitching 80% to attain the title in the play-off match. If she goes to Disneyland, Sternberg had better take her practice shoes. Penny Steinke, currently #3 in the World may look for consolation at the Eau Claire State Tournament.

With World Champ Heidi Sternberg, Penny Steinke close behind, and Heather Sternberg; this state overwhelmed the Championship Girl's class.

Randy Rein, our State Champion from Mosinee, finished tenth overall in this World Tournament. After 600 shoes of class play he posted a stellar 451 ringers - 75.17%. He missed the sudden death finals by one ringer.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP CLASSES

Mark Bauman, reigning Champ of Minnesota, robbed Rein of the last spot of the play-offs. He then lost to Bowler-of-the-year, Walter Ray Williams in the opening play-off match. Kevin Cone, Iowa auctioneer eliminated Maryland's, Phil Fleshman as New York's pride, Art Tyson went down to the new flash from Ohio, Jim Walters.

Second match of the sudden finals coupled Walters with section winner from West Virginia, Rick Cale who became victim to sudden death. Williams met Cone and was soon behind some 20 points. Cone then laid back while Williams gobbled the gift and got to the 40 point mark first.

Third match brought in The defending Champion, Allan Francis of Missouri to face Walters. A double miss did Francis in as Walters hit the 40 mark with six. One the other court Williams eventually dispatched Maine's latest top man and section winner, Brian Simmons.

Walters and Williams paired for the last game. Actually the drama was gone. Except for some close-out misses, Williams won in a walk.

Walter Ray Williams adds the 1994 title pitching 84% and now ties Elmer Hohl with six.

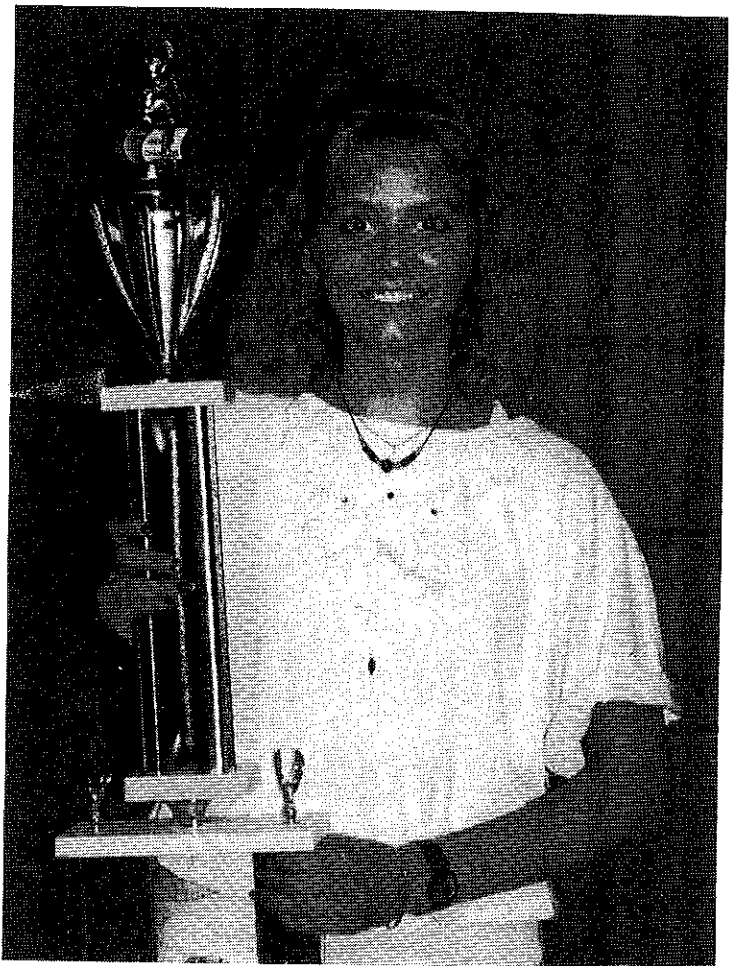
On another set of courts six Women qualified for their Sudden-death play-off.

Lois Webster, Team-World lady of Kentucky, outpointed Quebec's, Sylvianne Moisan while Indiana's first lady, Sue Snyder put down oft time World Champion from Minnesota, Phyllis Negaard.

Quebec came at Webster again in the form of 'no-step', Diane Cantin. This was not to be Canada's day as Webster advanced. Oddly another Minnesotan, unbeaten Bev Nathe was Snyder's next conquest. Nathe, nursing her only defeat, talked of facing a pitching machine. She took the game to 74 shoes looking at 69 of Snyder's ringers.

