

SPRING MEETING

March 19, 1994, shortly after 1:00 PM, WHPA President Hansen called the meeting to order.

That's all for the formal language. The following is this man's report. For formal meeting minutes come to the next meeting.

John Secord did read the minutes of the Fall Meeting recalling, among other things, that the Beloit Club opted to host the 1995 State Tournament and most likely outdoors on the Renley Courts. After all debts were paid, Secord continued, the WHPA bank balance is now near \$4000.

Lorraine Sternberg reported \$9404 in the Scholarship Fund with liabilities of \$4452 - net amount near \$5000. (If she were nominated for treasurer, would the deal include her fortune?)

Hall of Fame selection committee met before the general meeting and Susie Pritzlaff was elated to have received seven new nominations. The committee has chosen Felix Kubly of Watertown as the 1994 successful nominee. Pritzlaff pointed out that although everyone has known Kubly for years, few people know he was State Tournament Director the year it was held in Watertown.

Publicity person, Jane Smith is checking out a list of Newsletter subscriptions presently sent to the media and sponsored by the WHPA. Smith is asking those members who originally submitted names and addresses of media people to make the call again to determine if they actually receive the Newsletter. Contact your sports person to confirm. Smith will appreciate your help.

Regional Director and WHPA tournament scheduler, Jim Haupt told of a full schedule citing the importance and respect deserved of tournament directors. Working with others in the state but chiefly with Hansen, the WHPA introductory brochure is ready for distribution. Many at the meeting took along a fistful for their clubs. Contact Dick Hansen for additional copies. The brochures should be an ideal pass-out for prospective members.

Wisconsin had 409 card carrying members in 1993. We are looking for more in '94.

Dennis Keiser, 1994 State Tournament Director for the Eau Claire Club promises good weather and another good State Tournament.

President Hansen welcomed Terry Sternberg as #2 VP in this first time at the front table, and thanked the new VP for expanding the Hall of Fame display cabinet. Hansen provided a sneak preview of possible new World Tournament bidders. They are: Gillette, WY; Tampa Bay, FL; Lansing, MI; Mobile, AL; and undisclosed city in Ontario, Canada.

The bigger news for the World Tournament this year in Syracuse, NY is the format - all players will pitch three days. World entry forms, due 5-23-94, appear in the current issue of Newsline. Subscriptions are available through Donnie Roberts, POB 7927 Columbus, OH 43207-7927, only \$12. If you are into mooching, ask a subscriber to copy the form from his issue - or write your regional director. Usually the President distributes a brief meeting agenda. This time the agenda was replaced with a pair of pages relating to seven proposed changes to the WHPA Constitution and Bylaws.

Constitution changes were minor alterations in word, punctuation and language left to the discretion of the WHPA officers who shall now be known as the executive board. All gender pronouns will be converted to either-or words; he/she or the title of the officer represented.

By-Law was changed to Bylaw but no bylaws were rejected. The members did reject the attempt to eliminate 1st place play-off at the State Tournament. A couple of add-ons were approved. The executive board was empowered to make awards in the name of the association for various commitments already committed to. Its already being done but now there's a bylaw declaring it acceptable. And, Kevin Brekke figured we should handle pacers at the State Tournament like its done at the World Tournament. Most all agreed; when pitching with a pacer, it should be alternate first pitch regardless of the points in the inning.

In short order, like a forty shoe game, the seven questions were resolved. Hansen was visibly relieved and commented on the brief amount of time consumed. It was done by design. Well prepared, with ballots, and offerings hard to refuse; this meeting was solely in the hands of the executive board.

After the meeting we heard this sobering news. Harold Bestul, Plover told of Harvey Elmerson's death. Bestul described Elmerson as one of Wisconsin's best horseshoe pitchers, probably second only to Casey Jones. It was just a few weeks ago and happened in California where Elmerson had moved a couple years past. His sight was going, Bestul noted, but he could still pitch by aiming toward the center of the clay pit. Elmerson was an original member (1976) of the WHPA Hall of Fame.

It was also disheartening to learn that several weeks ago Sid Anderson, of Janesville, was reported to have suffered life threatening injuries in an automobile accident that did take the life of Elsie, his wife. Visitors have said Anderson remains hospitalized but his condition is unknown.

