Team-World 2004

The newbies did it! Tennessee, long sought after as a Team-World competitor went all the way on the first try. They defeated the traditional Team-World titlists, Minnesota-1 with a score of three games to one. Joan Elmore needed the final two ringers to win 34 ringers to 33 ringers over Jan Lundquist.

Paula Hunsicker, veteran Team-World worker acting as head coach for the Tennessee team was exuberant. She had been instrumental in their entry.

She realized their talent. Leading the pack was the boss, Shannon Foster with mostly wins at an impressive 78.96 %. Jon Elmore won every single game with a stunning 78.02 % ringer average. Bobby Fields lost only twice in three days pitching 70.10 %. Even their bottom man, Harold Morgan won 10 1/2 games pitching 50.10%.

Tennessee and Minnesota-1 were top of the ladder finalists but it had started earlier with four teams vying for the fourth ladder position. Ohio was without the services of Amy Francis. She twisted her leg, Saturday, already in the brace. Regardless, the Ohio team first defeated Missouri-1 while Colorado took out Wisconsin-1. Then Ohio eliminated Colorado. In consolation

it was Wisconsin-1 over Missouri-1 in total points.

Ohio made it to the ladder where they found Illinois-1 too much to handle. Next game the traditional Team World winners, Minnesota-1, mastered Illinois-1 for a crack at the prelim leaders, Tennessee.

One year or another all these ladder teams, excepting Wisconsin, have been Team-World Champions.



The three day competition of Team-World certainly is fine competition, but its not the whole story. Because teams are coming and going all day, never more than six games running, there's lots of time to meet most everyone pitching or attending the event.

We consider the day complete when we see Chuck Blakely, a dis-

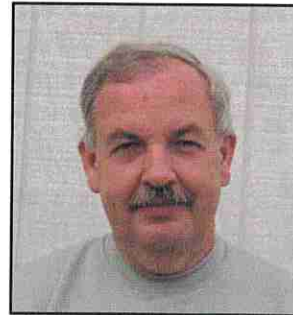

The President's Column

On a sunny Saturday in May, I had a chance to meet Bob Wilke. He just celebrated his 95th birthday, still going strong. He calls Berlin home, and although he lived in Oshkosh for 20 years of his life, he returned to Berlin, bought the house he was born in, and has been there ever since.

My wife Sharon and I arrived at his home at about 11:45. We met Bob and his wife Dorothy, and after a few minutes Bob said it was time to eat. Off to the restaurant we went. First Bob told the waitress right away that he was buying, and then the horseshoe stories began. He recalled one time in the 1930's when he was living in Oshkosh, and he rounded up two of the best players from Fond du Lac, one from Sheboygan, himself, and another from Oshkosh. Then they contacted Waukesha and told them they were coming down for a match. He and his buddies learned the hard way that young Casey Jones and his four teammates were as good as they had heard. A couple of weeks after their loss, Bob had to make a delivery to Milwaukee, so he took his horseshoes along. He stopped in Waukesha looking for Casey. He looked for him, he found him, and Casey beat him worse than the first time.

Bob is a very interesting man and an easy person to talk to. If you can get a chance to visit with Bob, take it. You will not be disappointed.

Bob has donated his entire horseshoe collection to the WHPA Hall of Fame, which is located inside the Beloit Horseshoe Club. Items include: the shoes he pitched when he was 5 years old in 1914; an assortment of shoes pitched by his dad and friends before 1920, when pitching shoes as we know them were first made; the wooden

Our State Tournament

We are looking forward to September, Labor Day weekend, the time of the State Tournament with anticipation.

Platteville is the place and although the club has been there for twenty plus years, they have previously never hosted the State.

The mystery is, who designed and dedicated all that court area if they did not have the State Tournament in mind, it seems natural that this place should host the State.

The Platteville Horseshoe Association has hosted many tournaments. Being close to Iowa allowed some heavy class A pitching. John Udelhofen formerly led the Platteville pack and now it's Mark Mauthe. Both are former State champs and likely to be once again.

The last large State Tournament by the WHPA was 1984 in Marshfield. The number 269 hangs in memory. At that time the State Tournament was unsanctioned except for class A & B—an unusual situation. From the convention held at that State Tournament it was proposed and accepted that all future State Tournaments be sanctioned. It marked the beginning of a new era in Wisconsin horseshoes. More and more ordinary tournaments went the sanctioned route.

So it was. An excessive turnout at Marshfield led to prospective limiting by accepting only NHPA members. Every so often some person would accuse the WHPA of holding down the entry numbers through sanctioning. They were right. That's exactly what happened. It was designed to do just that. A real pitchers State Tournament.

Since that time we have changed the State format in several other ways several times to limit the overall time on the courts and in the time spent on the site. Examples are the elimination of a 12-man class A and class B for men, further, the change in the timing for the fall meeting—removing it from the State Tournament weekend.

We still enjoy the WHPA ceremonies during the tournament but fewer people attend. It could be said that the one hour of the WHPA ceremonies at State the most important sixty minutes of the WHPA year. We induct a person deemed to be the most deserving of all our mem-

We wish we had the problem of that Marshfield event of 1984. We would like to have a mere 200 entries and try to promote it up from there.

Years ago the commercial newspaper accounts often listed the State horseshoe participants merely by initial and surname. Now, through this Newsletter, you can expect to see your picture if you won a class. In addition we write up the action at the State for your further enjoyment

The everlasting sponsor of Platteville horseshoe tournaments is Country Kitchen of Platteville. We can expect to see some State Tournament pitchers there enjoying past awards they may have earned for such things as high games and stuff. Sunday mornings they serve a large buffet that would satisfy most everyone.

One squawk you may have regarding Legion Park is that it is a public park and alcoholic beverages are not on sale there but that has occurred before and we have weathered the effects.

At their two tournaments, spring and fall, the Platteville club provides a well stocked and tasty food concession seemingly operated by the club ladies. We would expect some of the same for this coming State Tournament.

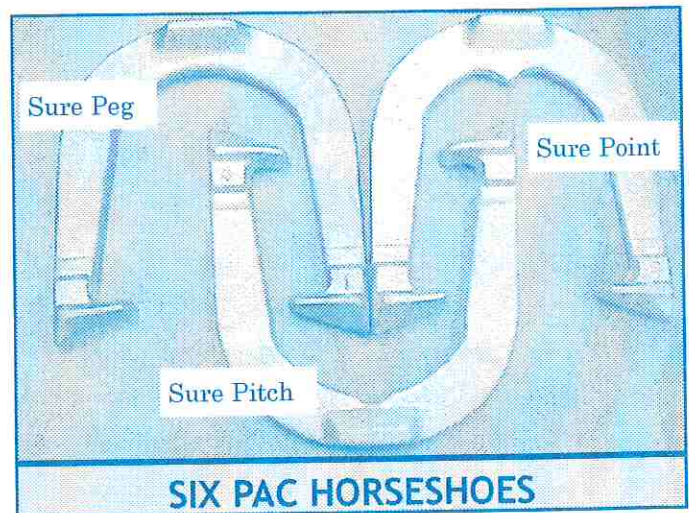

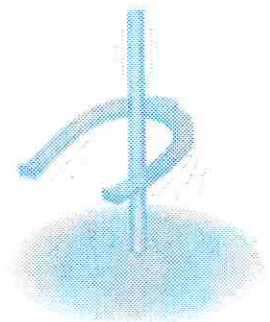