Webster played along, that final game, but Snyder was on a mission and continued her dominance averaging 90% in the final matches. Sue Snyder regained her World Title with an overall average of 85.16%

Other World Champs of 1994 include; the Boys Champ, Vance Harren of Minnesota pitching 75.89%, the Senior Men's Champ, Merlin Potts of Kansas averaging 68.25%, and the Elders Champion, Pete Rebman of Nebraska, with 68.33%

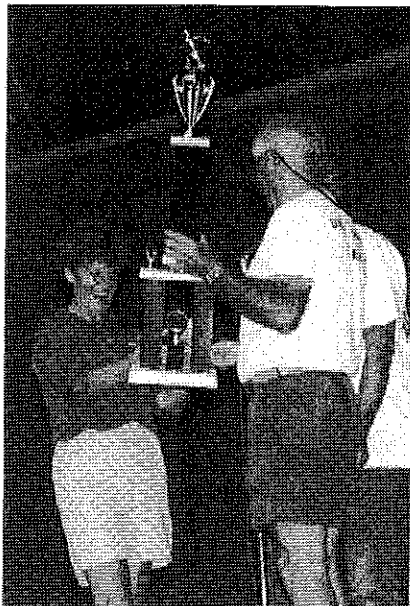

THE EVER CHANGING NHPA

Change is a by-word for the NHPA. Because we have an organization directly controlled by the members, and conduct a town hall like meeting, it is possible to modify parts of the By Laws and Playing Rules from time to time. At this year's convention, only two years since being completely re-written, 38 Bylaw changes were considered.

A major change, passing by the minimum 2/3 vote, was what amounts to a one year extension for the Junior Division. The cut-off age remains 18 but is extended to the entire year in which a boy or girl turns 18. Some people recalled when the age was 16. For the record the Wisconsin delegation voted against changing. After some word changes, it was decided to hereafter publish minutes of Executive Council meetings.

In the way of compensation, Secretary-Treasurer, Donnie Roberts' base salary, which in turn is the base for the other executive salaries, was increased to \$12,000. The Publicity Director, Bob Champion, received a increase to 5% of the Secretary's base.

Bev Born will now be compensated for handling juniors as well as adults within the sanctioned league program. Oliver Smith, who developed and services NatStats and formerly worked for free, was awarded 15% of the Secretary's base annually.

The number of Charter delegates and unregistered members attending the annual Convention is a fraction of years past. Less delegates, superior organization, and firm monitoring helps avoid run-on meetings known of the past.

The Wisconsin delegation led by John Secord included Jane Smith, Terry Sternberg, Susie Pritzlaff, and Jim Haupt - just five.

Three cities presented bids for the 1996 World Tournament - Gillete, Wyoming; Kitchener, Ontario; and Tampa, Florida. Any one would have been acceptable but the nod went West to Gillette, Wyoming for 1996. Kitchener, Ontario seemed attractive and many would like to see the World go out of this country but the Canadians were bucking every state west of the Mississippi plus some in the southeast. Some pitchers think the Kitchener year could be 1997 if they choose to bid.

Bonnie Seibold ran uncontested and retained her position as 4th VP.

Barry Chapple, an announced candidate and incumbent 2nd VP, was also running unopposed but "regretfully" withdrew. Four men were nominated from the floor. One, John Decker, RD for Michigan, was not in attendance and did not make the ballot. Jim Schilling, RD and Secretary for Indiana, was on the ballot along with George Nick, past president and current rules

and by-law expert of Minnesota, and Casey Sluys, president of a California charter, nominated by the Wisconsin delegation. By a narrow margin Sluys defeated Nick in a run-off vote and will be the 2nd VP heading the rules committee. He knows them well, he said, practicing his trade as World Tournament Judge of the first order.

While waiting for a final tally of the Bylaw votes, President Dave Loucks outlined a proposed format for the 1995 World Tournament. All entrants would be assigned to classes of 16 players each and seeded progressively in the order the averages came in from NatStats - for all divisions. Championship classes would be made from the top percentages evolving within the tournament. The Open Men and Women would qualify 16 to the championship class and that group would proceed in a round robin to determine a winner. The same method would be used in all divisions except that the Senior Men would qualify 10; the Elders would qualify 6; and the Juniors after first competing mixed would then separate into two 6 player groups - one for boys, one for girls.

Now back up and change all mentions of the word 'would' to shall. Much to Louck's delightful surprise the membership fully accepted the new format.

The entire Convention consumed less than eight hours.