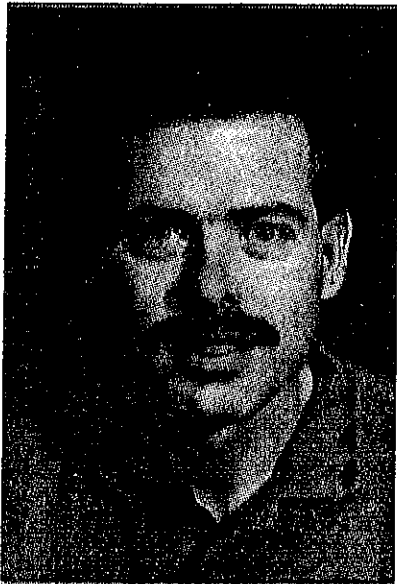
The Fond du Lac Club lost two of their members unexpectedly in March.

Now history was in the making for the PBA Tour. This would be the first time brothers met for a championship. The cameras started drifting over to Bob and Jeanette and a question to Bob asking how he was feeling, "great," said Bob and who do you want to win, his reply, "The best bowler, may the best bowler win". The opening frames were troublesome for both. Going into the ninth frame David had a 19 pin advantage, Dale struck out with a 187. David took the challenge and finished with 196. With this win David took home \$23,000 and a three year exemption into the prestigious General Tire Tournament of Champions. Dale's second place finish earned him \$14,000.

It has been busy for Bob and Jeanette since they came back. Many telephone calls from all over, Sports Illustrated people flying in to take pictures. An article will be coming out soon.

On Saturday, March 6th, the Professional Bowlers Tour Wisconsin fans were treated to an exceptional, intense finals. In fifth position was Triple Crown Champion Johnny Petraglia, fourth, a National Champion, Eric Forkel, third, 1993 Bowler of the Year, Horseshoe Champion, Walter Ray Williams Jr., second, Regionals Champ, Dale Traber, first, Resident Pro Champ, David Traber.

In the audience were Bob and Jeanette Traber of Cedarburg. Bob is known in the horseshoe world as a well traveled tournament player. Bob and Jeanette had risen early on Saturday to travel nonstop to Toledo, Ohio for the televised finals of the PBA National Championship. Their sons David and Dale, #1 and #2 in the finals. That must have been an exciting time for them when they received the call Friday night.

For us at home watching, the big question, will the brothers meet each other in match play.

In the first match Petraglia won over Forkel, 237-181. His next opponent, Walter Ray, Petraglia began with strikes and more strikes continued to a perfect 300 to Williams Jr.'s 191. This was a highly emotional time for Petraglia, Everyone ran on to the lanes congratulating Johnny. The perfect game meant a \$100,000 award from True Value.

It took some time for things to calm down and his next opponent would be the older brother, Dale. The tension mounted as this game proceeded and it could have been won by either of the players. In the close match Dale won 193-188.

Wisconsin's Regional Directors got the word from our in-house 5th VP, Dick Hansen, that all NHPA sanctioned tournament applications have to be first approved by the executive board. Its to prevent frivolous use of the sanction certificate. The situation has not been a concern in Wisconsin. We hope to continue to take our sanctioned tournaments seriously but will submit sanction requests for executive board approval.

For the most part our concern is getting more clubs to sanction. Unsanctioned events take a back seat and are apt to be a players second choice on any given weekend. We all pitch shoes for the fun of it and isn't that why we have leagues? On the weekend most pitchers are willing to put a little more on the line and like to walk away from it knowing they have added one more tournament average into the NHPA book.

Checked out the Tennessee indoor courts in March - Wisconsin guy's version of spring training. Had the opportunity to pitch shoes 5 of 10 days - 2 tournaments. Its doubtful there exists a better place to pitch in the month of March. Jack Freeman's building has been extended and now has room for eight more courts - total eighteen.

Ron Powell, friend of Freeman but from Kentucky, came down one day to set the new stakes in the end court. He made me do all the work while he measured, remeasured, set stringlines, and measured it two more times. Powell said Jack wanted those end stakes perfect and lined-up precisely with the other ten stakes. I can guarantee Powell's work. He is a man of numbers and nothing less than perfect will make muster.

Workmen were busy adding some support rooms to the mid-side of the building - rest rooms, office, eating area, and trophy rooms.

Talked to the contractor who will build the roof for the 20 outdoor courts. Requires a greater load factor to have open sides. Looks like they are just waiting for the ground to dry out and a material delivery.

Freeman said they will also have parking for 180 cars and if that's not enough they'll flatten some more of the land. He owns 65 hilly acres. It is beautiful back country. The farther back you walk the better it gets.

What's it all about? Well I don't know either. Tennessee already has the best indoor courts I've seen. With the outdoor courts it may well be the ultimate horseshoe complex. The World Tournament? Freeman thinks its to much of a hassle. Regional tournament? Its almost here!

The Music City South Central Regional Tournament is scheduled for this summer; June 18 & 19. Just received the entry forms. Five divisions; open men, open women, seniors, elders, and juniors are offered but the right to cancel divisions for lack of entry is reserved. The entry fee is \$15 and restricted to 225 players. A 90% payback is promised and somehow they have an added purse of \$2000. NHPA average verified by NatStats is entering criteria. Included on the entry form is list of nine motels. Campground space and two motels on the I-road as close as two miles.

Its a great place only exceeded by the quality of the people who run it. Mary Ella Bastian will gladly accept your entry and computerize your stats. Bill and Paula Hunisucker, Jack Freeman, and the rest of the Music City gang are sure to make you wish you could join the club. Could be a nice vacation. I'll say it again. Have entry forms : Will send.

The weekend of May 1st this year will be the tenth year for the TEAM-WORLD tournament. It is uniquely the most prestigious team horseshoe tournament going. In 1985, when first conceived, the name was "Can-Am". During those earlier years, he, who now scribbles these lines, was a sometimes team pitcher other times eager substitute. Those were the days... Just pitching TEAM-WORLD was euphoria. What followed became a new-guy's dream.

Because of the unusual way of determining pitcher pair-ups for team matches, 'this guy' had the opportunity to play a game with some really heavy hitters. Often if lesser team wins the flip and can choose the pair-ups, the captain will sacrifice his least likely-to-succeed teammate to the most formidable pitcher of the heavyweight foursome in hope of winning two or three points of the four available. Tough work but somebody had to do it. Many times 'this guy' was selected as least likely. Think of it - going forty or fifty shoes with Minnesota's Dale Lipovsky! He was a World Champ. It could have been a shutout but the champ left the stake open for nine lonely points. . Oscar Manns of Ohio told me to keep my shoe up while

illustrating his own perfect arc. Where else could 'this guy' get to go the distance with the first VP, Earl Winston? Don Peters of Illinois was nice about it but also took me to school. For a while it looked like I had Marv Ellison from Saskatchewan, Canada but twenty-five ringers didn't cut it. I also managed to keep pace with Clarence Bellman of Indiana - no mean feat. Clarence, you may be in horseshoe heaven now, but remember the time? The joke at the Pitchin' Palace was, "He took Bellman down to two shoes!". Had a nifty game with many time World Champ, Phyllis Negaard of Minnesota. My guys knew I would get beat but they didn't know the kiss that went with it. Clifford A Baker of Illinois was concerned for a time. 'This guy' was getting a lot of lucky bounces. Alas to get a close second to Baker is not that bad. Another year, 1987, I was sacrificed to Allen Francis of Missouri. That summer he became Men's Champion. Last summer he did it again. Francis is current World Champion.

Just to be on the same court with the likes of these and other heavy hitters is, as they say, hog heaven. To put the record straight, 'this guy' accidentally won a couple of those games. And that's the challenge most every pitcher reaches for at TEAM-WORLD - a go with the good guys, and/or gals.

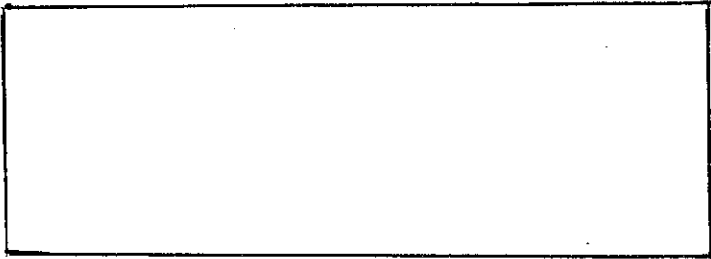

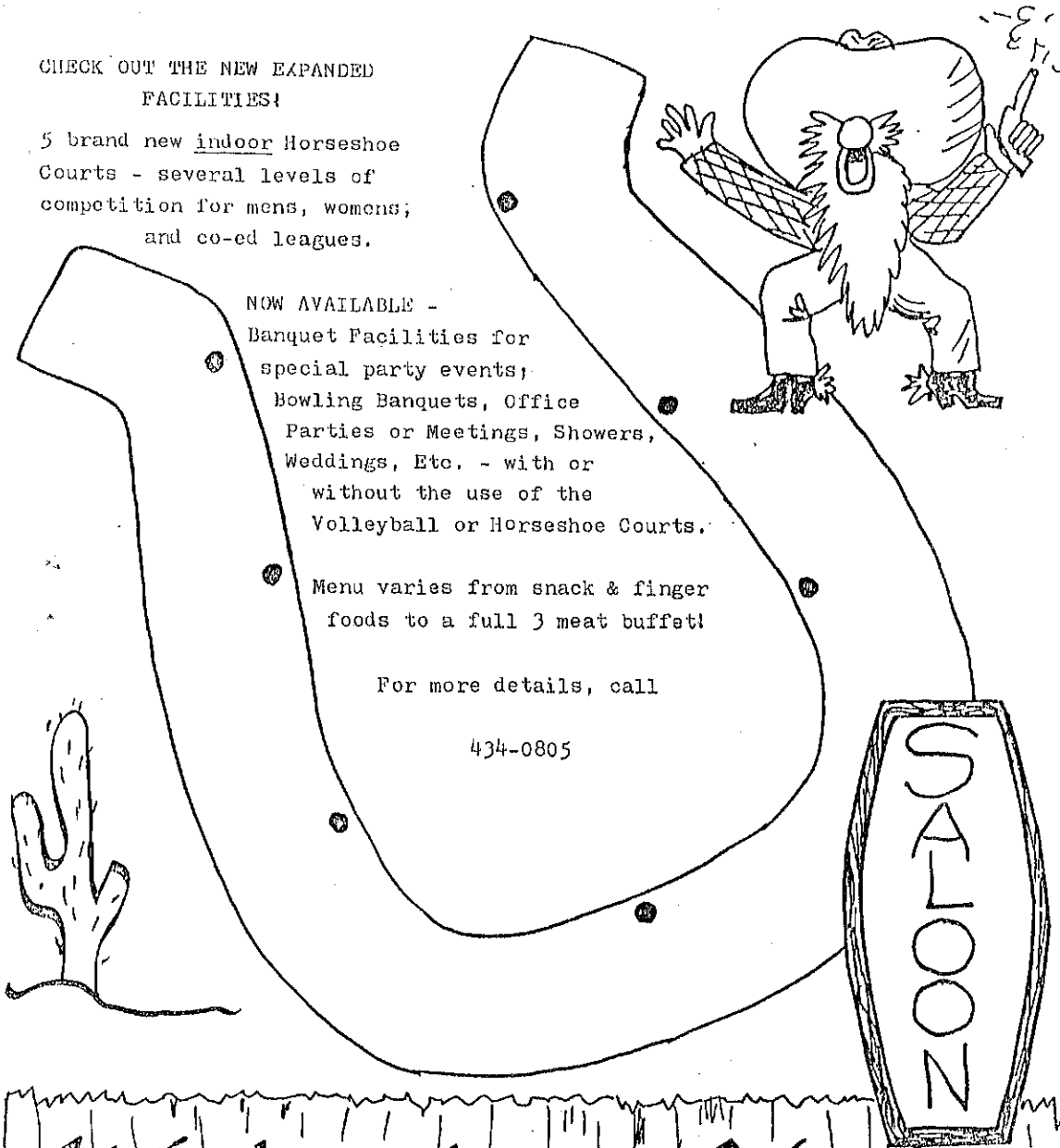
